



#### · Report of Field Secretary.

I have written every church twice, setting forth the work of the Convention and the importance of each church representing either by letter or delegate, preferably by delegate, and with as large a donation as possibly. I have also written two letters to all the ministers setting forth the work of the Convention as it affects the eministry, and urging their attendance.

I have held several conferences with many of our leading men in connection with the discharge of the duties encumbered on the Field Secretary. In these conferences I always emphasized the necessity of Missions, Education, Stewardship, and the blessed work of the ministry.

Particularly have I emphasized the necessity of a complete surrender to fill time work in the gospel.

I have corresponded with E. S. Jelly, Fraklin Mines, Mich., a returned missionary, who desired to unite with out church and receive full time ministerial employment. I informed him that we could not give him full time ministerial employment without a more intimate acquaintance with him. However, I assured him of our interest in him and that our church would welcome him, and that if he could come down here and live among us for a while we could give him full time ministerial employment, provided he prove worthy.

I have written to other Associations, Conferences and Yearly Meetings, urging them to join our State Convention, and thus consolidate our efforts for the Cause of Christ as represented by the Free Will Baptist church.

I have done my best to discharge every duty encumbered upon this office. I have spent about 10 days of 10 hours each in this work.

I have prepared for your consideration the following statistical table in accordance with Article 3, Section 4, of the Constitution:

NOTE.—Bro. Beaman prepared a very elaborate statistical table, giving the number of churches in each county, number of members in each, stating the conference or association to which they belonged. He also gave in his report the population of each and every county.

In addition to this he gave a recapitulation of the valuation of church property, number of ministers attending, church represented, amount given

for, education, conventional purposes, orphanage, and miscellaneous items of every Convention from the one held at Shady Grove church in Sampson county in 1915 to the one held at Little Rock in 1922. During these years church property increased in valuation from reports given from \$68,750.00 to \$316,000.00; 24 ministers attended at Shady Grove and 52 at Little Rock (this year there are 84), 62 churches represented at Shady Grove and 98 at Little Rock. At Shady Grove there was contributed for Missions \$8.25, for education \$12.25, 12.25, for Convention \$53.85, total \$74.35. The orphanage received its first contribution at Reedy Branch \$343.34 in 1918. At Little Rock in 1923, there was contributed for missions \$47.00, for education \$206.25, for the Convention \$291.35, total contributed \$1761.35.

The total amount contributed for different purposes through the Convention during a period of eight years is as follows: For missions \$648.01, for education \$976.73, for Convention \$1294.00, for Orphanage \$1157.67, for miscellaneous items \$2926.61.

We trust the Field Secretary and the brotherhood will excuse us for abridging the very full and complete tabulation given by our Field Secretary, as we also give on another page reports from the different churches that were represented at the Convention.—Recording Secretary.

#### Report of Advertising Manager. (Adopted.)

I sent out posters in the first part of June to all our churches, advertising the eleventh annual session of our State Convention, with the request that they be placed in a conspicuous place in the church. We have also issued a Conventional number of the Baptist carrying pictures of the speakers of the Convention and other matter of vital interest.

We have written several news articles to some of the leading newspapers of the State, and in this way we have given the Convention a great deal of publicity.

We have spared no energy in giving the Convention the best advertisement it has ever heretofore received.

The expense account of the Advertising Manager was allowed \$31.38. Bros. J. E. Wooten, J. T. Beddard, and W. J. Braxton, were appointed a committee to confer with T. E. Beaman, Field Secretary, and ascertain what might be a fair allowance for his services and remunerate him in addition to his actual expenses, which the convention had just ordered paid.

#### Report of the Above Named Committee.

We have conferred with Bro. Beaman and learned from him that he will not accept anything from this convention as pay for his services as Field Secretaary, but if the Convention wishes to contribute anything to him as a token of appreciation that he will be pleased to accept it. We therefore recommend that this convention recompense him \$25.00 in addition to paying his actual expenses. The report was adopted.

Rev. J. L. Welch, of Nashville, Tenn., a delegate from the Cumberland Association, was received and made welcome. Rev. Welch made some very

timely and highly appreciative remarks, bearing upon the fellowship that the Tennessee brethren feel toward the brotherhood of North Carolina.

Rev. E. B. Joyner of the South Georgia Association being present was also received and made welcome.

#### MINUTES OF MEETING OF EXECUTIVE BOARD.

The Executive Board met in session in the Free Will Baptist church, Goldsboro, December 27-28, 1922. Members present, R. F. Pittman, President; E. C. Morris, J. W. Alford, W. B. Everett, C. M. Johnson.

On motion Thos. E. Beaman be elected Secretary.

On motion we accept the resignation of Prof. J. E. Sawyer, as a member of the Executive Board, and W. B. Everett be elected to fill the vacancy.

Petitions for the next session of the Convention were taken up. Reedy Branch and Union Chapel churches were the only two churches petitioning. The Board voted unanimously for the next session of the Convention to be held with Reedy Branch church.

On motion B. P. Parks be elected to preach the introductory sermon, and J. C. Griffin, alternate.

On motion Thos. E. Beaman be elected advertising manager.

On motion we elect the following as a program committee: R. F. Pittman, J. E. Sawyer, and W. B. Everett.

On motion the Executive Committee memoralize the General Conference of the neds of a treatise of the Free Will Baptist faith, asking the later body to appoint a committee to compile said treatise.

On motion we instruct the Publication Board appointed in the last session of the State Convention to gather such data and information as to them may be deemed advisable, and to formulate a plan by which a more adequate official oragn can be published, and to present same to the next session of the Convention.

On motion we appoint a committee of three to prepare a more conservative system of enrollment of delegates and ministers, and to put same in operation at the next session of the Convention.

The following were appointed said committee: Thos. E. Beaman, B. P. Parks, J. W. Alford.

On motion a committee of three be appointed to revise the Constitution. S. H. Styron, C. M. Johnson, E. C. Morris were appointed.

On motion we advise our churches, through the secretary to send their contributions to the convention this year in lump sum to be apportioned by a finance committee appointed by the Convention.

On motion the song book committee be instructed to secure a loan to defray expenses of the song book entitled "Hymns of Praise."

On motion we separate the college and orphanage campaign, and that all notes, pledges, bonds, etc., given prior to date, be divided between the orphanage and college, the orphanage receiving 20 per cent, and the college 20 per cent, the settlement to be made by the Orphanage and College Board.

On motion we endorse the stand taken by the Rev. N. D. Wiggs, pastor

of the Greenville church, with respect to the McAdams Evangelistic party.

On motion we adjourn till Thursday morning nine o'clock.

#### Thursday Morning, December 28.

On motion we request the editor and manager of the Printing Company not to publish any more more "Pleas for Help" from churches, and that they turn over to the secretary of Church Extension Board, Rev. E. C. Morris, same to be investigated by the said Board.

On motion we turn oever money now on hand for Young People's literature to the Committee on Young People's work to be used in publishing literature.

On motion we endorse the Ministerial course proposed by the Ministerial Association.

Motion to adjourn.

On motion we instruct the song book committee to make a proposition to the Ayden Printing Company to divide equally the profit derived from the sale of the second edition of our song book, "Hymns of Praise."

#### Meeting in Goldsboro August 20, 1923.

Motion to approve the action of the song book committee in making agreement with the Printing Company to finance and sell song books, the Company to have 75 per cent and State Convention 25 per cent of net income.

Ability to recall and describe to others. 3. Power to explain truth, to illustrate and apply. 4. To a deeper approxiation of deeper significance and wider relations until incorporated into experience.
  - 3. Rules for the teacher. (1) Prepare each lesson by fresh and thorough study. (2) Illustrate and throw light on the subject. (3) Make application.

Address by Rev. A. H. Outlaw on Foreign Missions.

Rev. A. H. Outlaw, chairman of the Foreign Mission Board made a telling and pointed address on the subject of Foreign Missions. He emphasized the command of the Savior to carry the Gospel to the known ends of the world. He showed conclusively that before we can receive the greatest degree of reward we must do foreign mission work, that we have too much neglected in the past. He showed that we were responsible. (1) From a point of reason. The call is world wide. 2. We should teach at home how to live and use our improvements. 3. We should help to eliminate darkness which leads to bad governments and low society. 4. From a social standpoint. Christ sent out the 70. He gives us his spirit to send out others, to have his mind. 5. It is the work of the church from a Bible standpoint. He refried to the examples of Paul, the good Samaritan. God's people are the salt that is to save the world.

Addrss by Rev. J. L. Welch of Nashville, Tenn.

Subject: God's Call to Us.

The speaker showed in very emphatic terms that God is trying to help us. God needs us and we need him. We should be mediums through which God would bring the world to repentance. We should pray over it and be conscientious. God has called his people to do a work and they should do something. He has arranged for the salvation of the world through human instrumentality, and for its salvation in no other way. He has called us into his service and we should get busy about our Father's business. It is too often the case that we run after shadows and get nowhere. What we need is to get right with God. We need what made the early apostles effective, convincing, and able to do a mighty work in his name, the baptism of his Holy Spirit.

#### Address by Prof. W. F. Walters, of Columbia, N. C.

Subject:- Education an Asset of Christianity.

This address was of the highest order showing the importance of education as a factor in the life of every individual. The speaker was eloquent, logical, and showed that he had given his subject more than a passing thought. He showed education as a curative agency for ignorance, bondage and fear. It gives us vision and if properly directed we see God in a clearer light. We see with it so much more of God and his wonderful workings. Above all the Spiritual should be the main issue in our culture. The need of a High School and College education is apparent to any reasoning mind. Here the foundation must be carefully and permanently laid. Youth is the most important period of life and while it is the most important it is the most dangerous. He showed clearly that Christian education was the

hope of the nation, the hope of the church, and the best equipment possible for each and every individual.

#### WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON,-Prof. Harper Speaks.

Convention met at 1:30. Praise and prayer by J. C. Griffin. Hon H. B. Prescott introduced to the Convention Prof. W A. Harper, President of Elon College, who came as a fraternal delegate from the Christian Church (O'Kellyite). The subject assigned to the speaker was "Christian Unity." The speaker in a very pleasant and forceful manner showed the great importance of Christian unity. It was the prayer of the Master just before he left the world, "that they may be one." He showed that division among church people had been a great hindrance to the success of the kingdom of God. He claimed that the war came on because denominations spent their time in looking after their own fences and let the world drift into a cruel war. His theme was that denominations need disarmament as well as nations. Said that 27,000,000 were growing up in paganism because church people would not come together as one and unite their forces against the powers of darkness. He told of some arguments that were used against Christian unity. He referred to methods that would not work. 1. The argument of history. 2. Lost by trying to unite. 3. Property and office. 4. Differences. He said there were and always would be differences, but there could be the best and the strongest unions in spite of differences. He said union could be accomplished by working together and loving each other as the Lord would have us do.

#### Address of M. B. Prescott.

Subject:-Needs of a College.

Prof. M. B. Prescott followed Dr. Harper and strongly emphasized the need of a college. He said there were three great institutions that are to function for the devlopment of our citiznship. These were the state, the church, and our institutions of learning. Of these the church is an arena through which we are to approach God. There are many things that we cannot tell, can not explain in any way whatever. Infinity we can not explain. But God has given man capacity to think. We can learn honesty, love and like attributes that partake of the nature of the Divine life. It is highly important that we learn the great fundamentals of life, and that we set these fundamentals in motion. The supreme need of a college is that these God given fundamentals may be aroused from their dormant condition and set in motion, that church, state and home life may properly function for the great good of all and that God, the creator may be glorified through human agencies. The purpose of a college is to make men and women useful agencies that they may reach the point where thyy can best serve their fellow man and honor God.

#### Address by W. B. Everett.

Subject:-Best Method of Financing the College.

The best method of financing the college was discussed by Rev. W. B. Everett. He stressed with earnestness the importance of putting the mat-

ter of financing the college before all of our people. We must get the pastors of the churches fully aroused to the great importance of the undertaking. Until we can get the various heads of the church work in the various communities fully arousd we are seriously handicapped. He told of his struggle in getting ministers enlisted in the work, and prayed that they might catch a vision and be so wrought up over the great necessity of the institution that through their great energies in its behalf, they would so enthuse their people till all our 30,0000 or more Free Will Baptist would rise up as one man and say with Nehetniah, "Let us rise up and build." There is no use to try to convince anybody that we need the college.

All who can see realize that we need the institution and that we need it just now. We honestly believe that if the pastors and leaders in the various communities would organize and go to the task as they should, the administration building at least could be completed within thirty days. As financial agent he told how earnestly he had thrown his life into the work and he assured us that the work would go forward, but he urged the supreme effort of a unitd people to aid him in the most important and far reaching work that now lies befor eour people May those who have given notes pay them as early as possible and may thousands of dollars be forth coming through the efforts of those who profess to love our cause.

#### Vote of Thanks Tendered Dr. Harper.

A rising vote of thanks was tendered Dr. W. A. Harper for his splendid address on Christian Unity, and at the same time he was received and welcomed as a fraternal delegaate from the North Carolina (Okellyite) Christian Conference.

Gilbert Cox spoke five minutes on Christian education, emphasizing the importance of being trained and fitted by Jehovah.

#### Report of Orphanage Board. (Adopted.)

The treasurer of the Free Will Baptist Orphanage, located at Middlesex, N. C., makes the following annual report as to the financial standing of the Orphanage:

# CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS OF THE NORTH CAROLINA STATE CONVENTION OF THE ORIGINAL FREE WILL BAPTIST CHURCH OF JESUS CHRIST.

#### PREAMBLE.

We, the Original Free Will Baptist of North Carolina, assembled, in order to advance, promote and increase the cause of Jesus Christ and to increase unity and develop the work, do establish and ordain this Constitution for the North Carolina State Convention.

#### CONSTITUTION.

#### Article I.

This assembly shal be known as the North Carolina State Convention of the Original Free Will Baptist church of Jesus Christ.

#### Article II.

Section 1. The officers of the Convention shall be President, Vice-President, Recording Secretary, Field Secretary, Treasurer, Executive Committee, a State Board of Missions, a State Board of Education, and a State Board of Sunday Schools, elected by the Convention, two each year to serve a period of two years:

Sec. 2. The Convention shall be composed of all the ordained and licensed ministers in good standing and holding membership in the conferences or associations belonging to the Convention, and teaching no other doctring than that taught by the Original Free Will Bantist, one delegate from each church in good standing, one delegate from each Union Meeting, and one from each conference or association for every one thousand members or fraction thereof.

Article M. Con. of Large

Section 1. It shall be the duty of the President to preside over each session, preserve order, govern the body according to established parliamentary usage and appoint all committees, unless otherwise provided for by the Convention.

Sec. 2. The duties of the Vice-President shall be the duties of the President when that officer is not present.

Sec. 3. The duties of the Recording Secretary shall be to keep an accurate record of the transactions of the Convention and preserve the same, to keep all valuable documents of the Convention and surrender the same to his successor in office when ordered to do so by the Convention.

Sec. 4. The duties of the Field Secretary shall be to correspond with those desirous of knowing anything pertaining to the work of the Convention. He shall also from year to year prepare a statistical table showing the increase in membership, church property and other data pertaining to the work of the church. He shall read same at each session of the annual Convention, and shall refer the same to the Recording Secretary for record.

Sec. 5. The duties of the Treasurer shall be to keep all money belong- (4) ing to the Convention and pay out same only by order of the Convention, we

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when said order is signed by the President and Secretary, except money raised for State Missions or Sunday School Boards respectively, when said ender is signed by chairman of said Board.

Sec. 6. The duties of the Executive Committee shall be the duties of the Convention when not in session; said committee shall have the power to call extra sessions when in Wis judgment such sessions become necessary; and committee shall have power to suspend any officer of the Convention when that body is not in session and said officer proves a failure in his or their official duties or prove to be non-Christian in his work, or detrimental to the cause of Christ, and appoint others to fill vacancies and any other vacancy which may occur from various causes and all officers thus appointed shall hold office till next regular Convention. The Executive Committee shall be composed of the President of the Convention, the grainman shall be composed of the Chairman of the Sunday School Board, the chairman of the Educational Board and one or more to be appointed by the Convention.

Sec 1. The State Mission Board shall be composed of one member from each Conference or Association belorging to the Convention. The State Mission Board shall look after the State Missions in the state. It shall have the power to appoint state and district Evangelists and Missionaries. The Vice President shall be chairman of the State Mission Board. The Board shall elect three members to act as Executive Committee to meet quarterly and attend to State Mission, work with what aid the other members can give. The Board may collect and use all money belonging to the Convention intended for State Missions, using such money within the bounds of the Convention. The Treasurer of the Convention shall be a member of the State Mission. Board and shall pay orders when signed by the Chairman and Secretary of the Board, when there is State Mission money with which to pay. The Convention may at all times devise ways and means to increase the support of State Missions.

Sec. 2.—The duties of the Board of Education shall be to look after the educational interests-of-the church-and-young-ministers.

Sec. 3. The duties of the Sunday School Board shall be to look after the interests of the Sunday School work in the state; and they may put a field worker in the field to encourage and promote the Sunday School cause. They may devise ways and means for the support of said-field worker. One duty of the field worker shall be to prepare a statistical table of the number on rolled and any other data in the interest of Sunday schools he may deem proper, and make an appual report of same to the Convention.

Section 1. The Convention shall have no power that is not granted by this Constitution, which shall not be changed or altered only by a two-thirds vote of all members present in a regular session. All convention are session. Sec. 2. This Convention shall have a right to say who shall become

Sec. 2. This convention shall have a right to educate any member, conference or association from its fellowship for false doctrines, departing from faith, or for non-Christian conduct:

Sec. 3. The Convention shall not admit for membership any minister, church or conference or association that does not teach and practice the doctrine and usage of the Original Free Will Baptist church.

Sec. 4. The Convention shall provide itself with a seal, said seal to be

placed on all official papers.

Sec. 5. Amendments to this Constitution and By-Laws shall be effected only by a two-thirds vote of this Convention. Said amendments shall be on the table at lease twelve hours before the vote is taken.

#### Article VI

Sec. 1. The duties of delegates shall be to attend each session of the Convention, answer to roll and serve on committees when appointed.

Sec. 2. Delegates shall have the right to speak on any subject before the Convention, by first addressing the President and obtaining the floor

Sec. 3.—Each dd egate will be expected to bring a collection from the body he represents for State Missione, Ethication and Convention purposes. Delegates guilty of non-Christian conduct shall be expelled from the Convention and be reported to the body that sent them.

#### Article VII.

Section 1. It shall be the duty of all churches to darke their reports to the State, Convention by sending their church letters with their contributions to the Secretary on or before the first day of September of each year.

#### Article VIII.

Secttion 1. The following committees shall be appointed at each session of the Convention: Condition of church in general. Temperance, Credentials, Ways, and Means, and any other that from time to time may be needful.

Section 2. The order of business shall be:

  - 9. Report of Executive Committee.
  - 10. Election of New Committees.
  - 11. Report of State Board of Missions.
  - 12. I lection of New Board of Missions.
  - 13. Report of Board of Education.

  - 15. Report of Sunday School Board.




