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

## **PROCEEDINGS**

The Twenty-Third Annual Session of the State Convention of the Free Will Baptist of North Carolina, convened with the church of Piney Grove, Pitt County, on September 11, 12, 13, 1935, at 10:30 A. M. Song, "I Need Jesus" was sung by the congregation. Eld. C. J. Harris introduced Eld. J. H. Worley of Selma, N. C., who preached the introductory sermon. Text: Acts. 4:20, "For we can but speak the things which we have seen and heard." The Address of Welcome was delivered by Rev. R. N. Hinnant of Micro, N. C. who is pastor of the local church. The response was by Rev. W. A. Hales of Wilson, N. C. Song 69, "Help Somebody Just Now" was sung. The morning session closed with a prayer and benediction by Rev. W. E. Andesron of Durham, N. C.

#### WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON

Devotions were led by Rev. G. C. Joyner, pastor of Goldsboro church. Invocation was led by Rev. W. L. Moretz of the Buncombe County Association. A duet was sung by G. C. Joyner and W. K. Jordan. "I want to live Closer to Jesus."

#### ADDRESS OF THE PRESIDENT

Rev. S. H. Styron, president of the convention, who has held this office for about eighteen years, addressed the body, showing the fallacy of those who would denounce the body. He stated that the convention had been the means of drawing the cords of love and friendship tighter than ever before, extending to the brethren in even remote states. It was the mother of our Orphanage Home to which we point with pride, despite destructive criticism. The Convention has stood for the advancement of all our organizations that are for the betterment of our people and for the advancement of the kingdom of our Master. It is an institution of which all loyal members of our church in North Carolina should be proud. His closing remarks were something very nearly like this: "The State Convention to us is a school to which we come once a year to gain spiritual knowledge; and as a theatre to which we come for Spiritual entertainment; and we hope as the hands travel around the clock that we will keep the State Convention till Jesus comes again."

## RECOMMENDATIONS OF FOREIGN MISSION SECRETARY AND TREASURER (ADOPTED)

Your secretary and treasurer desires to make the following recommendations for the convention year 1935-1936.

- 1. That the office of Secretary-Treasurer of the Foreign Mission department of the North Carolina State Convention be continued. That he be required to deposit all funds in a bank with interest, and that all funds be turned over to the Foreign Mission Sec. and Treasurer of the General Conference at the end of the State Convention year. It is understood that the Foreign Missionary Sec. and Treasurer of the General Conference may call upon the Sec. Treasurer of the Foreign Mission Department of the N. C. State Convention at any time that the funds are needed to carry on the work in the Foreign Field.
- 2. That there shall be no salaries or anything except the actual expense of the collection of the Mission funds paid out of said funds. It is understood that the Sec-Treasurer be empowered to deduct from the collected funds money for postage to write pastors, churches individuals etc., asking for money from his department for postage to mail receipts for any funds collected, and for postage to mail monthly reports and regular articles for the Free Will Baptist.
- 3. That we set a goal of \$1,000 to be raised during the year, and that no one shall be satisfied until we shall have passed that goal.
- 4. That each pastor be urged to preach at least one sermon on Foreign Missions in each of their churches and take an offering for this great cause.
- 5. That all conferences, associations, union meetings, churches, and all other organizations and individuals be urged to make their contributions through the N. C. State Convention Foreign Mission Department.
- 6. That each pastor is urged to support Foreign Mission work and that they urge every member of their churches to fully support the cause with their prayers and substance.
- 7. That all of our church auxiliaries and organizations support Foreign Mission work, making contributions for the same as often as possible.

Reports of the Executive Meetings of the State Convention were read and accepted by the body as follows:

# MEETING OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF THE NORTH CAROLINA STATE CONVENTION

The Executive Committee of the North Carolina Free Will Baptist State Convention met in the F. W. B. Church in the city of Goldsboro on Thursday, January 10, 1935 at 10 o'clock A. M.

The meeting was called to order by Rev. J. C. Griffin, Vice President of the State Convention. Prayer was offered by Rev. J. H. Worley of Selma, N. C.

A letter was read from Rev. S. H. Styron, president of the Convention, stating his inability to be present on account of illness; he also stated that he had appointed J. H. Worley to act as his proxy in the meeting.

Those of the committee that were present were as follows: J. C. Griffin, Vice President; R. B. Spencer, Field Secretary; W. B. Crumpler, Treasurer; E. T. Phillips, Recording Secretary; D. W. Alexander, Chairman of Board of Finance; N. D. Wiggs, Chairman Board of Church Extension; L. H. Wetherington of Home Mission Board; Henry Melvin, Board of Audit; D. W. Parker, School Board; R. L. Little Orphanage Board.

A letter was read from Rev. W. L. Moretz concerning the Buncombe County Association, which was referred to the Credential Committee of the State Convention.

A petition for the next annual session of the Convention was received from Piney Grove Church in Pitt County; and it was ordered by the Executive Committee, that the next session of the convention convene with said church on Wednesday after the Second Sunday in September 11th, 1935 at 10 o'clock A, M.

Rev. J. H. Worley was appointed to preach the introductory sermon at the next Annual Session.

The Program Committee for the next annual session was appointed as follows: E. T. Phillips, Chairman, D. W. Alexander, and Mrs. J. H. Oglesby.

Rev. L. B. Manning was made Publicity Agent.

Through an oversight or error the name of Rev. Henry Melvin was left out of the last year's convention minutes as a member of the Board of Finance; he is now therefore indentified with the Board.

The resignation of Rev. J. W. Alford as chairman of the Orphanage was read and accepted; and Bro. H. C. Wood of Cove City was chosen to fill the unexpired term of J. W. Alford, which expires in 1938.

Rev. R. B. Spencer was chosen to succeed Rev. E. C. Gaskill on the Board of Audit. Rev. Henry Melvin was made chairman of auditing Board, and Rev. M. E. Tyson was made the third member of the Board of Audit.

Bro. W. B. Crumpler, treasurer of the Convention made his report.

The question of the \$1.00 per month from each of the churches for the Bible School at Smithfield was settled by definitely deciding to use this money to pay on the building debt and to help to pay operating expenses of the school such as teacher's salary etc.

# MEETING OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD OF THE NORTH CAROLINA STATE CONVENTION

The meeting was held in the Free Will Baptist Church in the town of Goldsboro on May 22, 1935, convening at 10:00 o'clock A. M. Those present were S. H. Styron, President; J. C. Griffin, Vice President; E. T. Phillips, Secretary; W. B. Crumpler, Treasurer; L. H. Wetherington, D. W. Alexander, Dr. M. Hinnant.

After prayer by Dr. Hinnant the President, S. H. Styron, stated that the main object of the meeting was to fill the vacancies on the Board caused by the resignation of Bro. R. L. Little and the death of Bro. D. W. Parker, who was also a member of the Orphanage and the Smithfield School Boards.

Bro. Levi Hill was chosen to fill the vacancy on the Orphanage Board, caused by the resignation of Bro. R. L. Little, whose term expires in 1937.

Bro. C. A. Fitzgerld of Micro was chosen to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Bro. D. W. Parker on the Orphanage Board, whose term expires in 1939.

Bro. W. C. Sasser of Selma was chosen to fill the vacancy on the School Board occasioned by the death of Bro. D. W. Parker.

The Secretary was instructed to write Bros. Hill, Fitzgerald, and Sasser, notifying them of their election to fill the vacancies as stated above.

The secretary was instructed to write a letter of condolence to Sister D. W. Parker of Smithfield regarding the loss of her husband.

On motion we pay \$50.00 on Building and Loan assessment at Smithfield, N. C., and that \$25.00 be taken from General Fund to be paid on Prof. J. P. Barrow's salary.

On motion a vote of thanks be tendered to Bro. R. L. Little of Grimesland for the very efficient service he has rendered to the Orphanage during his many years of faithful, untiring work.

On motion a vote of thanks be returned to Elder E. T. Phillips of Ayden, N. C., for his many years of faithful service for the Free Will Baptist cause as Editor of the Free Will Baptist, and also the Free Will Baptist Sunday School literature for a period of thirty-five years.

The meeting adjourned with prayer by G. C. Joyner, pastor of the church in Goldsboro, N. C.

Because of the absence of Rev. D. A. Windham, his place on the program was ordered filled by Rev. Marshall Joyner in the evening service.

The Wednesday Afternoon Session came to a close at 3:30.

## EVENING SERVICE ON WEDNESDAY \_\_\_\_ \_

At 7:45 devotional services were conducted by Rev. Marshall Joyner. Rev. R. B. Spencer was present and preached from a text found in Acts 4:8., which related to the apostles being brought into court for their act of healing the impotent man. At the beginning of the present administration the indebtedness of the Institution, according to records and statements filed with us, was \$10,834.38. This indebtedness has been reduced in the amount of \$2,533.54, (\$2,476.67 by cash and \$56.87 by discount) leaving a balance on old accounts made prior to February 1, 1935.

The total indebtedness of the Institution as of September 10, 1935 is \$9,299.27 of which 998.42 has been incurred since February 1, 1935. The amount incurred since February 1, 1935 is charged as follows:

There are 85 children in the Home at this date. We have admitted into the home 14 children during the year, and discharged 13.

The health conditions have been extremely good, very little sickness. The Dr. has called to the Home during my administration only about 4 times and 2 of those were to see patients stricken with appendicitis.

The Orphanage suffered a great loss in the death of one of its members of the Board of Trustees, D. W. Parker, by death. Parker has meant much to the Institution. We were fortunate in getting Bro. C. A. Fitzgerald to fill his unexpired term. We feel sure that it will be a pleasure to work with Bro. Fitzgerald.

The report of the Orphanage Board was adopted.

A duet was sung by Revs. G. C. Joyner and W. K. Jordan, "I Live for Him who Died for Me."

Bro. Hinnant, chairman of the Orphanage Board, gave a rehearsal of

the workings of the Orphanage under the supervision of Rev. M. E. Tyson, which was very commendatory from every angle of his service.

Rev. Tyson read a report of the financial standing of the Home which is recorded in the minutes of this session of the Convention.

Letter from Mrs. Frazier of Nashville, Tenn.

A letter was read from Mrs. J. E. Frazier of Nashville, Tenn which is in part as follows: "We had a great convention of Woman's Auxiliary work in Tennessee. The Orphanage was presented to our people as never before; and such a hearty reception as was given the appeal has not been manifested here before. Each society pledged to make a gift to the Orphanage. Some have their quoto ready to mail; others are working to have theirs ready before cold weather. Several associations are planning to adopt a child. One I understand has already written Bro. Tyson. Praise God for our Free Will Baptist people." From the way sister Frazier writes there is every indication that several of the associations in Tennesee are willing and ready to do a great work for our Orphan Home at Middlesex. Sister Frazier writes that a collection was taken for the Orphanage amounting to over \$10.00 and she believes that enough will be added to that to buy shades for all the windows at the Orphanage.

## RESOLUTION (Adopted)

Having realized the splendid work that the ladies of our church are doing for the Orphanage, I hereby recommend that this Convention provide at least three representative ladies, shall work with the Orphanage Board in the furtherance of the cause of the institution.

An offering was taken for the Orphanage just before the 11 o'clock service amounting to \$100.00.

The song service was conducted by Rev. Henry Melvin, after which he introduced to the Convention Rev. Thomas H. Willey of Durham and former missionary to South America, who brought the message of the hour. He spoke of the need of carrying Christ to the people of the Foreign Field. He gave three reasons why he believed in foreign missions:

- 1. God had only one Son and he gave him a missionary, Read John 3:16.
- 2. Christ's commission to his followers to go into all the world.
- 3. Christ is coming back again. .

Song 38 was sung, "Into all the World."

#### REPORT OF SUPERANNUATION BOARD (Adopted)

We, your Board, offer the following report: Through the aid of the Woman's Auxiliary work of the State, your Board has responed to every call that has come to us the best we could with the amount of funds avail-

able. We can give no accurate report of what has been done, as the chairman of the Board is not present.

## By the Board.

Through a strong effort of Bro. George Dail of Ayden the collection for the Orphanage was raised from some over \$50.00 to the \$100.00 as has been stated before. Of course he had some able assistants.

The Convention was called off for dinner. Benediction by Rev. A. E. Rouse.

## THURSDAY AFTERNOON

Convention reassembled by singing hymn No. 37, "I shall see the King.". Song, "I shall be ready", was led by Rev. R. P. Harris. The devotional exercises were conducted by Rev. W. A. Dail. Scripture lesson read was the 27 Psalm. Prayer was offered by Bro. W. L. Strickland of Hamlet, N. C.

An address was delivered by Rev. M. E. Tyson. Subject: The Orphanage as I see it.

The superintendent of the Home gave a very vivid picture of what was being done at the Home. He told about the destructive criticism that had been vent upon Rev. Bennett, his predecessor, and also upon himself. He said that while much destructive criticism had been heaped upon him and individuals had sought to do him hurt and bring reproach upon the Home, he still endeavored by the help of God to go forward in the great work to which he had been called. He plead for the support of the Home by the brotherhood at large. Defamers had sought to blacken his record as they had that of Bro. Bennett, who had done a noble work for the Home. But as we are commanded not to return evil for evil nor railing for railing, he knew of no course to follow but the teaching of the Master, and he plead with the audience to remember the eighty five children who had to be fed three times a day, clothed and sheltered and given instruction that would make them grow up to be better men and women than the mass of humanity at the present day.

Rev. J. P. Barrow made some remarks regarding the outlook of the Educational movements in the F. W. B. Church. He said that no chain was stronger than the weakest link in the chain and that at present the educational problem presented to him but a gloomy aspect, though he was laboring and praying for a brighter day among our people.

Rev. W. B. Everett of the Eastern Conference made a brief talk in which he suggested that a number of laymen in our church get together and start a movement for a school as it seemed that the ministers so far had failed to put on any program that had been successful.

# RESOLUTIONS REGARDING J. P. BARROW AND THE SMITHFIELD BIBLE SCHOOL (Adopted)

Realizing that we are under obligations to Bro. Jesse P. Barrow for salary and also to the Building and Loan Association of Smithfield in that

we have officially purchased the Smithfield Free Will Baptist church; Therefore.

- 1. Be it resolved that we urge our churches to make an honest effort to raise \$1.00 per month for the Building and Loan Association, as requested by the Convention.
- 2. That we ask all of our churches to take a special offering during October and November for the payment of Bro. Barrow's salary; and the same be sent to Bro. W. B. Crumpler, Treasurer, at Goldsboro, N. C., with instructions that the amounts be forwarded to Bro. Barrow.

## REPORT OF MISS SALLY COX, SEC. OF THE STATE LEAGUE WORK.

This information has been compiled purposely for you who are not acquainted with the Christian activities of the youth of our Church in North Carolina. This organization is called the F. W. B. League and we have a state organization. This year was our ninth annual State Convention and it was held with Edgemont Church, Durham. In this Convention this year we celebrated our 20th Anniversary of League organization which St. Mary's Church, New Bern, was its birthplace and Mrs. E. Lupton of New Bern was its promoter with the assistance of some of her devoted helpers. That is the reason our posters announcing this Convention had on it "Let's Go to China." Our program Committee arranged a most inspiring Missionary Program. We want our State Convention of churches to know that we are whole heartedly foreign Missionary spirit filled. We voted in this Convention to send \$50.00 to our Gen. F. M. Treasurer.

#### RESOLUTION (Adopted)

Be it enacted that the Convention go on record as endorsing the project of the State Convention of the F. W. B. League in establishing A Young People's Camp. This camp is to be held annually, and for the purpose of providing a place of training in League and Sunday School work for the youth of our church.

## REPORT OF THE F. W. B. PUBLISHING HOUSE

Owing to Bro. C. K. Dunn, Manager of the Company, not being present, Rev. I. J. Blackwelder, Editor of the Free Will Baptist, was called upon to make a report. Rev. Blackwelder stated that he was not familiar enough with the general management of the Company to make anything like a definite report concerning the business of the company. He could say however, that we have a very complete outfit, valued at several thousand dollars with comparatively little debt attached. Many of our people, from time to time, have visited the plant and have seen its splending workings under the management of Bro. Dunn. Our office will compare favorable with any in Eastern Carolina or elsewhere. Bro. Dunn is to be complimented for his very efficient and able management.

Bro. Blackwelder spoke of his being primarily connected with the Free Will Baptist as Editor. He is desirous of making the paper better as time marches on. He insisted upon the brethren and sisters writing for the paper and making their articles pointed, omitting useless statistics from union meetings and other meeting reports. Give the gist of what was done and avoid usless summarizings.

E. T. Phillips stated that his place as editor had been filled by Bro. Blackwelder, a man who possessed ability, was a consecrated, devout lover of truth and justice, and one whom we are persuaded will spare no pains in making the paper what most of us might desire— a Christian magazine that should win the favor of God and man. He stated that he was still connected with the paper as Editor-Emeritus, that the company was caring for him in a limited way for which he was very thankful, was continually writing for the paper and still editing a portion of the Sunday School Literature. God and the people had been good to him for the past thirty five years that he had been closely allied with the work of the office, for which he was very thankful.

## REPORT OF LADIES AUXILIARY WORK (Adopted)

Owing to the illness of Mrs J. I. Watson, whose name appeared on the program to report the workings of the Ladies Auxiliary work in the state, Mrs. S. K. Jackson of Ayden, was called upon to fill this vacancy, which she did in a very acceptable manner as follows:

"It is practically impossible to give an accurate report, but I will try to give a few estimates of the work. Our records show only four conferences, in our state in which the Woman's Auxiliary Work has been crganized into conventions: The Eastern, Western, Central, and Cape Fear Conferences. As nearly as we can obtain from our minutes, there are one hundred and two local societies in these conferences, composed of 1, 683 members.

I am sure that there are more local units than we have on record. The total amount raised during the year is \$6,083,84, and it has been used for various purposes, the Orphanage, Superannuation, Education and for local purposes.

Most of the societies have found the Year Book of Programs very interesting and helpful. A few have study classes using as their subjects: Christian Stewardship, Home and Foreign Missions, and Bible characters.

The week prior to Easter was observed by most local societies as a week of prayer as prearranged in our Book of Programs.

Each member is supposed to pay thirty cents annually—district, state and national dues. Perhaps a few of these societies did not get their dues paid, but a large percentage did.

At our last State Auxiliary Convention, there were a few changes made in the offices. By referring to your Free Will Baptist paper of Aug. 14, you will find Mrs. Barber's report and note who our officers and directors are for the year. You who read Mrs. T. B. Mellette's article in the July issue of the Baptist were glad to learn that we now have a National Auxiliary Convention, with a very capable group of officers. Due to our Mrs. Alice E. Lupton being president, and Mrs. Fannie Polston of Nashville, Tenn., being Field Organizer; the women of our denomination are vitally interested in the progress of our church, and we are glad to be organized in one large body. We feel sure that the sisters in the Western part of our state have local organizations, but as yet they have not reported one organized convention. We hope they will soon be organized and represent in our State Auxiliary Convention.

Our first objective is soul-winning; and we hope that the ensuing year will find us more dilligently at work."

This season of testimony was surely a real feast for those who loved to bear testimony for Jesus.

## CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS OF THE NORTH CAROLINA STATE CONVENTION OF THE ORIGINAL FREE WILL BAPTIST CHURCH.

#### PREAMBLE

We, the Original Free Will Baptists of North Carolina, assembled in order to advance, promote and increase the cause of Jesus Christ, do establish and ordain this Constitution and these By-Laws.

## CONSTITUTION Article I.

Section 1. This assembly shall be known as the North Carolina State Convention of the Original Free Will Baptist church of Jesus Christ.

## Article II.

Section 1. The officers of the Convention shall be President, Vice-President, Recording Secretary, Field Secretary, Treasurer and Executive Board.

Section 2. The Convention shall be composed of all the ordained ministers belonging to the Convention; one delegate from each church in good standing; one delegate from each Union Meeting, Conference and Association in good standing for every one thousand members or a fraction thereof.

## **BY-LAWS**

## Article I.

Section 1. It shall be the duty of the President to preside over each session, preserve order, govern the body according to established parliamentary usage and appoint all temporary committees. He shall have the power to declare any office of the Convention vacant, temporarily, subject to the approval of the Executive Committee.

Section 2. The duties of the Vice-President shall be the duties of the President when that officer is not present.

Section 3. The Recording secretary shall keep an accurate record of the transactions of the Convention and preserve the same, keep all valuable documents and surrender the same to his successor in office.

Section 4. The Field Secretary shall have charge of preparing statistical tables showing the increase or decrease in membership, church property, etc., and read at each session of the Annual Convention and refer same to the Recording Secretary for permanent record. He shall have charge of placing all the work of the Convention before the various Conferences and Associations. Also the Field work in general.

Section 5. All money belonging to the Convention shall be kept by the Treasurer and paid out by him only by order of the Convention. Bills not having been voted to be paid either by the Convention or its Executive Board must be signed by the President and Recording Secretary before being paid by him.

Section 6. The work of the Executive Board shall be that of the Convention when the Convention is not in session and to call extra sessions when such becomes necessary. It shall have the authority to suspend any officer of the Convention when he or she proves a failure in official duties.

proves non-Christian in official or any other work or detrimental to the cause of Christ and appoint others to fill the vacancy; also fill vacancies made by any other cause. Officers thus appointed shall hold office until the next regular session of the Convention. This Board shall be composed of the President, Recording Secretary, Field Secretary, Treasurer and Chairman of all standing boards of the Convention.

Section 7. The President and Field Secretary of the Convention shall be ex-officio members of all Boards.

#### Article II.

Section 1. The method of the Convention shall be to departmentalize the work and place at the head of each department a Board which shall be governed by certain rules adopted by the Convention.

Section 2. Delegates from churches, Union Meetings, Conferences and Associations shall answer to roll calls and serve in whatever capacity they may be called upon by the Convention. They shall have the right to speak on any subject before the Convention by first addressing the President and obtaining the floor.

## Article III.

The following named Boards shall be elected in the following manner:

Section 1. Orphanage Board. The Board of Trustees for the management and control of the Free Will Baptist Orphan Home at Middlesex, N. C., shall be composed of five members elected for a period of five years; the office of one member expiring each year and another elected by the Convention to fill the vacancy.

Section 2. Board of Finance. The Board of Finance shall be composed of six members elected for a term of three years with two members retiring each years and others elected by th Convention to fill the vacancy.

Section 3. Board of Superannuation. The Board of Superannuation shall be composed of six members elected for a term of three years with two members retiring each year and others elected by the Convention to fill the vacancy.

Section 4. Board of Missions. The Board of Missions shall be composed of six members elected for a term of two years with three members retiring each year and others elected by the Convention to fill the vacancy.

Section 5. Church Extension Board. The Church Extension Board shall be composed of five members retiring each year and others elected by the Convention to fill the vacancy.

Section 6. Board of Auditors. The Board of Auditors shall be composed of two members elected annually.

Section 7. Board of Surveyors. The Board of Surveyors shall be composed of three members elected annually.

## AMENDMENTS.

This Constitutes and these By-Laws shall not be changed or altered only by a two-thirds vote of members present in a regular session. All amendments shall lie on the table not less than six hours prior to adoption and shall during that time be read not less than twice in open Convention.
