

The Executive Committee of the State Association of Free Will Baptists of North Carolina met at New Bern, N. C. on January 2nd 1941. The following were present;

The Chairman appointed W. A. Jackson, W. B. Crumpler and J. C. Moye a committee to determine the place at which the next session of the State Association will be held.

On motion R. B. Spencer is to be the publicity director, and the President and the Vice-President to be associated with him.

J. R. Bennett, M. A. Woodard and L. H. Wetherington were appointed Program committee.

M. E. Tyson talked to us a few minutes regarding a 5 point state wide program. After discussion of the topic by several brethren, it was agreed by motion and vote that \$50.00 of the Home Mission funds be used by Brother Tyson for the furtherance of the program; the amount to be returned to the Home Mission Board by the next session of the Association.

L. R. Ennis, the Executive Secretary of the National Association, spoke to us several minutes about the National program, outlining the set-up and aim of the program, and appealed for our support of the same.

On motion we appoint a committee of five to whom the proposed uniform Constitution and By-Laws to be set up by the National Association for the States and Districts, shall be submitted for their study and consideration prior to the next session of the State Association. A resolution was submitted by the Ladies' Auxiliary Executive Committee, which was referred to a committee of five, they to confer with the Ladies' Executive Committee, and make any changes necessary, and submit the same to the State Association. J. C. Moye, W. B. Everette, W. B. Crumpler, L. H. Wetherington and W. A. Jackson were appointed the Committee.

J. A. Evans, Supt. of the Orphanage, made report of the progress of the building program at the Home, which was very encouraging.

On motion we thank the Ladies of this church for the nice lunch today.

Minutes read and approved.

Sister Barnard of India and Brother Willey of Cuba, two foreign Missionaries, were called forward and presented to the audience. Each made appreciative remarks.

Rev. J. E. Wooten brought greetings from Rev. E. T. Phillips.

On motion Rev. L. E. Ballard was appointed to convey a message of love and sympathy from this Association to Brother Phillips.

The President made his address, showing something of the growth and progress since the Convention or Association was first formed.

A recess of 10 minutes was taken, and prayer was offered by Rev. R. H. Mason before retiring.

After the intermission the congregation sang "The Way of the Cross Leads Home," and prayer was offered by Rev. J. E. Wooten. Song by the congregation "Thy Kingdom is Coming."

At 11:30 o'clock Rev. Henry Melvin was presented to the audience, and he brought a very strong and uplifting message from John 4: 33-36,

after which we adjourned for dinner.

After a most bountiful dinner, we re-assembled at 1:30 o'clock. A hymn was sung by the congregation, and prayer was offered by Rev. K. W. Gaskill.

Rev. J. R. Bennett, a member of the the National Educational Board, made report as follows:

To the North Carolina State Association of Free Will Baptist

I had hoped to be able to report a school owned and operated by Free Will Baptist of the United States by this time, but I am unable to do so at this sitting of the State Association. The educational board has had two or three meetings during the year at which time we hoped to be able to get in possession of some property and begin work. Within eight or ten days I may be able to inform you more definitely since the chairman of the educational board has notified us to meet in Nashville Tenn. next week. At the last session of the National Association it was decided by the Association that Nashville, Tenn. would be the proper place for the school, and the educational board be incorporated to hold title to property. We

were instructed to purchase property in the City of Nashville, Tenn. purchase price not to exceed fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000.00). Five thousand is to be paid at the time of the purchase and three thousand each year there after until the fifteen thousand has been paid.

I regret very much that the last session of the National Association was not as great a love feast as we had had in the past. Some things took place that were not pleasant, I am sure, to any of us; but we must not stop here, we must go forward in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ. I am willing to do everything in my power to carry forward the program of our church so long as it is right and expresses the sentiment of the North Carolina State Association. I would appreciate an expression from this body since I am to go to Nashville next week.

At the National Association, at the request of the chairman of the educational board, one thousand dollars was set aside for institute work. These institutes are to be held in the states that ask for them. I am not informed as to how many of them has been held and just how much of this money has been used. The idea of the institutes was that they would be an introduction to a school, and perhaps be a blessing to each of the states.

I have never felt the need of Divine guidance more in my life than I do now for the future of our church. These places are hard to fill. First I want to do the will of my Father in heaven and next the will of the masses of our people and I need your prayers. May God put it on your hearts to pray for us.

May God bless you for a greater denomination.

#### RESOLUTION

Whereas there is a report being circulated that certain preachers are preaching doctrines contrary to the doctrine of the Original Free Will Baptist Church, and ridiculing and declaring that certain forms of our observance of certain ordinances are unbiblical, and contrary to the teaching of the Bible, thereby undermining and destroying the faith which has been so faithfully declared by our fore-fathers, and, until now, held loyally by all true Free Will Baptists, and

Whereas such declarations are a great hurt to our Cause, and create

dissention and disloyalty in our ranks,

Therefore be it Resolved: That the State Association of Free Will Baptists now assembled in their Annual Session in 1941, do earnestly recommend and urge each Association and Conference representing in the State Association, to inquire diligently and earnestly into the kind of doctrine each preacher is preaching, to the end that they fully determine who is disloyal to our Cause and doctrine, and having found one who is preaching against any of our doctrines, the said Association or Conference be urged to silence any such preacher until he shall agree to conform in his preaching to the true doctrine of the Free Will Baptist Church, and on

his refusal to conform in doctrine and practice, then this State Association urge that the Association or Conference to which any such non-conforming preacher belongs, promptly excommunicate said defiant preacher so that unity and uniformity of doctrine may prevail among us.

The Following Resolution was presented and adopted by motion and vote:

Owing to reports, there has crept into our National Association conditions that are dividing the brotherhood and are subject to destroy some of our greatest denominational enterprises and institutions, which our fathers have planted at a great sacrifice;—Be it resolved:

First, That we as the North Carolina State Association hereby request that the General Board of the National Association set a time and place and call together the editors and managers of the Free Will Baptist Press of Ayden, N. C. and the Free Will Baptist Gem, of Monnett, Mo., which institutions shall be represented by proper officials, elected by the two aforesaid institutions according to their form of electing official representatives, to discuss and settle if possible, the unfair and the un-Christ like competition that is now going on.

Second, Be it further resolved, that the above request, be sent by duplicate copy, to each, the Secretary, Rev. E. C. Morris, Elizabeth City, and to Rev. James F. Miller, Moderator, Flat River, Mo. respectfully of the National Assoication of Free Will Baptist.

Third; Be it further resolved, that the General Board, of the National Association be allowed fifteen days from date of sending the said request, to acknowledge receipt of the same, and that sixty days be allowed for the calling of the proposed meeting and the convening of the same.

Fourth, Should the General Board of the National Association disregard the request of the North Carolina State Association of Free Will Beptists, Be it further resolved, that this body, known as the North Carolina State Association of Free Will Baptists withdraw all support from the National Association, in its operation through its General Board, and its Executive Secretary.

Fifth, Since we are Free Will Baptists and every church holds its own keys, and the State Association of North Carolina is an advisory body, with no power, nor covets any power, to dominate the individual church, be it known that as such we are making the above request for the glory of God and the safe keeping of those principles and doctrines as set forth by our fathers and for which they sacrificed—principles and doctrines that have been cherished by their loyal sons and daughters, who have never turned their back on the church and its institutions. We, the undersigned, do pray you, in the name of Christ, to pass favorable on these resolutions, and take notice as to where we stand, and to what we are facing as North Carolina Free Will Baptists.

On April 24, 1940, we submitted by-laws to the office of the Secretary of the State of North Carolina. On same date same was approved and charter granted to us. Then we proceeded to have necessary membership blanks and forms printed so that we might begin to start operation.

In order that we might perfect this organization, we had meetings from time to time trying to bring about the organization where we could get together.

on May 27, 1940, we met at Smithfield and set up our first operation by starting solicitation of memberships and financing the Smithfield church, in which we moved along very smoothly.

A few months later we financed a little church down in Sneads Ferry, Onslow County.

#### SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT

At the request of Rev. R. P. Harris, I respectfully offer the following

report on Sunday School work in the state:

The State S. S. Convention, organized in connection with the last sitting of the Association, has held one very enthusiastic session during the year, in connection with which a Worker's Institute was held, with classes for workers of the various departments. The Convention is operating under a plan modeled after the National S. S. Convention, with directors for the various departments are the lead of the property of the various Alexandra and the convention of the property of th departments, offering their services to the local churches at all times. Also at the April meeting of the Convention in Ayden it was thought advisable to elect a Field Secretary, and this office was conferred upon Mrs. Ballard. Since then she has been endorsed by the National S. S. Conv. as Director of S. S. Institutes. One co-operative institute has been held in New Bren, with surrounding schools co-operating, and others are being planned.

One sepcial project of the convention at this time is working, in cooperation with the F. W. B. L. and Women's Auxiliary Conventions, for a retreat, or camp, where denominational institutes for various groups may be held. The Sunday schools of the state are endeavoring to raise funds for such a camp through "dime" banks in all the schools, in which one dime per week is placed for this purpose.

Reports from over the state indicated a steady, if not sensational, progress in Sunday School promotion. We are striving for not less than 75% of the schools of the state to be represented at the next convention.

The following resolution was presented and adopted: Whereas there is a great need for a better understanding and a closer fellowship among Free Will Baptist ministers, in order that we may accomplish more to the glory of God and our great cause, Therefore Be it Resolved:

First, That this State Association go on record asking all our Free Will Baptist churches to use Free Will Baptist ministers in their revivals when humanly possible.

Second, That the ministers co-operate in this matter for the success of the church and the glory of God.

Third, That this Body ask the adoption and practice of these resolutions in all our Associations and Conferences in this State. Signed C. H. Coates, W. L. Moretz, L. E. Ballard, Lloyd Vernon, G. W. Kennedy.

#### Board of Trustees Budget to State Association

"The Superintendent suggested that the Board have a budget prepared and submit it to the State Association at its 1941 session. Motion by J. C. Moye, that the Board submit a budget to the State Association for the operation of the Orphanage for the coming year. Motion was second by H. C. Wood. After some discussion the question was put and motion carried with instructions that the Superintendent prepare the budget and study the needs of the Home."

The following resolution was adopted by motion and vote:

Resolved that it is the sense of the N. C. State Association that we cannot, at the present time and under the present conditions, go along with the National Association in their National Educational program, until certain conditions are corrected, and the money raised for that program used for that purpose only. Therefore we wish to request Rev. J. R. Bennett, who is a member of the said National Educational Board, and a member of this State Association, not to vote for the purchase of a school property, until all misunderstandings regarding the program and use of the money are cleared up.

# PROCEEDINGS OF THE N. C. FREE WILL BAPTIST SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION

The First Annual Session of the North Carolina Sunday School Convention-Institute, convened with the Ayden Sunday School, on April 26th and 27th, 1941.

The convention opened with congregational singing led by Rev. R. P. Harris using the convention theme song, "To the Work, To the Work" and chorus "Study to Show Thyself Approved."

# REPORT OF FIELD SECRETARY AND ASSEMBLY CAMP COMMITTEE

Considering the fact that for years many of the people of our denomination have seen the need for a retreat for Ministers, our F. W. B. Leagues, our Women's Auxiliaries, and our Sunday Schools, for a place of inspiration, study, and fellowship in order that we may be a people who are uplifted and informed as to our denomination with its problems, and its needs, and its aspirations. We recommend that the Women's Auxiliary, the F. W. B. Leagues, and Ministers throughout the State Association cooperate with us in promoting a program for purchasing and erecting suitable structures for this assembly, through elected committees from each auxiliary. The ownership to be determined by non-profit sharing stock purchased by the four auxiliaries herein named.

We also recommend that a committee be elected by this convention for his purpose.

Furthermore, we recommend: that to finance our Assembly camp we continue the regular \$1.00 registration fee at all future Sunday School Convention-Institutes. ### **PROCEEDINGS**

The Women's Auxiliary Convention of the Free Will Baptist Church of North Carolina held its fifteenth session with Rain's Cross Roads Church of the Western District on Thursday, May 22nd, 1941.

Report of the First Vice President was heard at this time. (See reports).

Greetings by Telegraph from Mrs. J. P. Barrow, former Secretary, who is now living in Chicago, was read and was very much appreciated.

After the report of the 2nd Vice President, Rev. L. R. Ennis gave a brief synopsis of our Church History and also the work that is being done at the present time to promote the interests of our denominational program.

The National Auxiliary Officers were recognized at this time, there being present the President, and two Vice Presidents.

Mrs. Lizzie McAdams made a short talk in the interest of Missions and of the good work being done in N. C. by the women, after which Mrs. L. E. Ballard of Greenville, brought a stirring message on Missions.

Short talks made by Mrs. McAdams, Mr. C. K. Dunn and an earnest appeal from Mrs. J. H. Oglesby for a greater effort in behalf of Missions, were timely and impressive.

Adjourned for lunch and recreation.

#### AFTERNOON SESSION 1:00 P. M.

Mrs. Floyd Morris conducted the afternoon devotions. Before entering into the business session, a request from the local pastor, Rev. J. W. Alford, was made in behalf of his Church, that special prayer be made for rain, as his people were praying people and depended upon God for all good gifts and that they had approached him with a petition that he ask this Convention to pray in a special way that the Lord would send rain. Mr. Alford requested that Rev. J. C. Griffin lead the prayer, to be followed by Mrs. McAdams.

At this time a very splendid program was given by a class from the Orphanage, after which the Superintendent, Rev. Jas. A. Evans, gave a report of the work being accomplished, the number of children in the home,

the number not yet adopted by various churches and auxiliaries, together with other items of interest.

An offering was taken for the Orphanage amounting to \$11.79.

Mrs. L. E. Ballard made a report of an effort on the part of the S. S. Convention to secure Assembly Grounds where meetings could be held annually in behalf of the Sunday School work, in the way of training etc. and in her remarks she urged that our Women's Convention join with the S. S. Convention in bringing about the success of this most excellent plan.

It was moved and carried that we co-operate with the S. S. Convention in helping to secure the Assembly grounds. Motion was made that the President appoint a committee to work with said S. S. Convention in behalf of this effort. The following were appointed:

Miss Elizabeth Warren of Greenville, Mrs. Henry Melvin of Durham and Mrs. N. E. Harris of Rocky Mount.

The 3rd Vice President, Mrs. J. H. Oglesby, made her report on the work done in the interest of Missions for the year. (See reports). She made a fervent appeal that we do our best to help maintain a Native Missionary in India, in response to an urgent appeal from Miss Barnard through our Baptist Paper some time ago. She also told of her efforts and the results in behalf of our Cuban missionaries, Mr. and Mrs. Willey, in their appeal for a horse that would enable them to do more efficient service among the natives.

An offering was taken for Missions amounting to \$18.30.

Reports were made by the 4th and 6th Vice Presidents regarding their work for the year. The 5th Vice President being absent, there was no report of the Orphanage work rendered.

There was some discussion regarding the work of Superannuation. It was decided that we continue our efforts in our Ministerial Relief work, but leave Superannuation alone, until some definite action is taken by the National Auxiliary Convention and the same made known to us.

The Field Secretary was not present and her report was given by her mother, Mrs. Sidney Renfrow. The "Georgie Frost Barnes Extension Banner" was awarded to the Western district for organizing the largest number of Societies during the year and was presented by Mrs. Renfrow, in behalf of Mrs. Barnes.

Mrs. Maude Harrison, conducted the Memorial Service, which was very impressive throughout.

The National President, Mrs. J. C. Griffin, gave a brief report of the work of the National Auxiliary Convention and its plans for the year. She stated that, in all probability, Mrs. Frazier, 2nd Vice President, contemplated making some changes in our Literature at the next session, but hoped it would be in accord with the voice of our women of the various States. Rev. L. R. Ennis and Mrs. McAdams also made short talks on the National work.

Mrs. L. E. Ballard was appointed delegate to the National Auxiliary Convention to be held with Drumright, Okla. Free Will Baptist Church in July this year.

Other delegates are to be Mesdames Pelt, Morris, Wetherington, E. C. Morris, Moye and Bowen.

The Resolution Committee made its report at this time. (See reports). It was moved and carried that the Resolutions be accepted.

The report of the Finance Committee was given and on motion was received.

Treasurer's report was given in detail and on motion was received as read.

The report of the 2nd Vice President was heard at this time, and accepted.
