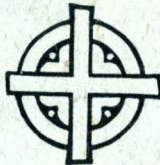

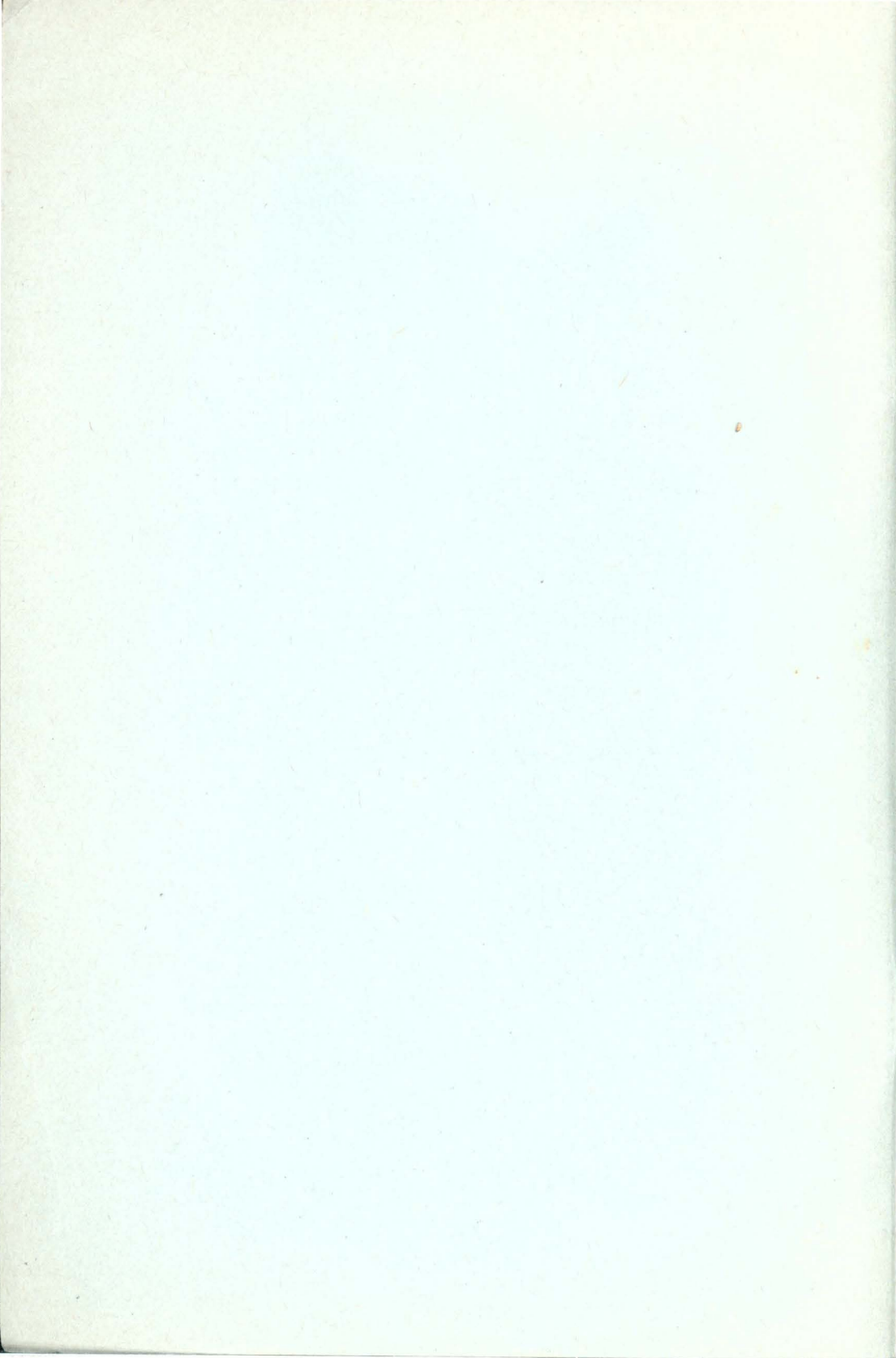

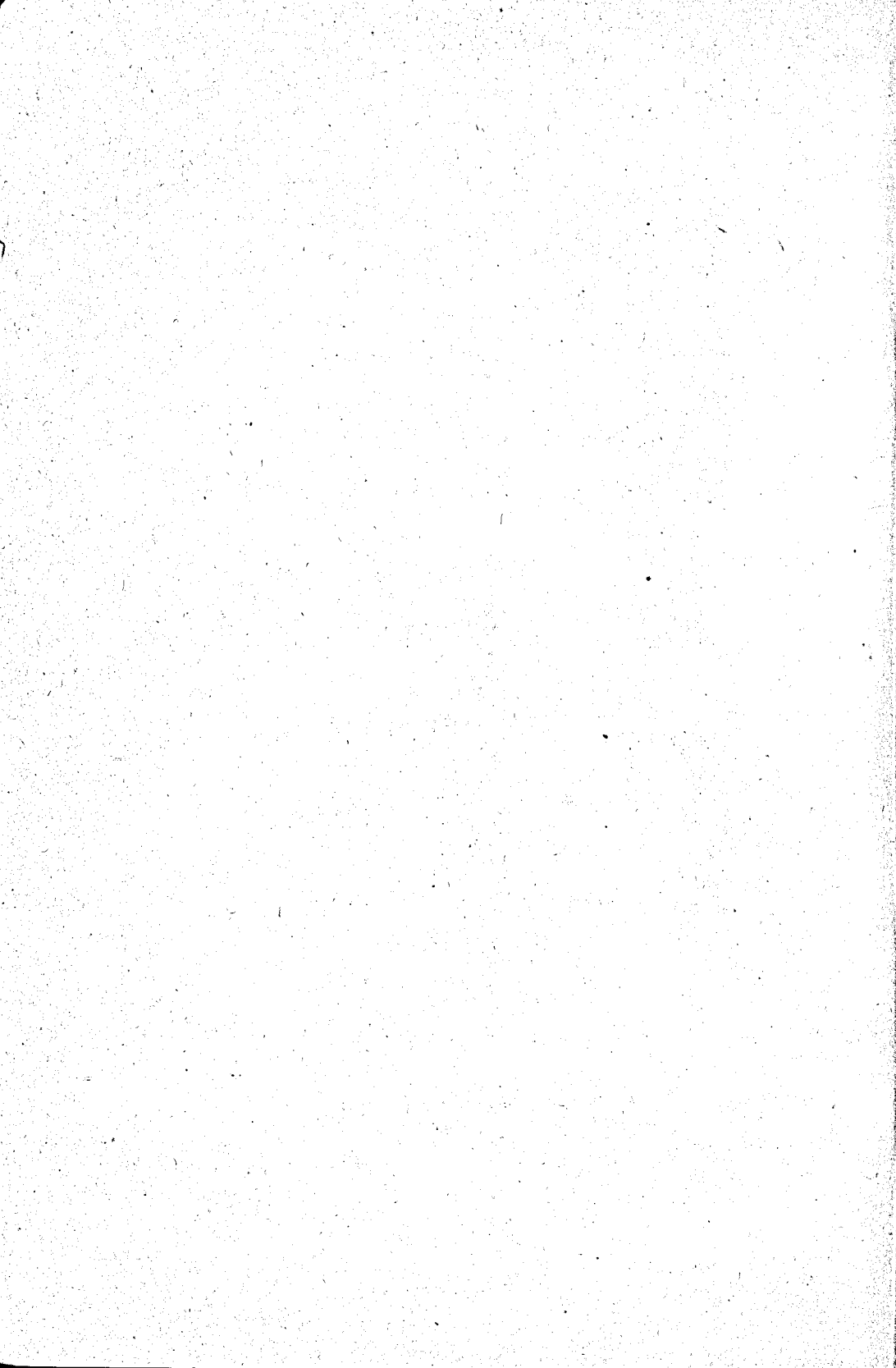

PROCEEDINGS

The twenty-sixth annual session of the North Carolina State Association of Free Will Baptists met with Snow Hill Church in Duplin County, N. C., on Wednesday September 14, 1938 for a two days session.

REPORT OF THE FIELD SECRETARY

(SEPTEMBER 1937 TO SEPTEMBER 1938)

As Field Secretary I wish to make the following report of the field work for the year closing to this session of the State Association.

First. The appointment last fall of members from the different associations and conferences in the State for the purpose of organizing themselves into what is known as the *General Church Board* was a forward step, we feel, in working toward a greater and better church program for the future. The purpose and function of this board is to work out plans, from time to time, for the forward movements of the church as a whole in the State, and to submit its plans, and offer suggestions concerning the same to the different associations and conferences for their consideration, revision, adoption or rejection as thought best by the wisdom of said bodies. As we view it, the General Church Board can become a valuable body over a period of years in our church program by wise thinking and careful planning of progressive measures for the welfare of Christianity.

In the early part of the year, the members appointed by these different bodies met in the Greenville Church and organized. Sub-Committees were in turn elected to serve as special committees on the different outstanding phases of our church work; namely, Education, Superannuation, Missions, Church Extension work, Church Management and Polity, etc. The second meeting was scheduled to meet in the Durham Church, but was later deferred, and finally postponed due to the serious illness and death of Rev. R. F. Pittman who was President of the *General Church Board*. Concerning this Board

and its work, we cannot report further as the Vice-President, Rev. J. C. Griffin, has not called a meeting since the death of Brother Pittman.

Second. The Young People's League work, under the excellent leadership of Rev. Clarence Bowen and wife, our State Field Secretaries, have made splendid progress since last year. Quite an increase has been made in the new leagues organized during this church year. Brother and Sister Bowen are to be commended for their efficient leadership among the young people.

Third. From the reports that have come through the editor's office and also from personal knowledge, we are happy to report that a growing interest is being manifested in the field of missions by the different churches over the State. Some, however, seem not to have caught the mission spirit, but will, we hope during the coming year.

Fourth. The Women's Auxiliary work, from all reports which have been sent in from time to time to the Baptist paper, is spreading rapidly among the churches of the State. This is gratifying and an indication that the women are taking the initiative to go forward in their field of labors for the Master's cause. We bid them God's speed, and may the ministry stand by them in their endeavors to achieve greater success.

Fifth. Greater unity and co-operation is being shown among our church people today, and this is an intimation that our different bodies in the State are becoming closer together in their views of church progress. This is a good sign, and we hope it will continue to develop into a solid unification of efforts for the general good of the whole church.

Sixth. The organization of the ministers in the Annual Ministers Summer Institute, also bespeaks well for our church, and for greater co-operation and progress among the leadership of the church. The Institute this year was well attended, and was a marked success from several angles. The spirit of love and fellowship was manifested during the week at Davis, and much good was derived by those who attended the meeting. This organization has in its power the opportunity of building up within the next few years a strong, unified leadership which will, we hope, prove a great blessing to our cause for the years to come.

REPORT OF YOUNG PEOPLE'S WORK

(Adopted)

To the State Association of North Carolina Free Will Baptists in session at Snow Hill church, Duplin County, September 14, 15, 1938.

Greetings:

It is indeed a genuine pleasure to me to present so encouraging a report

as I have for you at this session. In the beginning let me say if there is anything about this report over which you should feel an associational pride, or in which you may feel prone to glory, let me suggest that you give all credit and praise to the magnanimous band of North Carolina leaguers, for to them we are deeply indebted for the splendid co-operation and interest they have shown which largely made our report possible.

Since the association met last year, about 75 new leagues have been organized by the state league secretaries and interested pastors and young people. This brings our state enrollment of leagues to about 200. Five years ago we had actually less than 75. Two years ago we had less than 100.

To place an estimation on the number of new members enrolled since last September at 1,000 would not miss the actual figure very far. However, to be conservative, we will say our gain has been about 800. This gives North Carolina a grand host of approximately 3,000 young leaguers (and a good number of adults) and crowns the state with the enviable honor of having more than any other state of our vast denomination!

The F. W. B. L. sponsored last June its third summer assembly with a total of — campers. These came from scattered sections of the state, and from many churches which never before represented. This is an appreciated fact and smacks of a decided change in opinions concerning our young people's camp, which opinions heretofore were discriminating in their nature, nowever causing no direct injury to the camp or to the camp spirit.

On July 3, 4, in Goldsboro, the State League Convention met in its twelfth annual session with 500 representatives and visitors. The program in its entirety was superbly rendered, featuring several of the state's most appreciated speakers and singers. This convention set up plans for the new year, among them being the "Challenging Quarter," a financial plan whereby funds may be raised to support missions, Orphanage, and general field work.

All in all our young people are advancing. The state should be proud of her youth. The churches should seek to provide leagues for the growing Christian young people, and every pastor should boldly face the challenge flung out by every Christian boy and girl in his church; that of, "So you're my pastor. Well, I'm just one of the flock, respecting, loving, listening to you. Will you help me make out of the lumber of my life 'not a tavern, but a temple?'" And dear pastors, deacons, and elders of our state, will you accept that challenge by stopping at nothing to provide the proper avenues of service for your youth?

Therefore, we recommend that we carry out the resolution formerly passed and preach at least one sermon each year against the whiskey traffic and the use of intoxicants.
