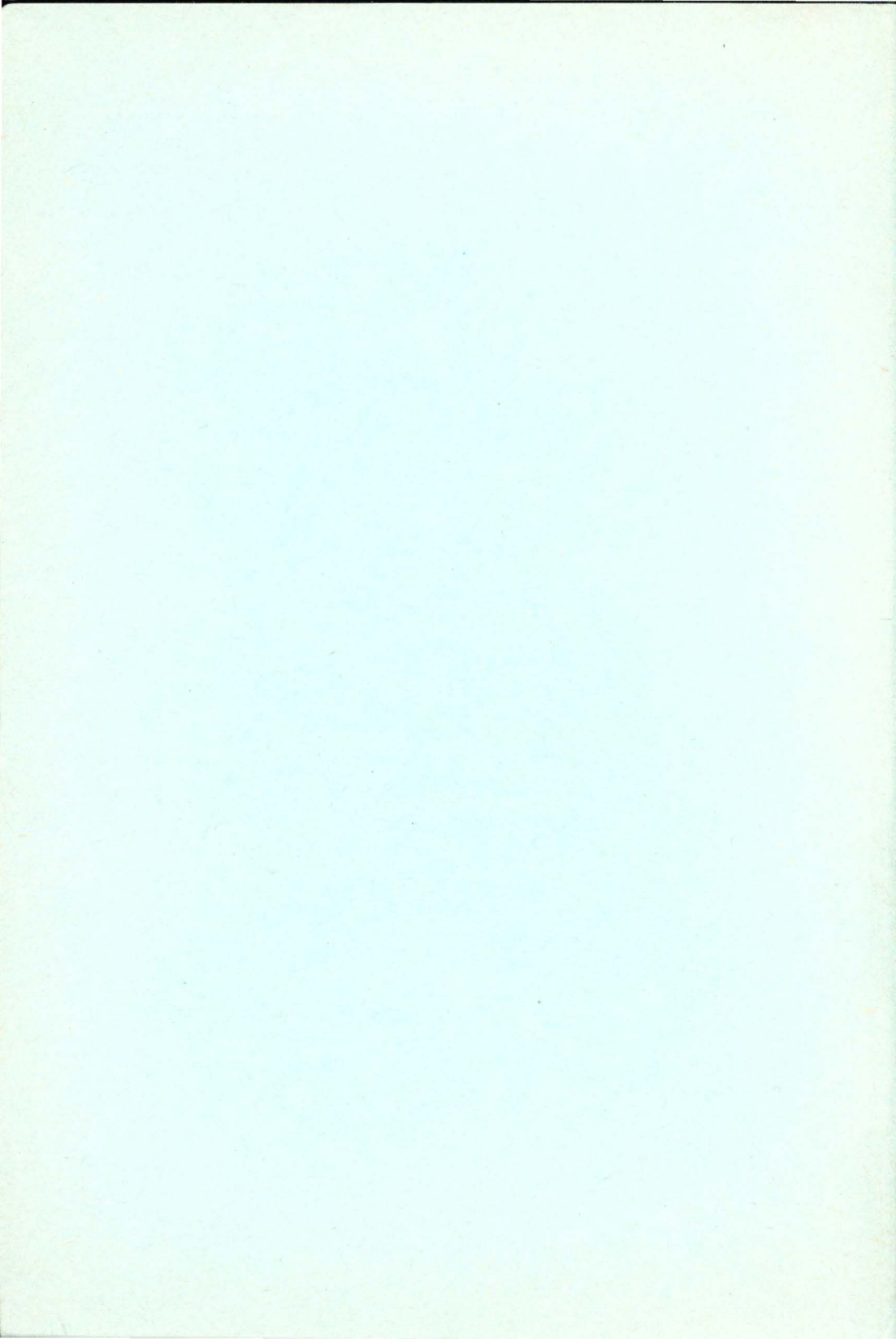

Rev. David Hansley, pastor of the local church, extended a hearty welcome to ministers, delegates and visitors and Rev. L. B. Manning responded.

MINUTES OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD

(Adopted)

The Executive Committee of the North Carolina State Convention held its annual session in the Free Will Baptist Press at Ayden, N. C., November 10, 1947.

Prayer was offered by Rev. D. W. Alexander.

It was moved and carried that the 1948 session of the Convention be held at Hull Road Church, Greene County.

Reverends M. L. Johnson, R. N. Hinnant and J. A. Evans were appointed as a committee to arrange the program for the 1948 session and also serve as a publicity committee for the Convention.

It was moved and carried that Rev. M. L. Johnson meet with the women in their annual Auxiliary Convention and suggest to them the publication of their own Minutes, beginning with their 1948 session, and that they include the District Auxiliary Minutes under the same cover.

Motion that the Superintendent of the Orphanage have Section "E" of the Charter changed so as to read, "Free Will Baptist" instead of the word "Baptist."

Motion that we go on record as approving the budget, as allocated to the various Conferences and Associations, as worked out by the Board of Trustees of the Orphanage.

Motion that this Executive Committee meet in call session, at the Orphanage, January 6, 1948, to complete business now pending before the Committee.

The Executive Committee of the North Carolina State Convention met in called session at the Orphanage January 6, 1948, at 10:00 A. M.

The meeting was opened with prayer by Rev. Walter Carter.

Visitors: Rev. J. A. Evans, Rev. Noah Brown, Rev. M. L. Baxley, Rev. W. L. Moretz, Brothers Fred Parker, Levi Hill, H. M. Mallard, Dr. M. Hinnant, R. McLeod, R. L. Spencer, Rev. Connelly.

Minutes of the meeting of November 10 were read and reviewed for information.

A letter addressed to the Superintendent of the Orphanage from the Secretary of State, Mr. Thad Eure, was read in reference to the changing of the wording of the Charter of the Orphanage. The matter was left in the hands of the Superintendent and Board of Trustees.

Motion that Rev. J. A. Evans write suitable resolutions in memory of Brother W. A. Jackson and a copy be placed in the minutes of the Executive Committee, Minutes of the Orphanage Board, a copy sent to the family, a copy to the F. W. B. Press and also the public press for publication.

A moment of silent prayer was held in memory of Bro. Jackson and concluded by Rev. J. W. Alford.

Moved and carried that Bro. R. McLeod of Dunn, N. C., Route 3 be placed on the Orphanage Board to fill the unexpired term of the late W. A. Jackson.

The Treasurer was authorized to pay \$10.00 for a wreath of flowers given at the death of Bro. Jackson out of appreciation for services he rendered to the Convention during his life time.

Rev. Bruce Barrow having moved out of the State, the two official vacancies were filled as follows: Rev. Walter Carter on the Board of Finance. Bro. R. W. Mallard to represent the F. W. B. Press Stock.

It was moved and carried that a committee of two be appointed to work out terms and plans for employing a Field Secretary and report same at the next meeting of the Executive Committee.

The Committee: Reverends R. N. Hinnant and J. W. Alford.

The Six-Point Program placards were left in the hands of the President and Secretary to have 500 printed and distributed to the churches in the State.

There was a joint session of the Executive Committee and the Orphanage Board held and Secretaries of both bodies were authorized to take the proceedings of the meeting.

The question of naming the newly erected Chapel at the Orphanage was

discussed and a letter was read from a Committee of the Cape Fear Union, requesting that it be named in honor of Bro. W. A. Jackson. After much discussion, a motion was unanimously passed, that the Superintendent of the Orphanage write the Committee making the request; that said request was declined due to criticisms that might be forthcoming, since the pioneering friends of the Orphanage had never been memorialized in any form at the home.

It was moved and carried by a unanimous vote that the newly erected church be named: "The Orphanage Memorial Chapel."

Moved the joint session of the two bodies adjourn.

Orphanage Budget

The Board of Trustees recommended to the State Convention \$75,000.00 to be raised during 1947-48 through the various conferences. The Convention approved this budget and a working arrangement between the executive committee of the Convention, its President, and the Orphanage Board and its Superintendent have allocated to each conference and association the following amounts to be raised.

Note: Bro. Woolley first gave a favorable answer as to accepting the Field Secretary's position, but later reconsidered and refused.

The president, Rev. M. L. Johnson, gave a glowing report in his message of the progress which the Convention is making with the splendid cooperation of all the different church organizations in the advancement of the cause of Christ. He stressed the importance of all churches and church organizations within the bounds of the State to be ever alert to perform their duty and responsibility in building a greater denominational work in all of the different phases of work throughout the entire State.

The congregation standing sang, "Stepping in the Light."

Rev. D. W. Alexander, President of the Free Will Baptist Press, gave a report of the Press and it was received as information.

Rev. R. N. Hinnant made a report of the Treatise Revision Committee and the report was adopted, along with the Treatise of the National Association, by a vote of ninety-eight to twenty-four.

The President suspended business for devotional services and Introductory Sermon, to be delivered by Rev. S. A. Smith.

The congregation sang "Sweetest Name I Know," and a solo, "Why Did They Treat Him So," was sung by Rev. J. A. Harris.

The Scripture was read from Jeremiah 4:1-3. Prayer by Rev. Rashie Kennedy. Text: "Break up your fallow ground." In this message a strong appeal was made unto the ministry and the laity to go forth with zeal and great determination to do more during the coming year in every phase of the work of the church. He said, "break up your fallow ground" and produce a great increase in the harvest for the Master's cause. The message was indeed appropriate for the occasion.

4—INSURANCE: The Retirement Insurance in the amount of \$2,000.00 is now available to all our ministers who can qualify for it. Application Blanks and information may be had from this Board by asking for them.

5—"GEORGE P. BEST MEMORIAL FUND": The "George P. Best Memorial Fund" was created with the amount of money received from the George P. Best Estate. This amount was, \$6,469.55. This money has been invested at 3% interest, and to date has earned a total interest of \$612.73, which has been placed in the general fund.

6—RESERVE FUND: We propose to set aside the amount of interest received from the Best Fund as a Reserve Fund and to add to it each year all interest coming from this fund. This Reserve Fund to be used in case of an emergency.

7—BUDGET: We ask that this Convention approve a budget of \$7,500.00 for the next year, to be raised for Superannuation, by the various groups in the State. We would recommend that we ask the various groups to accept the following goals: Churches, \$4,600.00; Auxiliaries, \$900.00; Sunday Schools, \$600.00; Leagues, \$50.00; Individuals, \$150.00; Conferences and Union Meetings, \$1,200.00.

8—OCTOBER DRIVE: We ask all the Pastors, and other leaders of our denomination, to help us make good in the coming October drive, by making special mention of "SUPERANNUATION MONTH."

Report of Historian

To the North Carolina State Convention—Greetings:

In the year of 1727 the first known Free Will Baptist Church was organized at Perquimans, in Chowan County, North Carolina. In doctrine it was Arminian, in government it was Congregational. The church was organized by Elder Paul Palmer and the first house of worship was builded upon a tract of land deeded to Elder Paul Palmer, by the King of England.

There is not a great deal of available information about this early church. I do hope later to find some records and other authentic information that will give us the complete history of our first church, and its founder.

Through the untiring efforts of Elder Paul Palmer and the brethren of the First Church, additional churches were organized and by 1752 a total of 16 churches had been organized, and the total number of ordained ministers was 16. The 16 churches had an approximate total membership of 1,000, which was a good membership for 16 churches considering the sparsely settled country.

In a movement of the Calvinist Baptist, later known as the Missionary Baptist, and which now emphasize themselves as **The Baptist Church**, with emphasis on the definite article Then, we lost all but four (4) of the original churches, viz.: Gum Swamp, Little Creek, Grimsley, Wheat Swamp (Wheat Swamp later was lost to the Disciples of Christ). These four original churches, encouraged by the brethren of our northern Free Will Baptist Churches, rallied, and have since experienced a normal growth and development. Our accomplishments are something of which we are proud, and today they challenge us for a forward program of progress, and particularly in the fields of Evangelism, Education, Missions, and Church buildings.

Since my task has been to piece together the history, and preserve the records of North Carolina Free Will Baptist, I have been successful in collecting many old books, records, minutes, etc., of our organizations and to preserve these for future generations. I have perhaps the greatest collection of any man in America. The task of locating the missing items is by no means complete; for it is a long, hard and tedious job to find authoritative records and piece together the whole history. Under the circumstances, I have done the best I could; I have made progress and accomplishments.

The history of the Free Will Baptist reflects that we are a people who love the Lord, and His Cause; that we are **SOMEBODY**. We have been a great missionary people, though we lost at one time all our foreign mission stations and missionaries in the consolidation with the Northern Baptist Convention. We likewise lost our Educational Institutions and they were some of the best in America at that time. We also lost our printing presses, with the exception of the School in North Carolina, and the Free Will Baptist Press at Ayden. Notwithstanding this mighty blow, we have taken courage anew and we press toward the mark of the prize of the High Calling in Christ Jesus, the Lord.

Constitution and By-Laws of the North Carolina State Convention of the Original Free Will Baptist Churches

Preamble

We, the Original Free Will Baptists of North Carolina, assembled in order to advance, promote and increase the cause of Jesus Christ, do establish and ordain this Constitution and these By-Laws.

CONSTITUTION

Article I.

Section 1. This assembly shall be known as the North Carolina State Convention of the Original Free Will Baptist churches of Jesus Christ.

Article II.

Section 1. The officers of the Convention shall be President, Vice-President, Recording Secretary, and Treasurer.

Section 2. The Convention shall be composed of all the ordained ministers belonging to the Association; one delegate from each church in good standing; one delegate from each Union Meeting, Conference and Association in good standing for every one thousand members or a fraction thereof.

BY-LAWS

Article I.

Section 1. It shall be the duty of the President to preside over each session, preserve order, govern the body according to established parliamentary usage and appoint all temporary committees. He shall have power to declare any office of the Convention vacant, temporarily, subject to the approval of the Executive Committee.

Section 2. The duties of the Vice-President shall be the duties of the President when that officer is not present.

Section 3. The Recording Secretary shall keep an accurate record of the transactions of the Convention and preserve the same, keep all valuable documents and surrender the same to his successor in office.

Section 4. The Field Secretary shall have charge of preparing statistical tables showing the increase or decrease in membership, church property, etc., and read at each session of the Annual Convention and refer same to the Recording Secretary for permanent record. He shall have charge of placing all the work of the Convention before the various Conferences and Associations. Also the field work in general.

Section 5. All money belonging to the Convention shall be kept by the Treasurer and paid out by him only by order of the Convention. Bills not having been voted to be paid either by the Convention or its Executive Committee must be signed by the President and Recording Secretary before being paid by him.

Section 6. The work of the Executive Committee shall be that of the Convention when the Convention is not in session and to call extra sessions when such becomes necessary. It shall have the authority to suspend any officer of the Convention when he or she proves a failure in official duties, proves non-Christian in official or any other work or detrimental to the cause of Christ and appoint others to fill the vacancy; also fill vacancies made by any other cause. Officers thus appointed shall hold office until the next regular session of the Convention. This Committee shall be composed of the President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, and three members to be elected from the floor of the Convention at the regular time for electing officers.

Section 7. The President of the Convention shall be ex-officio member of all Boards.

Section 8. The duties of the Board of Finance shall be to work out a complete financial system for our entire state concerning all our financial requirements; to put same into operation; to revise and change from year to

year as necessity may demand, and to apportion the funds of the Convention.

Section 9. The duties of the Board of Superannuation shall be to provide for our aged, retired and infirm Ministers in some form of a superannuation.

Section 10. The duties of the Board of Missions shall be to regulate and supervise all mission work in North Carolina and the Foreign Mission program as sponsored by the National Association. It shall be further their duties to raise money for the Mission program and to build sentiment favorable to missions.

Section 11. The duties of the Board of Christian Education shall be to keep our people informed about the Christian Education Program of our Church; endeavor to promote the cause of Christian Education, receive funds for Christian Education, and place same as they are instructed by the State Convention, and in general to co-operate with the National Educational program.

Article II.

Section 1. The method of the Convention shall be to departmentalize the work and place at the head of each department a Board which shall be governed by certain rules adopted by the Convention.

Section 2. Delegates from churches, Union Meetings, Conferences, and Associations shall answer to roll calls and serve in whatever capacity they may be called upon by the Convention. They shall have the right to speak on any subject before the Convention by first addressing the President and obtaining the floor.

Article III.

The following named Boards shall be elected in the following manner:

Section 1. Orphanage Board. The Board of Trustees for the management and control of the Free Will Baptist Orphan Home at Middlesex, N. C., shall be composed of nine members elected for a period of three years; the Convention to fill the vacancy. Three retiring each year.

Section 2. Board of Finance. The Board of Finance shall be composed of six members elected for a term of three years with two members retiring each year and others elected by the Convention to fill the vacancy.

Section 3. Board of Superannuation. The Board of Superannuation shall be composed of six members elected for a term of three years with two members retiring each year and others elected by the Convention to fill the vacancy.

Section 4. Board of Missions. The Board of Missions shall be composed of five members. The term of office being one, two, three, four and five years. One member retiring each year.

Section 5. Board of Christian Education. The Board of Christian Education shall be composed of three members elected for a term of three years with one member retiring each year and the Convention to fill the vacancy.

AMENDMENTS

This Constitution and these By-Laws shall not be charged or altered only by a two-thirds vote of members present in a regular session. All amendments shall lie on the table not less than six hours prior to adoption and shall during that time be read not less than twice in open Convention.
