#### PROCEEDINGS

The Second State Convention of the Free Will Baptist of North Carolina met with the church of Saint Mary, in New Bern, North Carolina, on September 16, 1914, at 11 o'clock.

Opened by singing No. 295.

The introductory sermon was preached by Elder E. T. Phillips. Text: Mark 10:51. "Lord, that I might receive my sight."

After the introductory, the Convention adjourned till 2 o'clock P. M.

# Thursday Morning

Met as per adjournment. Praise by congregation. Prayer by Eld. W. H. Lathinghouse. Minutes of Wednesday read and approved.

Devotional Committee report that L. B. Grice preach today at 11 o'clock. R. F. Pittman preach tonight. J. T. Butler tonight at Salvation Army Mission on Griffin street.

ELECTION OF OFFICERS—The following officers were elected for the ensuing year: D. B. Sasser, President; M. C. Prescott, Vice-President; C. K. Dunn, Treas-

urer; E. T. Phillips, Recording Secretary; L. L. Smith, Field Secretary.

Called for reports from churches. (See Table of Statistics.)

On motion, the committee on ritual be continued another year. The names of E. T. Phillips and J. F. Hill were dropped from the committee and the names of R. F. Pittman and J. F. Casey inserted in place of these. The committee as it now stands is composed of Elders J. T. Butler, R. F. Pittman, J. F. Casey and J. W. Alford.

On motion, all who were compelled to go home were excused.

REPORT OF STATE BOARD OF MISSIONS.—The Board of Missions having a very meagre report, same was not adopted. The board of the past year was continued for the coming year. The following constitute the board: Elder J. T. Butler, Chairman; F. F. Loftin, Eld. W. R. Coats and C. E. Brame.

REPORT OF BOARD OF EDUCATION.—The Board of Education submitted the following resolution: Resolved, That this Convention heartily endorse the work of Prof. J. E. Sawyer and his able corps of assistants in our Seminary at Ayden. That we hold up his hands and encourage him in every laudable way.

Educational Address.—Prof. J. E. Sawyer, principal of the Seminary was present and made a very impressive address. He dwelt upon the great importance of our sustaining our own institutions. He showed how we would lose out by neglecting a matter of such momentous consequence to us just now. It is a matter that claims our attention so much that to neglect it means dire calamity to us as a people.

A very energetic speech was made by Eld. L. L. Smith in behalf of the Ayden Seminary and its worthy principal. He urged that we should arouse to a sense of duty and work manfully for our school.

The names of Lloyd Vernon and B. M. Whitehurst were dropped from the Board and C. K. Dunn and L. L. Smith were elected to fill the vacancies.

Eld. R. F. Pittman, B. P. Parks, Eld. L. L. Smith and C. K. Dunn now constitute the Board.

REPORT OF SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD.—"In submitting this, our report for 1914 to the State Convention, we have taken great pains to draft data of vital importance to the convention at large and to offer the best possible means for the construction and maintenance of a systematized organization that will be adequate to meet the demands of the cause in the State. The Sabbath School as a state-wide organization means vastly more than a sort of machinery for denominational diplomacy; and it must be constructed along modern educational lines, as well as religiously.

"To construct this system as it should be done, will require time, patience and perseverance and the co-operation of the Denomination.

"During the past year we have been able only to gather up from the surface, the fragmentary facts in relation to the condition of our schools, but we hope to be able in the year 1915 to offer a system that will be sufficient to meet the demands of the Convention.

"The Interdenominational Association in the state, with more than 7,256 schools and 539,237 Sunday School people is manned by some of the most able divines, educators and business men in our state. These figures show that about one-fourth of the people in our state are affiliated with the Sabbath School, and that there is yet magnificent opportunity to contribute in both time and means to this worthy cause.

"In affecting and maintaining a system for the State, the Board asks the hearty co-operation of the denomination at large through all its menial organizations. We ask and urge that our publishing company receive the hearty support of the denomintion; and that our literature be used as far as practical.

"We insist that each pastor organize a Sabbath School in each of his churches now having no school and do his utmost to maintain them continuously, and that he report the organization to the State Secretary.

REPORT OF TEMPERANCE COMMITTEE.—The following report of the Temperance Committee was read, discussed and adopted:

"We, your committee on Temperance, beg leave to submit the following report:

"1. That we follow the Bible injunction in regard to Temperance.

"2. That we do not tolerate the use of alcohol in any form as a beverage, and that we recommend the use of grape juice instead of wine for communion service.

"3. That we put forth a strong effort to eliminate the use of alcohol from our land as a beverage.

"4. That we preach, teach and practice sobriety in all things.

"5. That we who compose this body favor national prohibition.

ORPHANAGE HOME.—Eld. J. E. Davis made a strong plea for an Orphanage Home. He stated that several were ready to give land and means when it was under way. Eld. G. W. Ferrell gave some thoughts concerning such an institution. Bro. W. A. Jackson stated that the Cape Fear Conference was taking some steps toward an Orphanage Home.

RESOLUTION REGARDING ORPHANAGE HOME.

—The following resolution was discussed and adopted:

"We, the Convention, recommend that we at once take steps to locate and build an orphanage for the Free Will Baptist of North Carolina.

"We further recommend to our various conferences that they arrange at their next meeting, plans to put this matter before their people.

"We also recommend that they confer or report to the next State Convention as to how they will push this purpose to perfection.

"We further recommend that a copy of this report be read before the various conferences of the Free Will Baptist Church of North Carolina.

GEO. W. FERRELL, LUKE WETHERINGTON, J. E. DAVIS, W. J. BRAXTON." The following were appointed to represent the Orphanage to their various conferences: To Eastern—Eld. Luke Wetherington; to Western—Eld. J. E. Davis; to Central—Eld. J. T. Butler; to Cape Fear—Eld. J. F. Casey.

FOR THE REVISION OF THE DISCIPLINE.—The following resolutions were read, discussed and adopted:

"In view of the fact that there are imperfections in the book of discipline governing the Free Will Baptist Churches of North Carolina, therefore be it resolved,

- "1. That this Convention appoint a committee of nine, to be as follows: Two from each conference and a chairman appointed from this body.
- "2. Said committee shall in no way alter or change the Articles of Faith of the denomination.
- "3. Said committee shall from the different disciplines, prepare for the Free Will Baptist Church of North Carolina, one discipline to govern us as a denomination.
  - "4. The work of this committee shall be submitted to each conference for its adoption."

COMMITTEE ON CHANGE OF DISCIPLINE.—The following were appointed according to the demands of the above resolutions as the revising committee:

R. F. Pittman, Chairman. From Western Conference—L. T. Phillips and A. R. Flowers; Eastern—J. W. Alford and Prof. J. E. Sawyer; Central—L. L. Smith and W. J. Braxton; Cape Fear—J. F. Casey and W. A. Jackson.

The chairman of the committee on the revision of the discipline called the committee to meet at Kinston, N. C., on Thursday, the 24th of September, 1914.

Convention adjourned till 9:30 on Friday.

# Friday's Session

Convention met on Friday morning as per adjournment. Prayer by Eld. J. E. Davis.

RESOLUTION ON PEACE.—The following resolution on peace was adopted by the Convention:

"Resolved, That we, the Free Will Baptists of North Carolina, in convention assembled, endorse the action and hold up the hands of our national officials in the course they have pursued for the cause of peace in Mexico, and our neutrality in the European conflict.

"Be it further resolved, That we ask our pastors to comply with the proclamation of the President of the United States in asking our nation to observe the first Sunday in October as a day of prayer for peace in Europe."

FOR THE RELIEF OF THE MINISTRY.—The following resolutions in behalf of the ministry were adopted:

"Seeing that the churches in North Carolina are slow and backward in the support of their pastors, and further realizing that it will require a campaign to educate them to this very important work, therefore be it resolved,

"1. That this Convention do urge our people to take earnest thought concerning the same.

"2. That each church of the various conferences appoint a committee, whose duty it shall be to see each member, requesting him to assess himself for the monthly support of his pastor, according to his ability.

"3. That our people be encouraged to pledge and pay liberally so that the pastors may be able to give more

or full time, to study and pastoral work.

CONCERNING LOCATION OF ORPHANS' HOME.— Eld. G. W. Ferrell reports that Eld. B. B. Deans has offered to give a site of 400 acres of land near Middlesex, N. C. Eld. L. T. Phillips reports that there is a splendid site near Selma that could be obtained.

NEXT MEETING PLACE OF THE CONVENTION.— The Convention voted that the next State Convention meet with the church at Shady Grove, Sampson County, near Dunn, N. C., commencing on Tuesday before the third Sunday in September, A. D. 1915.

On motion R. F. Pittman preach the introductory sermon and on his failure E. T. Phillips.

MINUTES AND DISTRIBUTION.—On motion there be 1,000 minutes printed and the clerk distribute them to be best of his ability for our general good.

SALARY OF CLERK.—On motion the Recording Secretary or clerk be allowed \$15.00 for his work till the next Convention.

THANKS EXTENDED.—A vote of thanks was extended to the people of New Bern of the various denominations as well as our own people for the very liberal manner in which they cared for the Convention. Eld. L. L. Smith is appointed to preach at the church tonight. The Convention closed with prayer by Eld. N. D. Wiggs.

# CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

of the

NORTH CAROLINA STATE CONVENTION

of the

ORIGINAL FREE WILL BAPTIST CHURCH
OF JESUS CHRIST

Mission Board, the chairman of the Sunday School Board, the chairman of the Educational Board and one or more to be appointed by the Convention.

#### Article IV.

Section 1. The Home Mission Board shall be composed of one member from each conference or association belonging to the Convention. The Home Mission Board shall look after home missions in the state. It shall have the power to appoint state and district Evangelists and Missionaries.

The Vice-President shall be chairman of the Home Mission Board. The Board shall elect three members to act as Executive Committee to meet quarterly and attend to home mission work, with what aid the other members can give. The Board may collect and use all money belonging to the Convention intended for home missions, using such money within the bounds of the Convention. The Treasurer of the Convention shall be a member of the Home Mission Board and shall pay all orders when signed by the Chairman and Secretary of the Board, when there is home mission money with which to pay.

The Convention may at all times devise ways and means to increase the support of home missions.

Section 2. The duties of the Board of Education shall be to look after the educational interests of the church and young ministers.

Section 3. The duties of the Sunday School Board shall be to look after the interests of the Sunday School work in the state, and they may put a field-worker in the field to encourage and promote the Sunday School cause. They may devise ways and means for the support of said field worker. One duty of the field worker shall be to prepare a statistical table of the number of churches with and without Sunday Schools, with the number enrolled and any other data in the interest of Sunday Schools he may deem proper, and make an annual report of same to the Convention.

#### Article V.

Section 1. The Convention shall have no power that is not granted by this Constitution, which shall not be changed or altered only by a two-thirds vote of all members present in a regular session.

Section 2. This Convention shall have a right to say who shall become members, and shall have a right to exclude any member, conference or association from its fellowship for false doctrine, departing from the faith, or for non-Christian conduct.

Section 3. The Convention shall not admit for membership, any minister, church, conference or association that does not teach and practice the doctrine and usages of the Original Free Will Baptist Church.

The Convention shall provide itself with a seal, said seal to be placed on all official papers.

#### Article VI.

Section 1. The duties of delegates shall be to attend each session of the Convention, answer to roll call and serve on committees when appointed.

Section 2. Delegates shall have the right to speak on any subject before the Convention, by first addressing the President and obtaining the floor.

Section 3. Each delegate will be expected to bring a collection from the body he represents for Home Missions, Education and Convention purposes.

Delegates guilty of non-Christian conduct shall be expelled from the Convention and be reported to the body that sent them.

### Article VII.

Section 1. The following committees shall be appointed at each session of the Convention: Condition of Church in General, Temperance, Credentials, Ways and Means, and any other that from time to time may be needful.

Section 2. The order of business shall be:

- 1. Singing.
- 2. Prayer.
- 3. Introductory Sermon.
- 4. Recess.

- 5. Calling Convention to order by President, or in his absence, Vice-President, or Secretary.
- 6. Calling for corresponding letters, reading same, enrolling delegates and calling the roll.
  - 7. Report of Field Secretary.
  - 8. Appointment of Committees.
  - 9. Report of Executive Committee.
- 10. Election of New Executive Committee.
- 11. Report of State Board of Missions.
- 12. Election of New Board of Missions.
- 13. Report of Board of Education.
- 14. Election of New Educational Board.
- 15. Report of Sunday School Board.
- 16. Election of New Sunday School Board.
- 17. Election of Officers.
- 18. Unfinished business.
- 19. New business.
- 20. Miscellaneous.
- 21. Report of Committees.
- 22. Treasurer's report.
- 23. Convention report.
- 24. Adjournment.
