



PROCEEDINGS

The twenty-fifth annual session of the North Carolina State Association of Free Will Baptists met with the St. Marys Church in Wilson County, N. C. on Wednesday September 15, 1937 for a two day session.

Rev. Henry Melvin delivered the President's message, calling attention to the necessity of cooperating with him in order to complete the business of the Association as outlined in the schedule. He reminded the Association of some of our problems to be solved as a church, such as the Orphanage, temperance, education, mission, evangelism, and Christian unity. Prayer by Rev. George D. Dunbar of Tennessee.

A telegram from Rev. and Mrs. Willey was read to the Association: "On the eve of our sailing we are thinking of you and covet earnestly your prayers for our success as your foreign ambasadors to Panama."

The chair suspended business of the Association for the 11:15 A. M. song service. Hymn no. 159 was sung by the congregation and Mrs. Georgie Frost Barnes sang a solo "One of God's Days." The speaker of the hour was introduced by the President and Rev. Clifton Rice preached the Introductory Sermon. He used as his subject "Prevented by Fears," using as a scripture basis 1 Kings chapters 16-20. Song no. 17 was sung and benediction by Rev. J. H. Worley.

AFTERNOON SESSION

After lunch the Association reassembled and songs no. 176 and 177 were sung. Rev. C. J. Harris conducted the devotions, speaking on the doctrine of "Sanctification." Song no. 192 was sung and prayer by Rev. R. B. Spencer. Rev. R. P. Harris sang "I won't Have to Cross Jordan Alone."

The chair entered into the business of the Association, calling for the reports of the Home Mission Board which was approved.

Report: We have not been able to do any definite mission work. We have endeavored to locate several Free Will Baptists in the city of Raleigh. The prospects are good for a church there, but it will take some time to develop this project.

We have on hand \$76.76. We need more funds to operate a good Home Mission Programme.

REPORT OF THE FIELD SECRETARY (Sept. 1936 to Sept. 1937)

As Field Secretary I wish to make the following annual report of the field work for the year just closing to this session of the State Association.

First. The Young People's League organization, under the leadership of the Field Secretaries, Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Bowen, has made splendid progress during the year. Quite a large number of new leagues have been organized since last year by these field workers. Accordingly, several hundred of the young girls and boys in the various churches and church communities have become members of the League, and are wielding a Christian influence in their communities. The growth is commendable, and it is hoped that even greater propress will be made during the coming year. Mr. and Mrs. Bowen deserve praise for their efficient work with the young people.

Second. The Pastors' Conference which was held in August at Davis Church is a step toward unity and co-operation in the work. It was a week of study, class work, lectures, sermons and discussions of important church matters. Several ministers were on the program to teach while others delivered lectures and sermons. The work was splendid, and those who attended the conference enjoyed the fellowship with the brethren. Favorable reports were given of the work, and the idea is to make the Pastors' Conference an annual affair. The people of Davis Church and community entertained the conference well, and the preachers felt a hearty welcome in their homes during the week of the conference. In several ways the meeting was a great success.

Third. In the Field of Missions, both home and foreign, we are glad to report that the work is rapidly growing, and the reports of many churches show a decided increase of interest and money raised for these two fields of work over last year's record. Greater support is being given Miss Barnard in India, and according to a recent report from Rev. I. J. Blackwelder, the National Secretary of Foreign Missions, she is now at work establishing an independent mission work for our church. During the last few months special supplies and additional money have been raised, and sent to Rev. and Mrs. Thomas H. Willey who are beginning a mission work in Panama. It is encouraging to note that the churches as a whole in the state are becoming more interested in missions, and are willing to do their part toward supporting the great cause. The financial increase for foreign missions this year over what was raised for last

year, according to reports, is over five hundred dollars, or better than five hundred percent gain.

Fourth. With regard to more adequate statistics of our church work, I am glad to state that the people are becoming more concerned about the need of keeping better records. The Federal Government, through the Bureau of the census, sent out this year to several hundred churches the Standard Statistical report blank for the church clerks to fill out as their report, and mail to Washington City. Also the *Baptist* carried in June 23 and 30 issues a copy of this report for general information to the church people. The church letters which were recently sent to 227 churches contain this statistical blank form for the church clerks reports to the State Association. Since I was unable to get sufficient data from the minutes of the different conferences and associations for a statistical report, the table is not given in this report.

Report of Young Peoples' Work (Adopted)

To the North Carolina State Association of Free Will Baptists I make this report:

The eleventh annual session of the N. C. State League Convention met in Elizabeth City July 3, 4, 1937. We want to report the following facts about this convention:

There were a total of 78 leagues represented at the convention; having only 24 at the 1936 convention. We had an increase of 54 new leagues. About 50 of these 78 leagues were organized during the past year. Seniors, 19; Adults, 12; Intermediates, 23; Juniors, 23; Story Hour, 1.

The 78 leagues which represented had an approximate enrollment of 1600; this being about half of the entire league enrollment of North Carolina. 415 leaguers read their Bibles day by day during the past convention year.

The total amount of money raised by the leagues for the past year was \$1100.22. Including the money raised by the leagues which did not report, it would amount to about \$2000.00. \$63.80 was paid into the convention treasury at the recent session.

The convention contributed \$25.00 to foreign missions, \$50.00 on back salary of field secretaries, as well as several other worthy donations. The convention is sponsoring Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Bowen for another year as its field secretaries, also is sponsoring the young people's camp for 1938.

We have about 150 leagues in N. C. with an approximate enrollment of 3000. At the sitting of the State Association at Hopewell last year, we had only about 60 leagues with an enrollment of about 1000. This remarkable increase in number is due to the work on the field by your secretaries and the enthusiastic efforts of interested ministers and laymen.

RECOMMENDATION OF ORPHANAGE BOARD TO STATE ASSOCIATION

Report of Temperance Committee

Temperance is a subject of great magnitude and in order to advance temperance we must be guarded against the evils arising to pervert individuals, communities and nations, therefore, let us notice some of the outstanding evils of the present day against which the true servant of God must abstain and energize himself. All such snares are used by Satan to entrap and ruin our people.

1. Sabbath Desecration. The Lord rested on the Seventh day and hallowed it. Therefore to desecrate the Lord's day is to profane and misuse a time that should be devoted wholly to the service of Almighty God. It is a burning shame to use this holy period for any kind of secular or in frivolous pastime such as base ball games, visiting seaside resorts or in any kind of worldly speculation.

2. The Present Day Movies. While movies that are used for sacred purposes or for the diffusion of real knowledge that is essential for the advancement of mankind are not to be condemned; but a greater part of the views that pass through the screen today are not soul lifting, but on the other hand they are demoralizing and degrading. Boys and girls and even adults are fed upon sex pictures that have a tendency to intensify the passion of lust and lead to the destruction of both body and soul. No greater agency could be devised to debase humanity. Criminals as thieves and robbers are exhibited as heroes and have a tendency to lead into crime rather than from it.

3. Gambling. One of the ten commandments is, "Thou shalt not steal." This commandment covers all unjust transactions whereby an individual takes from another that which is not rightfully his. Betting on ball games, prize fights, and races of all description has demoralized athletics, and many of the sports that otherwise might be commendable. The punch board, roulet wheel, the card table whether in clubs or at homes are leading youth in their early days to become criminals.

4. Intoxicating Liquor. Alcohol has been defined very truly as "the Devil's best friend and God's worst enemy." It is a curse that has destroyed more homes, cursed more children and sent more souls to hell doubtless than any other agency upon the earth. It is not a food, medicine, neither is it a stimulant as some say. It bites like a serpent and stings like an adder.

The A. B. C. Stores that have been forced upon our land are but places where this destructive fire eating poison is sold under the pretence of morality and making communities better. Was a greater falsehood ever offered or a more Satanic deceptive argument advanced? Can a good thing come out of an evil that is the fosterer and promoter of every form of evil and crime? It is up to the Christian people of the country to use every effort to cause this damnable traffic to be banished from our land as far as possible. Legalized crime is what our law makers have thrust upon us. We hold that such men are unworthy of our support for any office or position. May we fight this great enemy in every way possible. Let us not be found casting our votes for liquorites.

5. Parental Influence. The safety of our country lies in our homes. "Train up a child in the way he should go and when he is old, he will not depart from it." Has not our homes in many places become the mere eating and sleeping places for our children? What this land needs most is fathers and mothers filled with the Holy Spirit. If we allow our children to go hither and thither without our knowledge and approval what may we expect? Godly homes will give us Godly rulers and godly communities without which, our nation is doomed sooner or later to land on the rocks.

No home is in danger that is ruled by God fearing fathers and mothers. Let us as parents not only teach but let us train our children by living before them lives of holiness and chastity. May we as parents train our children with the fear of God before our eyes.

Moved and carried that the Editor of the Baptist act as publicity agent. Moved and carried we adjourn.



PROCEEDINGS

The Women's Auxiliary Convention of the Free Will Baptist Church in North Carolina, held its 11th Annual session with Caseys Chapel, near Goldsboro, N. C. on May 4th and 5th, 1937.

The Convention opened on the evening of May 4th at 8:00 o'clock by a devotional led by the pastor, Rev. G. C. Joyner. Special music by Rev. R. N. Hinnant was given in the form of a solo.
