

The Thirty-Fifth Session of the State Convention of North Carolina convened with Shady Grove Church, Sampson County, Wednesday morning,

September 17, 1947.

"All Hail the Power of Jesus Name," led by Rev. R. P. Harris, was sung by the congregation. Prayer by Rev. J. D. Vernelson. Brother Harris sang as a solo "No Longer Lonely." Scripture: 11 Peter 1:1. Prayer by Rev. Harris.

Rev. Bob Woolley, pastor of the local church, extended a cordial welcome to the Convention and an appreciative response was made by Rev. J. A. Harris.

REPORT OF EXECUTIVE BOARD (Adopted)

The Executive Board of the North Carolina State Association met November 14, 1946, in the Free Will Baptist Church, Ayden, N. C. Prayer was offered by Rev. W. E. Anderson.

Members present: M. L. Johnson, J. W. Alford, R. N. Hinnant, R. W. Mallard, S. A. Smith, J. R. Bennett, M. A. Woodard proxy for D. W. Alexander.

Visitors present: W. E. Anderson, R. B. Spencer and Mrs. R. W. Mallard.
The President called the meeting to order and a letter was read from J.
E. Ingalls in reference to publishing a new Hymn Book. It was moved and carried that the letter be referred to the Free Will Baptist Press.

The question of employing a Field Secretary was informally discussed and a motion was made and carried that the matter of employment be deferred until December 2, 1946; that the President of the Executive Board contact the Orphanage and Mission Boards and explain the purpose of a Field Secretary, that these Boards might give consideration in helping to finance said Secretary.

By motion, a Committee of three be elected to write out the duties, responsibilities and amount of employment expected of a Field Secretary, together with compensation and expenses for same.

Committee elected: M. L. Johnson, R. N. Hinnant, S. A. Smith.

My motion, the report of the Cragmont Assembly Ground be withheld from the permanent minutes, because of certain discrepancies with the Auditor's report.

. By motion, this Executive Board recommend the changing of the name of the State Body back to its original name "State Convention."

Motion the President of this Executive Board be the Chairman of a special committee of three to work with committees appointed by the various Conferences and State Association to study and make recommendations to these bodies regarding the adoption of the National Treatise. Committee: J. R. Bennett and R. N. Hinnant.

Motion the report of the retiring Field Secretary be adopted. Motion to adjourn and benediction by S. A. Smith.

The Executive Board met in a called session December 2, 1946, in the Free Will Baptist Church, Ayden, N. C., at 10:00 A. M.

Members present: M. L. Johnson, J. W. Alford, R. N. Hinnant, J. R. Bennett, R. W. Mallard, D. W. Alexander. D. W. Alexander served as proxy for S. A. Smith.

Visitors present: Levi Hill, J. C. Moye, J. A. Evans, H. M. Mallard, Mrs. Alice Lupton, M. A. Woodard, L. B. Manning.

Prayer by Rev. D. W. Alexander.

The President stated the purpose of the meeting was to consider the employment of a Field Secretary. After much discussion, a motion was made that a committee of two be elected to work with R. N. Hinnant in employing a Secretary and work out plans for setting up an office for same. Committee elected: D. W. Alexander and J. W. Alford.

Rev. J. R. Bennett was asked to make the Committee a proposition.

Rev. Bruce Barrow's membership on Cragmont Board of Stockholders was declared vacant and Rev. J. R. Bennett was elected to fill the vacancy. (Bro. Barrow was a member of the same Board by virtue of his election in the Sunday School Convention, held in 1946.)

Revs. J. R. Bennett, D. W. Alexander, J. W. Alford were appointed a committee to study and make recommendations to the Executive Board, relative to allocating 25 per cent of the State Association Funds to the National Association.

Motion to adjourn and Benediction by Rev. L. B. Manning.

The President called the Executive Board in session January 20, 1947, at the F. W. B. Press, Ayden, N. C.

Motion that M. L. Johnson and R. N. Hinnant constitute a committee to locate the 1947 session of the Association and that J. A. Evans work with the above-named committee in arranging a program for said session.

By motion J. A. Evans was placed on the Mission Board in the place of W. R. Williams. The reason for said motion was that Bro. Williams did not attend meetings of the Board.

The question of employing of Rev. J. R. Bennett as Field Secretary was taken up and Bro. Bennett made the Board a proposition. After much discussion, Bro. Bennett, by motion, was allowed to withdraw his proposal.

The arranging and distribution of the Six Point Program placards were left in the hands of the President and Secretary for distribution.

It was moved and carried that the sixth point in this program be known as "State Promotional Work."

A letter was read from the National Executive Secretary relative to raising money for constructing a building for headquarters of the National Association.

By motion the above referred to letter was tabled indefinitely. Motion to adjourn and benediction by Rev. J. W. Alford.

The President called a meeting of the Executive Board in the Church at Lucama, N. C., May 14, 1947.

The President stated the purpose of the meeting was to hear complaints from the Executive Committee of the Eastern Conference concerning a preacher by the name of Clare Vandenburg. After the presenting the complaints and discussion, the following was adopted:

In view of the fact that one by the name of Clare Vandenburg, representing himself as an evangelist, has caused much confusion in some churches in eastern North Carolina, and has denounced our doctrine and many of our ministers publicly, we, the Executive Committee of the State Association of the original Free Will Baptists of North Carolina, in session on May 14, 1947, do recommend to every church and minister of the original Free Will Baptist Church in North Carolina, that they have no dealings with the said Clare Vandenburg and accord him no recognition or privilege in connection with our church work.

The President's annual message was delivered by Rev. M. L. Johnson. He called attention to the progress being made by the state body and then made some recommendations to the body to act upon.

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The Resolutions Committee made a report and recommended a change in the Constitution of the Convention as follows: (Article 1, Section 1) "This Assembly shall be known as the North Carolina State Convention of the Original Free Will Baptist churches of Jesus Christ."

Resolved that the Clerk be empowered and instructed to change the word "Association" to "Convention" wherever the word "Association" is used in the Constitution and By-Laws.

The report was read at 11:10 A. M. and a motion was made that the above proposed amendment be acted upon as the first order of business tomorrow morning at 10:00 A. M.

Resolution: Resolved that the motion found on page 16 of the 1943 minutes of the State Association reading as follows be rescinded and the money used to support a Field Secretary as a Promotional Worker: (The Motion)

That we go on record as approving the work of the National Program; that 25% of all funds coming into this State body annually be allocated to the Unified Program of the National Association.

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Resolution: Resolved that the motion found on page 17 of the 1943 minttes of the State Association reading as follows be rescinded: (The motion) That we recommend to the Conferences, Associations, Union Meetings the allocation of 25% of their funds to the Unified Fund of the National Association, and that the Field Secretary of this Association be charged with the responsibility of taking this recommendation to the aforesaid bodies.

Resolution: Be it resolved that Article 3, Section 1 of the Constitution read as follows: The Board of Trustees for the management and control of the Free Will Baptist Orphan Home at Middlesex, N. C., shall be composed of nine members with three retiring each year, the Convention to fill the vacancies.

Resolution: Resolved that we assure the National Association that our withdrawal of the 25% of our income from the Unified Program does not interfere with our fellowship in Christ and that we support the National

Resolution: That this Convention express by a rising vote of thanks to the people of Shady Grove and neighboring churches for the splendid way they cared for the 1947 Convention.

Rev. M. L. Johnson made a verbal report of the promotional work done during the past year and it was received as information.

By motion the President and Secretary draw up suitable information and

present to the Associated Press to clarify the difference between the Original Free Will Baptist and the Free Will Holiness churches and then consult legal authority, if necessary, to make a distinction between the two denominations.

See report below:

Whereas the following conditions do exist:

- 1. There is a group of Churches, in the state of North Carolina, centered chiefly in and around Harnett and Sampson Counties, who call themselves, and are known by some as Free Will Baptist, but in fact are not a part of the Original Free Will Baptist Denomination, they having "pulled out" of said Denomination over thirty (30) years ago, as a result of disagreements over the Doctrines and Practices generally associated with the "Holiness" Churches. The above mentioned Churches have in the past been known as the Free Will Holiness Churches, but in recent years have referred to themselves, and have been referred to by the public press as Free Will Baptist.
- 2. On September 17, 1947, there appeared on the front page of the News and Observer, a daily newspaper published in Raleigh, N. C., an article telling of the deplorable conduct of one L. V. Davis, former Superintendent of the Dunn Free Will Baptist Orphanage of Dunn, N. C. In this article the said L. V. Davis is listed as a Free Will Baptist minister and the Orphanage as the Free Will Baptist Orphanage, the facts being that the Orphanage, the Church Officials, and the minister mentioned in said article are all of the Free Will Holiness group. This incident, as well as many others in which this group is not properly identified, has brought considerable embarrassment upon the Original Free Will Baptist Denomination.
- 3. There is a State Association of Free Will Baptist in this state, which is recognized by the National Association of Free Will Baptist, as the Origiral Free Will Baptist of North Carolina. This convention is in annual session at Shady Grove Free Will Baptist Church, Route 5, Dunn, N. C., on September 17, 18, 1947.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED:

- 7.1. That this the thirty-fifth annual session of the State Convention of Original Free Will Baptist of North Carolina, go on record as deploring the fact that the Free Will Holiness have not been properly identified in the mind of the public.
- 2. That we supply to a representative of the News and Observer, and the Associated Press, this information, and respectfully request that it be given Front Page publication, and that it be considered in future publication.
- 3. That our Executive Committee be instructed to contact the officials of the Free Will Holiness group and petition them to use "Christian Fairness" in identifying themselves before the public.
- 4. That we do hereby inform the general public that the above mentioned L. V. Davis, the Free Will Baptist Orphanage of Dunn. N. C., and the

Church officials mentioned in the News and Observer of Sept. 17, 1947, are no part of the Original Free Will Baptist Denomination and that said Orphanage is in no way connected with our Free Will Baptist Orphanage, located at Middlesex, N. C., of which Rev. James A. Evans is superintendent.

5. That we invite our National Association to verify these facts by an article released by its duly elected officials.

Report of Orphanage Board (Adopted).

THE SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT TO THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

The 27th annual report of the Free Will Baptist Orphanage is submitted herewith for your consideration and approval. The financial standing of the Institution and its transactions during the year are shown on the following pages. The social service and the care of children is summarized and a listing of the children by names and associations is set forth. The year has been filled with activity in every department. The general conditions have improved since the close of the war with the exception of an increased cost of food and clothing and other supplies. The giving has also increased, but not to a degree that would make for security as is shown by the bank balance.

The church building program has been taking much of my time and we have made some progress. The building will be closed in by Thanksgiving. The size of the building and the cost have been exceedingly more than I first estimated five years ago. The people are responding to our requests in the drive for memorial windows and doors. I trust that we can receive enough support other than would be needed in the care of the children to finish this building and equip it.

The farm has been operated on the tenant system and a nice crop is in prospect of harvest. The grain and hay crops are the best I have seen on the Massey farm. The dairy expansion program has proven to be an asset. This phase of our farm program should receive our immediate attention in the erection of a modern dairy barn. The other departments such as poultry, swine, and garden have also helped to supply the needs of the table.

The Young People's Friend has been published and distributed at an average of 1,000 copies per month. The subscription returns have been very low for the year. The interest however has been very good and I recommend that we continue it with a renewed interest in subscriptions.

I have used the services of three field representatives whose reports are included on a separate sheet. They each did a fine piece of work for us wherever they went.

Each child and staff member is now protected by a group hospitalization insurance. The experience with this company has been so good that they

have increased our daily cost from \$4.00 to \$5.00 per day while in the hospital. On the employees we have Workmen's Compensation insurance coverage and one claim has been made and paid as a result of injury on the church building program.

The McLeod Educational Loan Fund has gone into use and we now have pending another application. I believe that we need to increase this fund in order to serve our boys and girls who are graduating from high school.

Rev. F. A. Rivenbark has served the Orphanage Church on first Sunday afternoons. His work has been very commendable and the children have enjoyed his messages. He and others conducted a very successful Vacation Bible School and Youth Revival. Several of the children were converted and baptized during the year.

I am recommending that the Board set up a budget for the operations for the next year at not less than \$75,000.00. Several of the recommendations made over the past few years have now come to pass and only a few remain to be completed that I have not mentioned. I am listing again the things we have not provided for. 1. The erection of the Albemarle Cottage. 2. The erection of the Dairy Barn. 3. Repairs and re-equipping the present buildings. 4. Recreational equipment.

I am glad to report that I have employed as authorized by you, Miss Louise Edgerton, to serve us as Director of Social Service and assistant to the Superintendent. Miss Edgerton will begin her duties September 1.

Again I take my hat off to the staff and employees who have served so faithfully throughout the year in the care of our precious boys and girls. They have worked hard and long hours to make possible the report that I have been able to turn in to you today. You, as Board Members, have shown an increased interest in the future of the Orphanage and it has given inspiration to me at a time that I seemed to be crossing the Red Sea in experience. Our Institution is considered small as compared to others but its services are recognized now by outstanding authorities in child care. By the grace of God may we continue to do the things to make it better and bigger until every worthy child who knocks on our door can be admitted. It is still the pride of North Carolina Free Will Baptists.

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS OF THE NORTH CAROLINA STATE CONVENTION OF THE ORIGINAL FREE WILL BAPTIST CHURCHES

Preamble

We, the Original Free Will Baptists of North Carolina, assembled in order to advance, promote and increase the cause of Jesus Christ, do establish and ordain this Constitution and these By-Laws.

CONSTITUTION

Article I.

Section 1. This assembly shall be known as the North Carolina State Convention of the Original Free Will Baptist churches of Jesus Christ.

Article II.

Section 1. The officers of the Convention shall be President, Vice-President, Recording Secretary, and Treasurer.

Section 2. The Convention shall be composed of all the ordained ministers belonging to the Association; one delegate from each church in good standing; one delegate from each Union Meeting, Conference and Association in good standing for every one thousand members or a fraction thereof.

BY-LAWS

Article I.

Section 1. It shall be the duty of the President to preside over each ses-

sion, preserve order, govern the body according to established parliamentary usage and appoint all temporary committees. He shall have power to declare any office of the Convention vacant, temporarily, subject to the approval of the Executive Committee.

Section 2. The duties of the Vice-President shall be the duties of the President when that officer is not present.

Section 3. The Recording Secretary shall keep an accurate record of the transactions of the Convention and preserve the same, keep all valuable documents and surrender the same to his successor in office.

Section 4. The Field Secretary shall have charge of preparing statistical tables showing the increase or decrease in membership, church property, etc., and read at each session of the Annual Convention and refer same to the Recording Secretary for permanent record. He shall have charge of placing all the work of the Convention before the various Conferences and Associations. Also the field work in general.

Section 5. All money belonging to the Convention shall be kept by the Treasurer and paid out by him only by order of the Convention. Bills not having been voted to be paid either by the Convention or its Executive Committee must be signed by the President and Recording Secretary before being paid by him.

Section 6. The work of the Executive Committee shall be that of the Convention when the Convention is not in session and to call extra sessions when such becomes necessary. It shall have the authority to suspend any officer of the Convention when he or she proves a failure in official duties, proves non-Christian in official or any other work or detrimental to the cause of Christ and appoint others to fill the vacancy; also fill vacancies made by any other cause. Officers thus appointed shall hold office until the next regular session of the Convention. This Committee shall be composed of the President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, and three members to be elected from the floor of the Convention at the regular time for electing officers.

Section 7. The President of the Convention shall be ex-officio member of all Boards.

Section 8. The duties of the Board of Finance shall be to work out a complete financial system for our entire state concerning all our financial requirements; to put same into operation; to revise and change from year to year as necessity may demand, and to apportion the funds of the Convention.

Section 9. The duties of the Board of Superannuation shall be to provide for our aged, retired and infirm Ministers in some form of a superannuation.

Section 10. The duties of the Board of Missions shall be to regulate and supervise all mission work in North Carolina and the Foreign Mission program as sponsored by the National Association. It shall be further their duties to raise money for the Mission program and to build sentiment favorable to missions.

Section 11. The duties of the Board of Christian Education shall be to leep our people informed about the Christian Education Program of our Church; endeavor to promote the cause of Christian Education, receive funds

for Christian Education, and place same as they are instructed by the State Convention, and in general to co-operate with the National Educational program.

Article II.

Section 1. The method of the Convention shall be to departmentalize the work and place at the head of each department a Board which shall be governed by certain rules adopted by the Convention.

Section 2. Delegates from churches, Union Meetings, Conferences, and Associations shall answer to roll calls and serve in whatever capacity they may be called upon by the Convention. They shall have the right to speak on any subject before the Convention by first addressing the President and obtaining the floor.

Article III.

The following named Boards shall be elected in the following manner:

Section 1. Orphanage Board. The Board of Trustees for the management and control of the Free Will Baptist Orphan Home at Middlesex, N. C., shall be composed of nine members elected for a period of three years; the Convention to fill the vacancy. Three retiring each year.

Section 2. Board of Finance. The Board of Finance shall be composed of six members elected for a term of three years with two members retiring each year and others elected by the Convention to fill the vacancy.

Section 3. Board of Superannuation. The Board of Superannuation shall be composed of six members elected for a term of three years with two members retiring each year and others elected by the Convention to fill the vacancy.

Section 4. Board of Missions. The Board of Missions shall be composed of five members. The term of office being one, two, three, four and five years. One member retiring each year.

Section 5. Board of Christian Education. The Board of Christian Education shall be composed of three members elected for a term of three years with one member retiring each year and the Convention to fill the vacancy.

AMENDMENTS

This Constitution and these By-Laws shall not be charged or altered only by a two-thirds vote of members present in a regular session. All amendments shall lie on the table not less than six hours prior to adoption and shall during that time be read not less than twice in open Convention.

PROCEEDINGS

The Eighth Annual Session of the North Carolina Free Will Baptist Sunday School Convention-Institute convened with Reedy Branch Free Will Baptist Church, near Winterville, N. C., Friday, April 25, 1947. The theme for the day was :"Church Schools—Go Ye;" the text: "Go ye therefore and teach... all things," Matthew 28:19-20; the hymn: "To the Work."

After the registration and officers' conference at 9:30 a. m., our meeting was opened by congregation singing directed by Rev. Bob Wooley, music director. Mr. Clarence Vinson, superintendent of Reedy Branch Sunday School ,led our morning devotion, using a shis subject: "Systematic Prayer." In the devotion Mr. Vinson stated that Reedy Branch was happy to entertain this year's assembly of our Convention.

At 10:15 the president delivered his annual message. It has been condensed for inclusion in the minutes by the secretary. The text of his message was to review the goals that had been set and accomplished and to outline goals that need to be kept ever before us that our schools may become standard soul winning schools. The condensed message is as follows:

Our convention was organized in September, 1940, today is the date of our eighth annual session. Ours is the youngest state organization in our denomination, young in years but experienced in service.

Today I am offering my resignation, after having had the privilege of serving as your president for eight years. I am happy to have been able to serve. To Him goes the credit for what has been accomplished. My prayers go with your next president and official board for a period of steady

growth of our local Sunday Schools and all their organizations, districts, state and national.

At this time, let us make a brief review of our goals thus far:

A. 1940—planned to make our organization a "Convention-Institute." This year we will have six weeks institute work at Cragmont.

- 8. 1940—planned to begin a state-wide campaign to buy or build a state Assembly Ground for the use of our denomination. Cragmont Assembly, Inc., is a reality.
 - C. 1940—planned to encourage schools to use better records.
 - D. 1940—planned to educate all schools to become standard.
 - E. 1940—planned to provide Field Secretary work.

The following goals need to be accomplished to the glory of God.

- A. We need a full time secretary.
- B. We need Sunday School rooms in every church.
- C. Every Sunday School should conduct annual Sunday School training courses.
 - D. Every Sunday School should have a Sunday School Council.
 - E. Every Sunday School should be using six point records.
 - F. We need a Free Will Baptist Sunday School Textbook.

All our goals can be reached if we follow the motto of our convention and sincerely WORK, STUDY AND PRAY.

A motion was made to accept the minutes of the 1946 session without their being read. The motion carried.

Minutes of the Executive Board for the past year were read and approved by motion.

A registration of all present was conducted by the president at the end of the introductory business session. The results are as follows: Sunday School superintendents, 16; Sunday School teachers, 30; General class officers, 25; Ministers, 23; Others, 200.

24 had attended Sunday School last year without missing a single Sunday. Mr. H. J. Corbett of Micro has served as Superintendent continuously for 21 years. He also has attended Sunday School 27 years without missing a single Sunday.

Rev. R. P. Harris, Director of the 1947 session Sunday School Institute, sent word that he was sick and was therefore unable to make his report.

Special music was rendered by Miss Gladys Hines and Mrs. J. T. Beddard Jr.

Rev. F. A. Rivenbark delivered the convention message using as his subject, "Church Schools Go-Ye."

We were dismissed to enjoy the splendid lunch prepared by the ladies of Reedy Branch Church.

Afternoon Session

Panel Discussion: "Advantages of the North Carolina Sunday School Convention's Monthly Plan for supporting Denominational Enterprises" was conducted by Rev. Rashie Kennedy, moderator: The following took part in the panel discussion: Rev. J. Albert Harris, representing Cragmont Assembly; Rev. M. L. Johnson, representing Church Finance Association and Superannuation; Rev. J. A. Evans, representing the orphanage; Rev. C. L. Patrick, representing Christian Education; Rev. J. W. Alford, representing Missions; and Albert Coates substituted for James Taylor and H. J. Corbett, representing the Superintendents of the Sunday Schools through the state. After all who were scheduled to speak had had an opportunity to discuss the merits of the plan for the Enterprise they represented, the delegates and visitors were also given an opportunity to participate. The spontaneous enthusiasm with which the North Carolina Sunday Convention's Monthly Plan for supporting Denominational Enterprises has been accepted both before and at the Convention left no doubt in the minds of those present that it would become a real benefactor for the Denominational Enterprises of our denomination.

- 1. That we request the State Association of Free Will Baptist, to endorse the Sunday School Convention's plan of systematic offerings, and that it not only be endorsed; but urged to the extent that all churches shall know of the plan as far as possible.
- 2. That the Convention in session today elect some person to represent us in this request at the annual session this September, 1947.
- 3. Today we have enjoyed the hospitality and kindness shown us by the people of Reedy Branch, therefore be it resolved, that we extend to the church and community a rising vote of thanks as a token of our appreciation.
