FIELD SECRETARY'S REPORT-1944-45

My work in the field has been very limited in visiting due to the rationing of gasoline. I have attended all the Union meetings and Women's Auxiliaries and Other conventions, in fact gave some where ever Fifth Saturday and Sunday for which I have made no charge. Wherever I have been I have presented our FIVE-POINT PROGRAM and urged that all churches and preachers support the work as prescribed.

I have kept the FIVE-POINT PROGRAM before our people in my NOTES AND QUOTES. In one revival meeting I spoke for the Anna Phillips Loan Fund and the ladies finished out a \$20.00 carad by adding \$7.00 the same meeting the church raised \$25.00 for a membership in the Church Finance Association. Other points of the program have been presented which have brought forth fruit after my leaving. As pastor I have worked the program in my churches.

I have written various officers of the various Conferences and Associations and served in cooperation with the President in every thing that he ask me to do in giving notices and attended special meetings of the Executive Committee, which work has been the greatest ever this year.

As Field Secretary, seeing and knowing the necessity of an extended work in the Program of North Carolina Free Will Baptist, due to the fact we are losing valuable time and losing churches and communities that might be ours by the already delay of having a full time person in the field to work out and present regular; such recommendations and to secure such information as is necessary to the ongoing of our church life; and to work in the securing of suitable workers for the various needs of the Field; and to endeavor to have in each church auxiliaries-namely, The Woman's auxiliary: Leagues and Sunday schools and Jr. Missionary circles and to perform in general all work pertaining to such an office, we urge that this Association now in session adopt the proposed constitution which arranges for a whole time Field Secretary and place upon the Executive Committee the responsibility and power to function as provided for in the said proposed Constitution.

2. That we urge and assist, the churches in the holding of Auxiliary Institutes, such as Sunday Schools, Christian Workers Institutes, etc., in order that our People may be informed rightly in the carrying on of the work so important to the future progress of our denomination in the State and Nation and the Foreign field.

REPORT OF HISTORIAN and the state of the sta

The first State Convention of the Free Will Baptist denomination of North Carolina, was held with the church located in Bailey, North Carolina, on September 17, 18, 19, in the year of 1913. D. B. Sasser was the first President and Rev. E. T. Phillips the Recording Secretary. At this session 64 churches were represented.

The State Convention was the outgrowth of the Union Conference and Ministerial Association. It has been my happy privilege to find copies of the minutes of each session of the old Union Conference and Ministerial Association and to trace the movements of our people through the years.

I appeared befor the Executive Committee of the new State Association and asked for instructions as to the writing of the history of our State work, and the preservation of our records. Accordingly, the said Executive Committee, instructed me to proceed to write the history and procure a book in loose-leaf form of the type usually found in the offices of the Register of

Deeds of the County, and have the history records, together with a complete copy of the minutes of each session, the missing numbers of the minutes to be included, when and if, copies could be located, and to present the bill to the State Association at this session.

Investigations of the cost of this procedure revealed that the cost was beyond what the Committee had expected it to cost, and in consultation with Brother Bennett, the president, we decided it would be best to submit the matter with the facts to this annual session, and if the work is to proceed, this session to pass on the question of expenses, etc., and to make the necessary appropriations.

The estimated cost to do a creditable job, will be as follows:

Recommendations

- 1. That the preservation of our records be made along the lines suggested and ordered by the Executive Committee.
- 2. That the office of historian be continued, and that each year the minutes of the annual session be copied and preserved in the historical records.
- 3. That we ask our people to continue the search for the missing numbers of our minutes, namely, sessions of 1914, 15, 16, 23, 24, 25.

RESOLUTION

Whereas, many of our ministers reside, and often have occasion to be temporarily, outside the bounds or jurisdiction of the Conference or Association of which they are members; and

Whereas, because of the weakness of the flesh and human nature, some of them sometimes are accused of unsound doctrine, while others are accused of unchristian conduct; and

Whereas, if such accusations are made outside of the bounds of the Conference or Association of which the accused is a member, we find it next to impossible to develop the facts in the case, to the end that justice may be done the cause and the accused; and

Whereas, because of these failures in the past we have had to pass by incidents and charges incident thereto, thereby doing the cause an injustice, and bringing reproach upon the rest of the Ministry;

Therefore be it resolved:

- 1. That each and every Conference or Association assume and exercise authority over the Free Will Ministers in their jurisdiction or bounds, whether their presence in the bounds of said Conference or Association be permanent or temporary.
 - 2. That if there be accusations of any kind against any minister while

in the bounds or jurisdiction of another Conference or Association, then this Conference or Association where the alleged offense occurs shall have power and authority to bring the accused to trial in the way accepted and approved by the Conference or Association in dealing with their own wayward ministers, and if the accused is found guilty of the charges or allegations, they shall have power and authority to impose such penalty as they may think proper, and in accord with the teaching of the Holy Bible.

3. When a minister has thus been dealt with, it shall be the duty of the Trial Board, if such is used, or the Conference or Association giving the accused a trial, to report the result of their action to the Conference or Association of which the accused is a member, and that body shall accept the verdict and judgment as though the action had taken place by their own body.

He concluded his message by pleading for spiritual friendship between all Ministers.

SUPERANNUATION REPORT

To The North Carolina State Association of Free Will Baptist:

We, your Board of Superannuation submit the following report and recommendations divided into six items as follows:

- 1. With sincere regret we report the death, during the last year, of one of our Superannuated Ministers: Namely, Rev. L. H. Wetherington, of the Eastern Conference, who died on December 28, 1944, at the age of 54.
- 2. We are happy to report that the WILL of the late Mr. George P. Best. has been settled. However, before its settlement it was taken into Court for trial. Near the end of the trial a settlement was agreed upon by all concerned. In the settlement, the Board of Superannuation received \$6,519.55. From this amount a refund was made to our general Fund for the Retainer Fee paid the Lawyer. The balance of the Lawyer's fee was paid directly from the Estate. The afore mentioned refund was \$50.00, leaving the final receipts from the Best Estate \$6,469.55. In as much as Mr. Best remembered the aged Minister with the expressed desire that a "Home For Disabled Ministers" be built, we have set this fund aside as the "George P. Best Memorial Trust Fund" to be held for the time being, looking to the use of it in the future for this purpose. In the meantime the money is being invested and the interest received will be used for the General Program of Superannuation. \$4,200.00 of this Fund has already been loaned to the Church Finance Association, Inc., and the balance is to be loaned to them in a few days. Proper security has been given for this money and interest is to be paid at 3 per cent.

- 1. AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS OF THE STATE ASSOCIATION

Resolved that the Constitution of the State Association be amended as follows:

Art. II. Section 1. The officers of the Association shall be President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer.

Resolved that the By-Laws of the State Association be amended to read as follows:

Art. 1. Sec. 6. The work of the Executive Committee shall be that of the Association when the Association is not in session, and to call extra sessions when such becomes necessary. It shall have authority to suspend any officer of the Association when he or she proves a failure in official duties; proves non-christian in official or any other work, or detrimental to the cause of Christ, and appoint others to fill the vacancy; also fill vacancies made by any other cause. Officers thus appointed shall hold office until the next regular session of the Association. This Committee shall be composed of the President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, and three members to be elected from the floor of the Association at the regular time for electing officers.

Art. 1. Section 7. The President of the Association shall be ex-officio member of all Boards.

REPORT OF FIELD SECRETARY COMMITTEE

We, your committee, appointed to prepare details for the full time service of a Field Secretary, submit the following Resolutions.

WHEREAS: The N. C. State Association of Free Will Baptist, in its 1944 session passed a resolution directing the Executive Committee to work out the details for the full time service of a Field Secretary, and said Committee appointed this special Committee to do this work, and further, WHEREAS: Certain steps must be taken to bring this about;

Therefore Be It Resolved:

First; That the following Amendments be made to the Constitution and By-Laws of the N. C. State Association of Free Will Baptist. (See Amendments) (Section 6, line 9, Section 5, Article 3, and Section II, article I) (By-Laws).

Second; That we approve the following Rules and Regulations for the office of Field Secretary. (See Rules and Regulations.)

Third: That this office be financed as follows:

1. Allocate from our general fund \$300.00.

- 2. Invite any Church or organization to send in funds for financing this office.
- 3. Allow the Field Secretary to solicit a fund to be called "The Five Point Program Fund," and if during any month this fund, together with other funds sent for this purpose, shall exceed the expense of this office, the surplus shall be divided between the Orphanage, Missions, Superannuation, Christian Education, and Church Finance Association, Inc., on the percentage basis that they received from the general program during the preceding Associational Year.
- 4. If during any month the above mentioned resources should fail to bring in enough funds to pay the expense of this office, the Orphanage, Missions, Superannuation, Christian Education, and Church Finance Association, Inc., shall be asked, through their Boards, to pay the balance, on the percentage basis that they received from the general program during the preceding Associational year. This to be considered as expense for Promotional Work.
- 5. The Treasurer of this Association shall handle all of the above mentioned funds.

Fourth; That we ask the Executive Committee to proceed with this work and to put the full time Field Secretary on the field just as soon as practical, in keeping with the Constitution and By-Laws of this Association, and any other instructions of the Association.

PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS OF THE N. C. STATE ASSOCIATION OF FREE WILL BAPTIST By-Laws

Let the following Amendments be made:

- 1. The words "Field Secretary" shall be stricken out of Section 6, line 9.
- 2. Section 11 shall be added to Article 1, and shall read as follows: "The duties of the "Board of Christian Education" shall be to keep our people informed about the Christian Education Program of our Church, shall endeavor to promote the Cause of Christian Education, shall receive funds for Christian Education, and place same as they are instructed, by the State Association, and in general to cooperate with the National Educational Program."
- 3. Section 5 shall be added to Article 3, and shall read as follows: "Board of Christian Education"; The Board of Christian Education shall be composed of 3 members elected for a term of three years, with the exception that the first named shall serve for one year, the second for two years, and the third shall serve the full term. The vacancies to be filled by the State Association."

RULES AND REGULATIONS

of the Office of Field Secretary of the North Carolina State Association of Free Will Baptist

Preamble

The Field Secretary of the N. C. State Association of Free Will Baptists, being an office created and controlled by said Association, shall be governed by these Rules and Regulations; which shall be changed or amended, only, by the State Association in its regular way of making Constitutional changes.

Article I

The Field Secretary shall be elected by the State Association, or its Executive Committee, as provided for in its regular Constitution.

Article II

The duties of the Field Secretary shall be as set forth in Article I, Section 4 of the By-Laws of the State Association, and any other instructions given by the State Association, or its Executive Committee, agreeable to the Constitution of the State Association.

Article III

The salary and all expense of the office of Field Secretary shall be paid by the N. C. State Association of Free Will Baptists, from funds provided for this purpose.

Article IV

The Field Secretary shall be accountable to the State Association, when in session, and at other times to the Executive Committee, which may, if it is deemed wise, elect a "Board of Control" to advise and work with the Field Secretary.

Article V

The Office of Field Secretary shall not, in its self, make the Field Secretary a member of the Executive Committee of the State Association.

Article VI

The Field Secretary shall perform his duties, as set forth by the Constitution and By-Laws of the State Association, and additional instructions of the Association, and its Executive Committee, and upon his inability to do so, should tender his resignation, and let the vacancy be filled as provided for by the regular Constitution of the Association.

Article VII

The Field Secretary shall serve for what ever salary, and expense, that may be agreed upon by him and the State Association, or its Executive Committee, and any money received by him, in his service as Field Secretary, shall be turned over to the Treasurer of the State Association, to be used as directed by the State Association.

We further submit the following Resolution No. 2.

WHEREAS: The N. C. State Association of Free Will Baptist, has not for several years, had a Board of Education, and Free Will Baptist in N. C. have been sending their Christian Education Funds directly to the Free Will Baptist Bible College in Nashville, Tenn., and furthermore, Whereas; this Association has, at this session, created a "Board of Christian Education," and asked that it promote the Cause of Christian Education, receive Christian Education funds in N. C., and in general cooperate with the National Educational Program, and WHEREAS; We want it understood that this is not in any way, intended to decrease, but rather increase our support of the National Educational Program.

Therefore be it Resolved:

First; That we direct the Board of Christian Education to proceed with their work in close cooperation with the National Educational Program, as set forth in our Constitution and By-Laws.

Second; That we direct the Board of Christian Education to organize as soon as possible and publish the name of their Treasurer, who shall receive Christian Education funds for N. C.

Third; That we direct the Board of Christian Education to seek to increase the Educational funds from N. C., during the next year, and after all actual expenses are paid, to forward our Educational funds to the Free Will Baptist Bible College in Nashville, Tenn.

Fourth; That we direct the Board of Christian Education to prepare a Constitution and By-Laws to govern their work, which shall be submitted to our next regular session for approval.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT TO FREE WILL BAPTIST ORPHANAGE TRUSTEES

The 25th annual report of the Free Will Baptist Orphanage is submitted herewith. This report covers the twelve months beginning with September 1, 1944. The following pages reflect the financial and inventory transactions for the period stated. It will be noted that several items have reached an all-time high in expenditures but it is offset by the amount of donated commodities which decreased during the year.

The Board met in regular session four times and in call sessions three times. The call meetings were in the interest of the George P. Best Estate and the Orphanage budget.

On November 4, 1944 our esteemed brother and Board Member, H. C. Wood, was called to his heavenly home. His place on the Board was given to Mr. H. M. Mallard, a very efficient man.

The budget for the year 1944 and 45 was set at \$50,000.00 and has been reached in total with a few dollars surplus to the budget but not to the needs of the Home.

Several important matters were decided upon by the Board during the year which reflects the service of the Board to the Institution. I mention a few of these as a reminder (others will be seen in report).

- 1. The Budget which was studied and after careful planning was presented and adopted.
 - 2. Employment of a full-time farm manager.
- 3. The efficient handling of the George P. Best Estate by our chairman as executor of the Will.
 - 4. The payment of the \$7,000.00 on the mortgage of the farm.
 - 5. The establishment of an Educational Loan Fund.
- 6. The quarterly reports of the Superintendent to the Board instead of monthly.
- 7. Authorizing the Superintendent to proceed with plans for chapel blue-prints and other buildings and landscaping of campus.
- 8. Hospitilization for each eligible employee and a study of workman's compensation.
 - 9. An audit of the Orphanage books for the calendar year of 1944.
- 10. The approval of an annuity plan for raising capital money and furnishing income for older people.
- 11. The approval of the erection of a boys' cottage by the Albemarle Union.
 - 12. Approval of erection of a pond on the Orphanage farm.

Other outstanding things: The discontinuance of a concert class and the inauguration of a field representative's services and case-work service through Mrs. Gertrude Ballard. The appointment of a representative within each district to work toward a united appeal for the Orphanage. The purchase of

a new truck, tractor, and a school bus for transporting our children to school and other necessary trips.

The Orphanage was joint host to the National Association July 9 through 12. The people of Middlesex and community rendered efficient service to the delegates and ministers on behalf of the Orphanage. The receipts from delegates and ministers were \$462.00. The tips for the children amounted to \$101.28. We have had several letters from delegates and officials thanking us for the efficient service rendered, all of which we are very thankful for.

The war in the European Theatre and in the Pacific Area has come to a close within this brief period and has shown to us a new period of which no one knows the total impact. At the close of this terrible conflict 48 of our boys and girls had been in the armed services. We have kept in contact with a number of them and so far we have only word of a few wounded and one death. I have seen joy come to the children and staff as a result of the peace that was proclaimed, because they had near relatives in this terrible conflict. A few of the boys who have been over and returned have come to the campus and given a short talk or personal word to the children and staff. I hope many more of them will soon be back and we re-establish our alumni meetings.

I am thankful to the faithful staff of men and women who have stuck by the Institution through those terrible days of manpower shortage and warrationing regulations. They have helped me more than I can relate to you in providing for these worthy children. I commend them to you for any consideration you can offer them.

I am listing again a few of the needs which have not been completely provided for.

- 1. The chapel.
 - 2. Boys' Cottage.
- 3. Dairy Barn.
 - 4. Recreational equipment.

Adding to these a full-time business manager, full-time case worker, and full-time religious director. There are others I can think of but if we strive to attain these objectives within the year our service will be more complete to the children.

While we do not know what the post-war plans and production will be for goods and distribution, I am fully confident that the need of service to children will be increased and demands for our care will be stepped up. We are now receiving more inquiries for placement of children than in any war year. Many of these inquiries are for children from broken homes and separated parents. In the past our service has been chiefly to either half-orphans or whole orphans but I predict that we will be called upon to render service to children from other causes than death of parents. Let us continue to plan and prepare for the service to the needy children. I solicit your continued cooperation in this worthwhile work of Christian service to the little ones of our beloved denomination.

I am thankful for all the gifts and especially the loyalty and devotion of

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each friend of the Orphanage and particularly those committees and officers who have worked faithfully. It has been shown clearly that the Orphanage is the pride of the denomination. I hope that each one who has helped in its support has derived a peculiar joy in that service.

- 1. The Association was first scheduled to convene with the Beulaville Church, at their invitation.
- 2. On August 15, 1945, the Pastor and Rev. S. A. Smith of the Beulaville Church went before the Executive Committee, and informed them that the food conditions around Beulaville, due to War restrictions, were such that it would work a great hardship on that Church to entertain the Association at its usual time. The Executive Committee then decided that about the only thing that we could do would be to delay the convening of the Association, so it was decided to delay until December 12, 1945, to meet at Beulaville if they so desired it.
- 3. Upon learning of this action, some of our people felt that this delay would greatly handicap some of our work, and the desire was expressed, that we could meet at the usual time. Upon learning of these facts the Kenly Free Will Baptist Church extended an official invitation, on August 19, 1945, that the 1945 session of the Association be held with them. This news was given to the President of this Association and after discussion with several of the members of the Executive Committee, the President made the announcement that the 1945 session would be held at Kenly, N. C., at its regular time.

- 1. That we now officially approve the action of the President in making the above mentioned change.

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS OF THE NORTH CAROLINA STATE ASSOCIATION OF THE ORIGINAL FREE WILL BAPTIST CHURCHES

Preamble

We, the Original Free Will Baptists of North Carolina, assembled in order to advance, promote and increase the cause of Jesus Christ, do establish and ordain this Constitution and these By-Laws.

CONSTITUTION Article I.

Section 1. This assembly shall be known as the North Carolina State Association of the Original Free Will Baptist church of Jesus Christ.

Article II.

Section 1. The officers of the Association shall be President, Vice-President, Recording Secretary, Field Secretary, Treasurer and Executive Board.

Section 2. The Association shall be composed of all the ordained ministers belonging to the Association; one delegate from each church in good standing; one delegate from each Union Meeting, Conference and Association in good standing for every one thousand members or a fraction thereof.

BY-LAWS

Article I.

Section 1. It shall be the duty of the President to preside over each session, preserve order, govern the body according to established parliamentary usage and appoint all temporary committees. He shall have power to declare any office of the Association vacant, temporarily, subject to the approval of the Executive Committee.

Section 2. The duties of the Vice-President shall be the duties of the President when that officer is not present.

Section 3. The Recording Secretary shall keep an accurate record of the transactions of the Association and preserve the same, keep all valuable documents and surrender the same to his successor in office.

Section 4. The Field Secretary shall have charge of preparing statistical tables showing the increase or decrease in membership, church property, etc., and read at each session of the Annual Association and refer same to the Recording Secretary for permanent record. He shall have charge of placing all the work of the Association before the various Conferences and Associations. Also the field work in general.

Section 5. All money belonging to the Association shall be kept by the Treasurer and paid out by him only by order of the Association. Bills not having been voted to be paid either by the Association or its Executive Board must be signed by the President and Recording Secretary before being paid by him.

Section 6. The work of the Executive Board shall be that of the Association when the Association is not in session and to call extra sessions when such becomes necessary. It shall have the authority to suspend any officer of the Association when he or she proves a failure in official duties, proves non-Christian in official or any other work or detrimental to the cause of Christ and appoint others to fill the vacancy; also fill vacancies made by any other cause. Officers thus appointed shall hold office until the next regular session of the Association. This Committee shall be composed of the President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, and three members to be elected from the floor of the Association at the regular time for electing officers.

Section 7. The President and Field Secretary of the Association shall be ex-officia members of all Boards.

Section 8. The duties of the Board of Finance shall be to work out a complete financial system for our entire state concerning all our financial requirements; to put same into operation; to revise and change from year to year as necessity may demand, and to apportion the funds of the Association.

Section 9. The duties of the Board of Superannuation shall be to provide for our aged, retired and infirm Ministers in some form of a superannuation.

Section 10. The duties of the Board of Missions shall be to regulate and supervise all mission work in North Carolina and the Foreign Mission program as sponsored by the National Association. It shall be further their duties to raise money for the Mission program and to build sentiment favorable to missions.

Section 11. The duties of the Board of Christian Education shall be to keep our people informed about the Christian Education Program of our Church; endeavor to promote the cause of Christian Education, receive funds for Christian Education, and place same as they are instructed by the State Association, and in general to co-operate with the National Educational program.

Article II.

Section 1. The method of the Association shall be to departmentalize the work and place at the head of each department a Board which shall be governed by certain rules adopted by the Association.

Section 2. Delegates from churches, Union Meetings, Conferences and Associations shall answer to roll calls and serve in whatever capacity they may be called upon by the Association. They shall have the right to speak.

on any subject before the Association by first addressing the President and obtaining the floor.

Article III.

The following named Boards shall be elected in the following manner:

Section 1. Orphanage Board. The Board of Trustees for the management and control of the Free Will Baptist Orphan Home at Middlesex, N. C., shall be composed of five members elected for a period of five years; the Association to fill the vacancy.

Section 2. Board of Finance. The Board of Finance shall be composed of six members elected for a term of three years with two members retiring each year and others elected by the Association to fill the vacancy.

Section 3. Board of Superannuation. The Board of Superannuation shall be composed of six members elected for a term of three years with two members retiring each year and others elected by the Association to fill the vacancy.

Section 4. Board of Missions. The Board of Missions shall be composed of five members. The term of office being one, two, three, four and five years. The first man named being last to go off or the fifth man, the others in similar order.

Section 5. Board of Christian Education. The Board of Christian Education shall be composed of three members elected for a term of three years with one member retiring each year and another elected by the Association to fill the vacancy.

AMENDMENTS

This Constitution and these By-Laws shall not be changed or altered only by a two-thirds vote of members present in a regular session. All amendments shall lie on the table not less than six hours prior to adoption and shall during that time be read not less than twice in open Association.

PROCEEDINGS

The Sixth Annual Session of the N. C. F. W. B. Sunday School Convention-Institute convened with St. Mary's F. W. B. Church, New Bern, North Carolina, Friday, April 27, 1945. Our theme for the day was "Teaching the Word," and the text was "Faithful men who shall be able to teach others," II Timothy 2: 2.

Rev. J. Albert Harris, Music Director, opened the meeting promptly at 9:30 A. M. with congregational singing.

Our morning devotion was conducted by Rev. W. B. Everett, Pastor of the host church. His subject was taken from John 14: 26, "He shall teach you all things." His talk was very interesting. He cited us to Jesus as our greatest teacher.

Walter R. Sandlin, Superintendent of St. Mary's Sunday School, gave a warm welcome to the delegates, ministers, and visitors present. Raymond T. Sasser, President of the convention, delivered the response, stating that they were glad to be at St. Mary's for the convention. He also reviewed the program for the convention, and gave a brief review of goals and standard of work to be reached during the coming year.

At ten o'clock the opening business session was called to order. Before we entered into the business, Rev. L. E. Ballard led in prayer. In his prayer he prayed that everything during the convention would be carried out as Jesus would have it. After this the temporary committees were appointed as follows:

Finance: Charles Simpson, Floyd P. Harris, Mrs. Debbie Hardison.

Resolution: Dan Sasser, Mrs. W. E. Branch, Rev. Henry Melvin.

Digest of Reports: Rev. L. E. Ballard, Richard Lamm, Mrs. Rosa Murphy.

Field Secretary Program: Rev. R. P. Harris, Mrs. L. E. Ballard, Rev. J. R. Bennett.

Old business was brought forward regarding the textbook which the 1944 session authorized the Executive Board to have written, subject to action of the National Sunday School Convention. It was pointed out that a book is being used, but it is not of our denomination; yet it is serviceable. A motion was made and carried to elect a committee to study the question of this convention sponsoring the writing of a textbook or further await action of the National Sunday School Convention. Their report was to be given in the afternon session. The following were elected: Rev. Bruce Barrow, Chairman; Rev. Henry Melvin, Mrs. Alice E. Lupton.

During the discussion of the motion, prior to the vote, two schools of thought were ably presented. Rev. Henry Melvin suggested that the textbook should come from our National Convention. Mr. Dan Sasser, Wilson, N. C., suggested that it would not matter if we had two textbooks. He suggested that a committee go to work on it at an early date and let it come

from the state. If the National Association wished to adop it they might do so. If they wished to write one also, both could be used.

A written report from the convention officers and directors was submitted. Oral reports were given by other officers and directors.

It has been a pleasure to have had the privilege of serving you during the past year. I have not done all that I should have done, but what I have done has been to the best of my ability. S. program; represented or appointed a proxy at State Association and at State Association Executive Committee Meetings; held one Executive Committee meeting of our Executive Board; and have tried as best I could to promote our work at all times.

REPORT OF DIRECTOR OF DENOMINATIONAL ENTERPRISES TO THE NORTH CAROLINA STATE SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION, APRIL 27, 1945

Of our Denominational Enterprises, I desire to call your attention to the following as being of special interest to the Sunday Schools of our State:

1—THE PRESS

Our press located at Ayden, North Carolina is the publisher of our Sunday School Quarterlies, F. W. B. L. Quarterlies, Song Books, our National Weekly Magazine, the Free Will Baptist. There are minutes and other matter. This great enterprise distributes Bibles and other Religious books, also Church and Sunday School supplies.

2-THE ORPHANAGE

This Institution maintains an enrollment of 85 boys and girls per year. The entrance age is 3 to 12 years. The enrollment age is 3 to 18 years. The cost per year per child, for a five year average is \$384.00 for food, clothing, salary, medical, and educational care.

3-MISSIONS

Included in this world-wide enterprise are the Cuban School of Missions

for the training of native workers, the maintenance of preaching stations in several areas in a given province.

The India Station with several native teachers and one full-time missionary.

4—THE FREE WILL BAPTIST BIBLE COLLEGE

This Institution has an enrollment of 32 for the school year of 1944-45, with a graduating class of 12. The faculty of five is specializing in the training of Preachers, Christian workers, and Missionaries.

5—CHURCH FINANCE ASSOCIATION

The business of this organization is the financing of new churches, parsonages, Sunday School buildings, and other equipment, repairs and replacements for institutions and re-financing existing loans and mortgages.

All the above, together with all the undertakings of our Church, deserve the earnest and prayerful consideration of all our Sunday Schools.

I, therefore, as Director of Denominational Enterprises, recommend to this State Sunday School Convention, that all Sunday Schools in this state support our "Five Point Program," that each Sunday School give its offering one Sunday during the period denoted by the Church, to the various objects of the "Five Point Program," and that the offering be made as large as possible.

Our convention message was preached by Rev. T. E. Beaman. His subject was taken from II Timothy 2: 2, "Faithfully Teaching the Word." He stressed that we must be faithful in our teaching and if we are to be faithful in our teaching, we must first believe ourselves. Also, we must have an understanding knowledge of what we are teaching. If we go to God for divine leadership we will certainly teach God's word.

At the noon hour we were served a delicious lunch in the dining hall of the Tabernacle Baptist Church by our host church. We enjoyed, also an hour of social recreation.

After the lunch hour we were again led in congregational singing by the Music Director. Our afternoon devotion was conducted by Rev. W. E. Anderson, who took his subject from Col. 1: 28, "Teaching every man in all wisdom."

Special music was rendered by the host Sunday School. Included in this were two solos and a quartette.

A round-table discussion was conducted by Rev. Bruce Barrow. A playlette was given by the leader and Mrs. L. E. Ballard. It was very amusing, but had a lot of thought in it. He stated that the ministry should see the need of a Sunday School and try to help it to be a better school. One of his questions in which several took part was "Who is teacher?"
