

PROCEEDINGS

The 28th Annual Session of the State Association of North Carolina Free Will Biptists convened with the church at Little Rock, Wilson County, N. C., on September 11th., 1940.

Devotions were conducted by Eld. C. B. Thompson of Ayden. He spoke to us on the importance of being "fishers of men", and following Jesus, after which the congregation sang "More like the Master," and then the President called the Association to order for business.

On motion Eld. W. L. Hart be elected to fill the unexpired term of Eld. S. H. Styron on the Mission Board.

On motion the next session of the State Association be held at Little Rock, Wilson County.

On motion Eld. W. L. Moretz be elected Publicity Director.

J. W. Alford, R. P. Harris and M. L. Johnson were elected program committee.

Some discussion was had regarding the Board of Surveyors, and it was left open until the next session of the Association.

On motion Eld. J. A. Evans was elected a member of the General Board to fill the unexpired term of Eld. S. H. Styron.

On motion we appoint a committee of three to look into the Records, Constitution and By-Laws of the Association, and discover any discrepancies appearing therein, and submit same, with recommendations for any changes to same, at next session of the Association, in time to be acted on at that session. The following were elected as the above required committee; T. E. Beamon, R. P. Harris, J. C. Griffin.

On motion we adjourn.

Dismissed by Eld. T. E. Beamon.

On motion the above minutes were adopted.

The Executive committee of the State Association of the N. C. Free Will Baptists met at Goldsboro, April 8th 1940, at 10 A. M.

Present: Loyd Vernon, Vice Chm. J. W. Alford, Sec. W. B. Crumpler, M. L. Johnson, W. L. Moretz, W. A. Jackson, L. H. Wetherington.

Prayer was offered by Eld. M. L. Johnson.

The matter of the transfer of the property of the Smithfield church to the new Trustees was taken up. It was found that the obligation of the church to the B. L. Association is still against the State Association, though a new Deed of Trust has been drawn. It was also found that it will take about \$200.00 to bring the obligation up to date, so the B. & L. Associtaion

will accept the Deed of Trust by the new Trustees.

Eld. J. A. Evans presented to us the idea of forming a Corporation to underwrite or assume the obligation to the B. & L. Association, requiring the new Trustees to execute a second Deed of Trust to the Corporation, thereby assuring the B. & L. Association that the debt will be paid, and at the same time securing the Corporation for its investment.

On motion we endorse and authorize the formation of such a Corpora-

tion as outlined by Bro. Evans.

On motion Bro. J. A. Evans be appointed Chairman of a committee to formulate this corporation, and the committee be instructed to proceed at once with the work. J. W. Alford and L. H. Wetherington were appointed to assist Bro. Evans in the formation of this Corporation.

(All those in attendance signified their desire to become members of the above Corporation, and pledged to pay each month into the Treasury of said Corporation when it is formed, certain amounts, which record is found in the hands of the Secretary of the Corporation.)

On motion the Treasurer of the State Association be instructed to pay over to the Smithfield church the sum of \$30.00 to help bring the obligation up to date as of April 1st. 1940.

On motion we adjourn.

Dismissed By Eld. J. R. Bennett.

On motion the above minutes were adopted.

The President, for his address, requested each minister and delegate to stand with his left hand over the heart, and his right raised toward heaven, and sing the first verse of "Blest be the tie that binds", after which Eld. L. B. Manning led in prayer.

At 11 o'clock, at the call of the President, Eld. Chester Pelt came forward, and led the congregation in singing "He leadeth me", after which he asked Eld. George Dunbar of Chuckey, Tenn., to lead in prayer. The congregation then sang "Amazing Grace".

Mrs. Chester Pelt then brought very feelingly a special number entitled

"Place your Hand in the Nail Scarred Hand".

Eld. D. W. Alexander presented and introduced Eld. C. J. Harris as the speaker for today. Eld Harris read the 133rd. Psalm. He spoke to us on the subject: "The Word of God", using Heb. 4; 12 as a text. He presented to us a very powerful and convincing message on the subject.

Eld. G. C. Joyner dismissed us for lunch.

WEDNESDAY P. M.

At 1.15 P. M. we re-assembled, and congregational singing was led by Eld. R. N. Hinnant. Prayer was offered by Eld. J. H. Worley.

Eld. S. H. Oakes of Rockingham conducted the devotions and spoke very helpfully of the necessity of keeping the Word of God alive and burning in our hearts.

The President called for the out of the state visitors, and Eld. George Dunbar of Chuckey, Tenn., was welcomed, and he responded with greetings from the Tennessee brethren.

Eld. Henry Melvin, for the Executive Committee of the National Association, announced that the committee had employed Eld. L. R. Ennis as Executive Secretary for the National Association, and requested the President to give Eld. Ennis time to present his plans for work to us, which he did.

A note from Eld. E. T. Phillips, sending his greetings and requesting an interest in prayer, was read to the Association.

Eld. J. R. Bennett was called and he made a report of the National Educational program. He stated that property for a school is under investigation but exact location has not been determined.

The committee appointed to submit revisions to the Constitution and By-Laws reported as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON REVISION OF CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS.

We, the undersigned Committee, appointed by the Executive Committee to revise the Constitution and By-Laws and bring them up-to-date, beg leave to report as follows:

1. We find that some phases of the Constitution are not as specific as they should be, and further that many phases of our work have changed and new objects enacted. Thus the necessity for amendments to bring the Constitution and By-Laws up-to-date.

We recommend the following changes:

1. That we and the following sections to Article 1 of the By-Laws.

Section 8. The duties of the Board of Finance shall be to work out a complete financial system for our entire state concerning all of our financial requirements, to put same into operation, to revise and change from year to year as necessity may demand, and to apportion the funds of the Association.

Section 9. The duties of the Board of Superanuation shall be to provide for our aged, retired, and infirm ministers in some form of a superannuation.

Section 10. The duties of the Home Mission Board shall be to regulate and supervise all Home Missions in North Carolina.

Section 11. The duties of the Foreign Mission Board shall be to raise money for our Foreign Mission Program and to build sentiment favorable to Foreign Missions.

- 2. Section 5 of article 3 be and is hereby repealed and we recommend that all money on hand for church extension be turned over to the Church Finance Corporation.
- 3. That Section 6 article 3 be and is hereby repealed, and that the Executive Committee, or on its failure, the President appoint annually one or more persons to audit any and all books and to report to the Association.

Section 7 article 3 be and is hereby repealed.

We recommend the following additions to Article 3 of the By-Laws. Section 5. Board of Foreign Missions. The Board shall be composed of 4 members elected to serve for a term of two years each, with two members retiring each year and others elected to fill the vacancy.

This report was laid on the table until tomorrow for its consideration according to the constitutional requirement.

Elds. D. W. Alexander and Clarence Bowen spoke about the Ministers Institute at Davis each year, and encouraged the pastors to attend.

A quartet composed of R. N. Hinnant, L. R. Ennis, Mrs. Chester Pelt and Mrs. J. C. Moye very beautifully sang "I want to be like Jesus in my Heart".

WEDNESDAY NIGHT

Eld. Henry Melvin brought a very interesting, helpful and instructive message on Home Missions, using for a text Acts, 1; 8.

THURSDAY MORNNING

The Association met at the appointed time, and devotions were conducted by Eld. W. R. Williams with song by the congregation and prayer by Eld. J. H. Worley, after which Eld. Williams read the 133rd Psalm. The congregation then sang "I feel like going on."

The President took charge, and business began with the reading of the minutes of yesterday, which were approved.

On motion the President send Eld. W. L. Moretz a message of sympathy in his afflictions.

The Association convened at 1.30 P. M.

Mrs. J. C. Moye and Miss Margueritte Moye sang very feelingly "I Won't have to Cross Jordan Alone."

Eld. J. E. Wooten spoke in memory of the departed brethren, and particularly concerning Elds. Pollard, Pittman, Davidson and Styron.

Eld. J. A. Evans spoke of the work of Elds. Pittman and Styron.

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS OF THE NORTH CAROLINA STATE ASSOCIATION OF THE ORIGINAL FREE WILL BAPTIST CHURCH

PREAMBLE

We, the Original Free Will Baptists of North Carolina, assembled in order to advance, promote and increase the cause of Jesus Christ, do establish and ordain this Constitution and these By-Laws.

CONSTITUTION ARTICLE I.

Section 1. This assembly shall be known as the North Carolina State Association of the Original Free Will Baptist church of Jesus Christ.

ARTICLE II.

Section 1. The officers of the Association shall be President, Vice-President, Recording Secreetary, Field Secretary, Treasurer and Executive Board.

Section 2. The Association shall be composed of all the ordained ministers belonging to the Association; one delegate from each church in good standing; one delegate from each Union Meeting, Conference and Association in good standing for every one thousand members or a fraction thereof.

BY-LAWS

ARTICLE I.

Section 1. It shall be the duty of the President to preside over each session, preserve order, govern the body according to established parliamentary usage and appoint all temporary committees. He shall have power to declare any office of the Association vacant, temporarily, subject to the approval of the Executive Committee.

Section 2. The duties of the Vice-President shall be the duties of the President when that officer is not present.

Section 3. The Recording secretary shall keep an accurate record of the transactions of the Association and preserve the same, keep all valuable documents and surrender the same to his successor in office.

Section 4. The Field Secretary shall have charge of preparing statistical tables showing the increase or decrease in membership, church property, etc., and read at each session of the Annual Association and refer same to the Recording Secretary for permanent record. He shall have charge of placing all the work of the Association before the various Conferences and Associations. Also the Field work in general.

Section 5. All money belonging to the Association shall be kept by the Treasurer and paid out by him only by order of the Association. Bills not having been voted to be paid either by the Association or its Executive Board must be signed by the President and Recording Secretary before being paid by him.

Section 6. The work of the Executive Board shall be that of the Association when the Association is not in session and to call extra sessions when such becomes necessary. It shall have the authority to suspend any officer of the Association when he or she proves a failure in official duties, proves non-Christian in official or any other work or detrimental to the cause of Christ and appoint others to fill the vacancy; also fill vacancies made by any other cause. Officers thus appointed shall hold office until the next regular session of the Association. This Board shall be composed of the President, Recording Secretary, Field Secretary, Treasurer and Chairman of all standing boards of the Association.

Section 7. The President and Field Secretary of the Association shall be ex-officio members of all Boards.

Section 8. The duties of the Board of Finance shall be to work out a complete financial system for our entire state concerning all our financial requirements; to put same into operation; to revise and change from year

to year as necessity may demand, and to apportion the funds of the Association.

Section 9. The duties of the Board of Superannuation shall be to provide for our aged, retired and infirm Ministers in some form of a superannuation.

Section 10. The duties of the Home Mission Board shall be to regulate and supervise all Home Missions in North Carolina.

Section 11. The Duties of the Foreign Mission Board shall be to raise money for our Foreign Mission program, and to build sentiment favorable to Foreign Missions.

ARTICLE II.

Section 1. The method of the Association shall be to departmentalize the work and place at the head of each department a Board which shall be governed by certain rules adopted by the Association.

Section 2. Delegates from churches, Union Meetings, Conferences and Associations shall answer to roll calls and serve in whatever capacity they may be called upon by the Association. They shall have the right to speak on any subject before the Association by first addressing the President and obtaining the floor.

ARTICLE III.

The following named Boards shall be elected in the following manner:

Section 1. Orphanage Board. The Board of Trustees for the management and control of the Free Will Baptist Orphan Home at Middlesex, N. C., shall be composed of five members elected for a period of five years; the Association to fill the vacancy.

Section 2. Board of Finance. The Board of Finance shall be composed of six members elected for a term of three years with two members retiring each year and others elected by the Association to fill the vacancy.

Section 3. Board of Superannuation. The Board of Superannuation shall be composed of six members elected for a term of three years with two members retiring each year and others elected by the Association to fill the vacancy.

Section 4. Board of Missions. The Board of Missions shall be composed of six members elected for a term of two years with three members retiring each year and others elected by the Association to fill the vacancy.

Section 5. Board of Foreign Missions:—The Board shall be composed of four members elected to serve for a term of two years each, with two members retiring each year and others elected to fill the vacancy.

AMENDMENTS

This Constitution and these By-Laws shall not be changed or altered only by a two-thirds vote of members present in a regular session. All amendments shall lie on the table not less than six hours prior to adoption and shall during that time be read not less than twice in open Association.
