

Report of Executive Committee

The Executive Committee of the North Carolina State Convention met. at Ayden, October 6, 1950.

Members present: Reverends L. B. Manning, S. A. Smith, R. N. Hinnant, J. W. Alford, L. R. Ennis, J. A. Evans.

Prayer by Rev. L. R. Ennis.

The president stated the main purpose of the meeting was to consider the resolution passed at the 1950 session of the Convention relative to a Promotional Secretary.

The following motion was passed: Whereas, the State Convention has referred to the Executive Committee for action a certain resolution which prescribes the institution of a specific agency or department with assigned administrative authority in the behalf of the various enterprises controlled by the State Convention; and whereas, said resolution is found to be in conflict with the Constitution of the Convention, therefore be it resolved:

1. This Executive Committee now in session, the 6th day of October, 1950, does hereby suspend the effect of the aforesaid resolution.

2. That in lieu of said resolution the office of "Promotional Secretary" be set up at such time and place as may be subsequently determined by this Committee.

3. That the duties of the Promotional Secretary shall be and consist of such cooperative efforts as may be agreed upon by himself and the respective boards, departments and standing committees of the State Convention.

Motion that the President, Vice-President, and Secretary serve as a committee to determine the place, time, salary and man for the promotional secretary and report to the Executive Committee for final approval.

Motion that seventy-seven dollars be paid to Rev. J. A. Evans to clear all unfinished payments for promomtional service.

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Motion that we request all churches wishing to entertain the succeeding convention to petition such on their church report to the Convention.

Rev. J. A. Evans offered his resignation as a member of the Executive Committee and it was accepted.

Rev. D. W. Alexander was elected to fill the vacancy on the Executive Committee.

The President, Vice-President, Secretary and pastor of the host church was appointed as a program committee for the 1951 session of the Convention.

Motion, the Secretary draw a contract, setting forth the duties and responsibilities of the Promotional Secretary and it be executed by the President, Secretary and M. L. Johnson.

Motion, The President and Secretary be empowered to appoint delegates to the National Association, The Secretary to notify them of their appointment and in case these delegates are not present, the President be authorized to appoint the delegates out of those present from the State.

It was moved and carried, that the Promotional Secretary serve as this Committee and that he report back to the Executive Committee, his findings and recommendations.

Motion that we go on record as approving the election of a Promotional Secretary, at the setting of the 1951 session of the Convention and we endorse our same Promotional Secretary.

Recommendations for Promotional Work

1951-1952

I-CONTINUE AS IN 1951;

The Promotional Secretary working with the different Boards in promoting the United Program. Promoting the State Convention. Cooperating with the National Association, etc. Work meetings of the various Conferences and Associations, and as many Union Meetings, and other Meetings, as possible.

II-ADD TO THE PROGRAM;

1-By the Promotional Secretary;

a—Become Receiving Center for funds for those Boards that wish to use the office as such. (Receiving funds, sending receipts for same and forwarding to respective Treasurers, as agreed upon.)

(The Board of Superannuation and Church Finance Association are already using this office as such. The Board of Christian Education is asking for this service, and there may be others that will want to use this plan.)

(All Boards not using the above service should be requested to furnish the Promotional Secretary, monthly reports of receipts.)

b—Begin a system of Regional Meetings with the pastors. At least one meeting each year, with each Union Meeting, or like district. Help to sponsor at least one state-wide Ministers Meeting during year.

c—Try to begin a training program for Clerks and Treasurers in an effort to obtain more complete reports at all levels. Work toward a Unified Report form to be used throughout the state.

d-Increase the sending out of information, etc., by beginning the use of a Pastor's Bulletin.

e—Plan and work toward a short weekly radio program, of a News and Information nature.

2-By the State Convention and It's Executive Committee:

a—Create a Commission to make a complete survey of the state and make recommendations for the logical location of a State Headquarters. This Headquarters to be used by the different departments of our state work.

b-The purchase of other office equipment, as needed.

c-Allow more office help for the Promotional Secretary, as needed.

d-Consider the need for a State Radio Commission.

e-Request the different Boards to cooperate with the Promotional Serretary in keeping him informed about their program, either by invitation to attend Board meetings, or reporting of the actions, etc.

Report of Historian (Adopted)

Report of Historian

Since the last session of the Convention, I have been successful in finding authentic bits of historical data from which I have been able to piece together the history of our North Carolina Free Will Baptists, with the exception of a few missing links. It has been enough historical data to require more than two hundred type-written pages. It has been a long and tedious process to piece together this history.

The gathering of the necessary materials for such a history, covering such a long period of time, particularly when no previous attempts were made to preserve the historical records, has been no easy task. I have faithfully endeavovred to discharge the obligations encumbered upon this office as best the circumstances would permit.

I am hopeful that the day is not too far in the distance when we will have, not only a completed historical record for preservation for future generations of Free Will Baptists, but that we also may have a published book containing the history of North Carolina Free Will Baptists from their beginning in 1727 at Perquimans, in Chowan County, North Carolina, which we may offer for general sale to our people.

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Recommendations by Historian

1. That all minutes collected of the sessions of the State Convention be placed into a looseleaf binder for preservation and that they be chemically treated twice a year to prevent destruction by moths, silverfish, and other types of destroying insects.

2. That a suitable medium-priced loose-leaf record book be purchased in which the historical facts of the North Carolina State Convention be written up-to-date and thereafter added annually such historical facts as may be deemed proper.

3. That an allocation be made annually for the necessary expense in connection with the gathering of additional data and preservation of same.

Report of Promotional-Secretary

To The 1951 Session of the N. C. State Convention

I began work as Promotional Secretary November 1, 1950. During the

ten (10) months covered by this report, my work has consisted of the following:

1—I have mailed more than 6,000 pieces of mail from the office. This has been: Minutes of the National Association, Posters for the United Program, Report Blanks, Special Notices, State Convention minutes, letters for the campaigns for the different Boards of the Convention, etc. I have worked with each of the Boards of the Convention.

2—I have visited all the district Conferences and Associations, meeting since Nov. 1, that are members of this State Convention. I have visited all the Union Meetings that I could arrange to get to during this time. I have attended about all the meetings of the different Boards, except the Orphanage Board, during this time.

3—I have prepared mailing list and gathered statistics for use in this department, and in general, have tried to make the office able to serve our needs in a greater way in the future.

C., September 12-13.

1st. That all funds received for Christian Education be divided fifty-fifty between the Free Will Baptist Bble College of Nashville, Tenn., and The Board of Christian Education of the State Convention of the Original Free Will Baptist of North Carolina, except receipts that are designated by the sender for the College or the Board of Christian Education, in that case it be disbursed according to the purpose designated by sender.

2nd. That the Promotional Secretary for the State Convention receive and disburse all funds for the Board of Christian Education which is governed by the State Convention.

3rd. That the Board of Christian Education consult and negotiate with the Board of Trustees of Cragmont Assembly and work out feasible plans to establish a Junior College during the winter months at Cragmont Assembly, with a view to estaglish in connection with the Junior College a Seminary later. That the beginning of the Junior College not be later than the school year of 1953.

4th. That our goal for Christian Education for the next Associational year be \$10,000.

3—Benevolent Checks:

There are now 24 Ministers receiving monthly checks from this Board. There are also 17 ministers' widows receiving quarterly checks. If there are other ministers, or widows, who should be on this list, their application should be in by December 1, 1951.

4-Protective Insurance:

The Retirement Insurance in the amount of \$2,000 is still available to all ministers, who can qualify for it. Application blanks and information may be had from this Board by asking for them.

5-George P. Best Memorial Fund:

The "George P. Best Memorial Fund" is that amount of money received from the estate of the late George P. Best of Wayne County. The amount of this fund is \$6,459.55. This fund had an interest income this year of \$194.55, which has been transferred to the Reserve Fund.

6—Reserve Fund:

The "Reserve Fund" is the amount of interest earned by the "Best Memorial Fund," and the total is now \$1,267.72.

7-Widow's Pension:

We are happy to report that on January 1, 1951 we were able to begin the payment of Widow's Pensions to several of the widows of deceased Free Will Baptist ministers. At t⁺e present time there are 17 such widows on our list. However the amount of money, available for the widows, has been so small that we are, at present, able to issue these checks only quarterly. In connection with this part of our work, the Board has established two (2) requirements for a widow to receive this assistance, as follows:

1-The widow must be a member of a Free Will Baptist Church.

2—When the widow remarries, after the death of her minister husband, she forfeits all rights to this fund.

We would like to have the reaction of the Convention, to these requirements. Your adoption of this report will be considered as your approval of these requirements.

8-Ministerial Retirement Fund Program:

Work is continuing on this program, however we do not have anything to offer to this session of the Convention. This will be submitted to the Convention at a later session.

9-Budget for 1951-52:

We ask that again this year we approve the Goal of \$10,000 for Superannuation, and that in order to raise this amount, we suggest that each church try to raise 25c per member. Also we would ask all other organizations to support this work with liberal offerings.

The Superintendent's Report to the Board of Trustees of the Free Will Baptist Orphanage

It is with humility that I present to you the thirty-first report of the management and operation of the Free Will Baptist Orphanage for the fiscal year ending August 31, 1951. Herein is summarized the work done and the services performed during the year in providing for and the training of our orphan boys and girls.

Institutional Care of Children

Some seventy-eight boys and girls have been cared for at the Home during the past fiscal year. Two boys and one girl were discharged and a similar number admitted during the year. The two boys graduated from High School before leaving. Figure 2 shows the Parental Status of the Children Cared For. The enrollment as of August 31, 1951, was seventy-five.

There were seventeen persons employed for varying periods of time in caring for and working with the children. Staff meetings were held at various times for the purpose of giving consideration to the various phases of the program and to determine how improvements could be made. These meetings have proven to be of vital importance to the on-going of the work of the Home.

It has been realized that personal counseling with the children is important in that it is often helpful to the child in solving his every-day problems. Efforts have been made to limit the work activities to the extent that more personal counseling could be done with the children.

There is still a great need of dividing the children of each sex according to definite age groups in order that staff members may work with, teach, and direct the children in a more satisfactory and meaningful manner. The use of the Albemarle Cottage soon should add greatly to the lives of the boys living there because it provides for the segregation of them according to age groups for their sleeping and play activities. Each Cottage Mother will have only the number of boys that she can manage and work with in a personal way satisfactorily.

Emphasis has been placed on the children's dress and personal hygiene.

An effort has been made to serve the children balanced and wholesome meals within the financial means of the Home. More meat and fresh vegetables have been available in preparing the meals this year than last.

Hospitalization Insurance for the children and staff was maintained during the year. Children needing glasses, dental work, surgery, or other medical attention have received these as provisions could be made. Provision was made for each child to get one or more vacations during the year to visit either relatives or friends. Where the circumstances permitted, the children have also been allowed to visit friends or relatives. The children have also engaged in other recreational activities such as baseball and softball, swimming and fishing, picnics and visits to the nearby or other towns.

Fire Insurance on buildings and equipment has been maintained as a protective measure.

Educational Program

Our children attended the public schools at Middlesex, as usual, during the year. It is felt that the Principal and Faculty have given our children much consideration and considered them, as much as possible, as they do the children from ordinary homes. The relationship between the school and the Home has been very satisfactory. All of our children were served their noon-day meal in the school lunch room.

In cooperation with the school program, and through the assistance of various Woman's Auxiliaries and the Orphanage, eleven of our children were given either piano or voice lessons. The students progressed satisfactorily. These lessons will be continued during this school year and everal other children will have an opportunity to take advantage of this training. The Swine Projects for the boys started last year were continued in a satisfactory manner. An employee spent part of her time assisting girls in learning to make clothing for themselves, as well as doing the regular mending of the clothing.

Rev. Wingate Hansley served as pastor during most of the year. Visiting ministers also held a number of religious services from time to time. Sunday School, F. W. B. League were held each Sunday and the children participated in this regularly. There were six additions to the Church with one dismissal.

Extra-curricular activities that the children have taken part in include High School baseball, softball, basketball, Agriculture and Home Economics Clubs, writing articles for the Young People's Friend and the High School paper.

Farming Program

Again the farm was operated with the children, the farm manager and other farm personnel for short periods of time, as needed. The tobacco crop was rented on halves.

Although the year has been unusually dry for farming purposes, our crops have developed and yielded quite well. Yields (approx.) are as follows: Oats 56 bu., Barley 50 bu., wheat 40 bu. per acre. This year's corn crop is a little above average. The large supply of grains produced have helped considerably in meeting our livestock feed needs.

The swine program has proved very profitable furnishing us approximately 9,000 lbs. of pork and a cash income in the amount of \$3,786.46 from the sale of hogs. The herd consisted of approximately 190 hogs at the end of the year. Our dairy program was hampered by Bang's Disease which was brought in with the purchase of two heifers. This resulted in the sale or slaughter of the majority of our cows. All cattle sold brought a profit to the Home. Several of the cows have been replaced. A number of good bred heifers have been bought or donated for replacements. All heifers are being vaccinated in cooperation with the Department of Agriculture for the control of the disease. We now have twenty-five head of cattle. The Dairy was completed last winter and a calf barn was built very economically from materials salvaged from the old barns torn down.

The outlook for the tobacco crop is that it will prove profitable.

Last fall eleven acres of permanent ladino-fescue-orchard grass pasture and 6.5 acres of alfalfa were established and have proven profitable.

About $2\frac{1}{2}$ acres of garden and $3\frac{1}{2}$ acres of pasture land was cleared by bulldozer last fall.

Campus and Building Improvement Program

An effort has been made to maintain the buildings and grounds in a satisfactory condition and make improvements as funds would permit.

The kitchen and dining hall have been remodeled and repainted with electric stoves added. The Eastern Woman's Auxiliary and Conference furnished the funds for the stove and part of the floor covering with churches from other conferences and the Orphanage General Fund bearing the additional cost of this project. The dining tables were covevred with inlaid linoleum in order that they may be more sanitary.

A hardwood floor has been placed in the church, a walk poured and the doors weatherstripped. Funds are still being received for the purpose of completing the church. Only minor repairs have been made to the girls' dormitory, while a coal bin has been made through renovating a basement room. Plans have been made for enlarging the bathrooms, and for the purchase of new chests of drawers which are badly needed.

Financing and Publicity

Rev. W. A. Hansley has been employed during the major part of the year to help with the raising of funds for the Home and keeping the orphanage before the constituents.

Regular church conferences, associations, union meetings, Woman's Auxiliary Conferences, etc., have been attended by designated members of the staff when possible, with an effort to keep the orphanage, its progress and needs before our people. Much interest in the Home at these meetings has been shown through their acceptance of a number of orphanage projects.

The Woman's Auxiliaries in the various conferences have contributed in a great way in raising funds for the Kitchen and Dining Room project, the furnishing of a new supply of linens, etc., and are now in the process of completely furnishing the Albemarle Cottage with new furniture throughout.

The collection and sale of coupons has been increased to the extent that the income from this source more than doubled that received last year.

Three concert groups were trained to present a program in the church-

es requesting a class to visit them. These were rotated in visiting the churches in order that these visits would not become so tiring on the children. Each church was given a choice between requesting the concert class, a representative, presenting a program with local talent, or taking a special collection for the Home. The income from this source has been less than that received last year, however, a good number of the churches have indicated that their special collections would be taken either in September, October, or November because a larger contribution could be made at these specified times.

An effort has been made to keep the Home before the people through the use of more pictures in the Young People's Friend in a more effective manner.

We have encouraged our church groups to support our home and expressed our appreciation for their contributions and assistance through the use of several thousand letters, postal cards, mimeographs and bulletins. A special bulletin was prepared and distributed to all of the churches in the Albemarle Conference with the purpose in mind to better acquaint each church member with the Albemarle Cottage Project and increase his interest in and the acceptance of his church's part of the \$14,000 Loan.

The over-all contributions from religious organizations exceeded last year's contribution by several thousand dollars.

Alumni Association

The Alumni Association expressed again this year its interest in the orphanage. It has sponsored the "Interest in the Home" awards given to the boy and girl making the greatest contribution to the Home. The Alumni ball diamond project was accepted and should be completed in the near future. The idea in mind, as expressed at the meeting of the Association is to provide a diamond and equipment for the children in order that they may profitably use their excess energy to develop their bodies during "off" time.

Institutional Support

Although the economic conditions of our country have been quite changeable during the year, resulting generally in higher prices for manufactured products and lower prices for farm products sold, our contributions from churches and their auxiliaries have increased over last year's contributions. It is felt that making the orphanage contributions a part of the regular church budgets partly accounts for this increase. Through the cooperative efforts of our ministers and laymen we have been able to operate the home during the year without borrowing any money for operational purposes.

The various Woman's Auxiliaries and their Conventions have increased their combined effort to help us make improvements at the Home and meet the individual needs of the Home. The Auxiliaries have sponsored clothing for the children, the kitchen project, linen drive and furnishings for the Albemarle Cottage. Much food, clothing, money, and other needs have come to the Home through the auxiliaries.

The church fund and girl's building funds have been added to during the year. The Sunday Schools of the Central Conference have been contributing regularly through their convention for the purpose of finishing and equipping a Sunday School room in the Church. A number of church groups are also becoming interested in finishing the church. The Home has been recipient of a legacy to be applied on the church.

We have enjoyed the visits of our young people singularly and in church groups. We have also enjoyed the services of Doctors, nurses, and others during the year, which we greatly appreciate.

We have endeavored to increase enthusiasm in our orphanage program by giving to our people the facts and needs of our Home. The over-all response and cooperation has been most gratifying.

Needs of the Home

During this year we have been able to make plant improvements to the extent that our over-all needs are not quite so great; however, there still exist the following needs which are of immediate concern: (1) Completing the Orphanage Memorial Chapel, (2) Renovating and re-equipping the girl's dormitory, (3) More beautification of the grounds, (4) Increasing our educational loan fund, especially for girls, (5) Endowment funds to enable us to increase our plant facilities, (6) The incorporation of more vocational Training for our children in the regular orphanage program.

Our people are becoming more acquainted with the needs of the Home and are anxious to help meet them for the most part. We still have much work to do in connection with bettering our techniques and working out more thoroughly ways and means of raising funds through our people to meet these needs. We believe that our people will continue to respond in an increasing manner, if we can continue to solicit their support through well planned and cooperative efforts.

As we look ahead into the future, we should give consideration to the long time objectives in orphanage care because any progressive institution plans well ahead and then makes its plan work. The institution's objective should be directed toward making better provision for the orphan child and at the same time train him so he can better fit himself into our society as a useful citizen.

More individual training in work activities, personal relationships and christian activities are greatly needed by the children and every effort should be made to make provision for these types of training as rapidly as possible.

We know that our people are interested in our Home and are ready to work in its behalf as plans are prepared by the orphanage administration and Directors. The combined efforts of our people have resulted in a period of progress for our Home and it is hoped that this can continue on into the future.

I appreciate the opportunity of serving our institution during the past year. Your assistance in carrying on the orphanage program has added to the success of the work of the Home. May we all give thanks to our Heavenly Father for His abiding spirit and look to Him for guidance during the coming year. Mis Grace is Sufficient.

Constitution and By-Laws of the North Carolina State Convention of the Original Free Will Baptist Churches

PREAMBLE

We, the Original Free Will Baptists of North Carolina, assembled in order to advance, promote and increase the cause of Jesus Christ, do establist and ordain this Constitution and these By-Laws.

CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I

Section 1. This assembly shall be known as the North Carolina State Convention of the Original Free Will Baptist churches of Jesus Christ.

ARTICLE II

Section 1. The officers of the Convention shall be President, Vice-President, Recording Secretary, Assistant Secretary, and Treasurer.

Section 2. The Convention shall be composed of all the ordained ministers belonging to the Association; one delegate from each church in good standing; one delegate from each Union Meeting, Conference and Association in good standing for every one thousand members or a fraction thereof.

BY-LAWS

ARTICLE I

Section 1. It shall be the duty of the President to preside over each session, preserve order, govern the body according to established parliamentary usage and appoint all temporary committees. He shall have power to declare any office of the Convention vacant, temporarily, subject to the approval of the Executive Committee.

Section 2. The duties of the Vice-President shall be the duties of the President when that officer is not present.

Section 3. The Recording Secretary shall keep an accurate record of the transactions of the Convention and preserve the same, keep all valuable documents and surrender the same to his successor in office.

Section 4. The Field Secretary shall have charge of preparing statistical tables showing the increase or decrease in membership, church property, etc., and read at each session of the Annual Convention and refer same to the Recording Secretary for permanent record. He shall have charge of placing all the work of the Convention before the various Conferences and Associations. Also the field work in general.

Section 5. All money belonging to the Convention shall be kept by the Treasurer and paid out by him only by order of the Convention. Bills not having been voted to be paid either by the Convention or its Executive Committee must be signed by the President and Recording Secretary before being paid by him.

Section 6. The work of the Executive Committee shall be that of the Convention when the Convention is not in session and to call extra sessions when such becomes necessary. It shall have the authority to suspend any officer of the Convention when he or she proves a failure in official duties, proves non-Christian in official or any other work or detrimental to the cause of Christ and appoint others to fill the vacancy; also fill vacancies made by any other cause. Officers thus appointed shall hold office until the next regular session of the Convention. This Committee shall be composed of the President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, and three members to be elected from the floor of th Convntion at the regular time for electing officers.

Section 7. The President of the Convention shall be ex-officio member of all Boards.

Section 8. The duties of the Board of Finance shall be to work out a complete financial system for our entire state concerning all our financial requirements; to put same into operation; to revise and change from year to year as necessity may demand, and to apportion the funds of the Convention.

Section 9. The duties of the Board of Superannuation shall be to provide for our aged, retired and infirm Ministers in some form of a superannuation.

Section 10. The duties of the Board of Missions shall be to regulate and supervise all mission work in North Carolina and the Foreign Mission program as sponsored by the National Association. It shall be further their duties to raise money for the Mission program and to build sentiment favorable to missions.

Section 11. The duties of the Board of Christian Education shall be to keep our people informed about the Christian Education Program of our Church; endeavor to promote the cause of Christian Education, receive funds for Christian Education, and place same as they are instructed by the State Convention, and in general to co-operate with the National Educational program.

ARTICLE II

Section 1. The method of the Convention shall be to departmentalize the work and place at the head of each department a Board which shall be governed by certain rules adopted by the Convention.

Section 2. Delegates from churches, Union Meetings, Conferences, and Associations shall answer to roll calls and serve in whatever capacity they may be called upon by the Convention. They shall have the right to speak on any subject before the Convention by first addressing the President and obtaining the floor.

ARTICLE III

The following named Boards shall be elected in the following manner: Section 1. Orphanage Board. The Board of Trustees for the management and control of the Free Will Baptist Orphan Home at Middlesex, N. C., shall be composed of nine members elected for a period of three years; the Convention to fill the vacancy. Three retiring each year.

Section 2. Board of Finance. The Board of Finance shall be composed

of six members elected for a term of three years with two members retiring each year and others elected by the Convention to fill the vacancy.

Section 3. Board of Superannuation. The Board of Superannuation shall be composed of six members elected for a term of three years with two members retiring each year and others elected by the Convention to fill the vacancy.

Section 4. Board of Missions. The Board of Missions shall be composed of five members. The term of office being one, two, three, four and five years. One member retiring each year.

Section 5. Board of Christian Education. The Board of Christian Education shall be composed of five members elected for a term of five years with one member retiring each year and the Convention to fill the vacancy.

AMENDMENTS

This Constitution and these By-Laws shall not be changed or altered only by a two-thirds vote of members present in a regular session. All amendments shall lie on the table not less than six hours prior to adoption and shall during that time be read not less than twice in open Convention. . · • •

Minutes of 12th Annual Session N. C. Free Will Baptist S. S. Convention-Institute

The 12th Annual Session of the North Carolina State S. S. Convention convened with the Orphanage, April 19th and 20th, 1951. The theme of this session was "Accountability."

The convention was opened by congregational singing and prayer led by Rev. J. Albert Harris, music director. The welcome address was given by Mr. Walter Croom, Superintendent of the Orphanage. Mrs. Hazel Brown responded. Morning devotions were conducted by Rev. W. A. Hansley, using as his subject "Accountability of Our Time," Psalm 90:12.

The introductory business session was entered into. The president appointed the following committees:

Finance: Mr. Albert Proctor, Central, Chairman; Mr. Ralph Barnes, Western; Mr. Gordon Boyette, Central.

Digest of Reports: Mr. O. W. Smith, Western, Chairman; Mr. E. H. Overman, Albemarle; Mrs. H. L. Spivey, Central.

Resolutions: Mr. Hallet Harris, Central, Chairman; Mr. H. J. Corbette, Western; Mrs. J. B. Hunt, Western.

Field Secretary: Rev. Rashie Kennedy, Cape Fear, Chairman; Rev. Bruce Barrow, Central; Rev. R. W. Allman, Central.

The following were elected to serve as a Nominating Committee: Rev. R. P. Harris, Western, Chairman; Mr. Cicero Smith, Central; Mr. Milton Wiggs, Cape Fear; Rev. Roy Rickard, Piedmont; Mr. W. C. Hill, Eastern.

A registration by up-lifted hand was made as follows: Ministers 15; Superintendents 18; Teachers 50; Secretaries 5; Department Superintendents 3.

The president's message was a challenging one, devoted to six goals of the S. S. of our state:

1. Cragmont Assembly, Inc.--Continue to support it and send representatives from each school for training.

2. Field Secretary Program—Plan now to enlarge our whole program by having a full-time secretary as soon as possible.



MINUTES OF THE TWENTY-FOURTH ANNUAL SESSION OF THE NORTH CAROLINA WOMAN'S AUXILIARY CONVENTION

Convening with

Hull Road Church, Greene County, N. C.

Snow Hill, N. C.

Thursday, May 24, 1951

The Convention was opened by congregational singing of "Faith is the Victory" led by Rev. R. N. Hinnant.

The devotions was conducted by Mrs. Bruce Barrow, using Philippians 3:13 and 14, as a basis for her remarks. After this inspiring message in which Mrs. Barrow urged us to go forward—press forward toward the mark for the prize of the high calling of our Lord Jesus Christ, the congregation was favored by a Solo, "Face to Face," by Miss Olene Grant, of the local church. This was a very inspiring and uplifting message both in songs and words.

Mrs. Roy Rickard being absent, the president Mrs. Ballard, responded to the welcome so graciously extended by Mrs. Gilbert Jones of the local church.

The president's message followed. Mrs. Moye expressed pleasure and gratification on noting the large number in attendance. Make Christ prominent during the day, the President urged. Rev. Hinnant spoke briefly concerning the Press at Ayden. Rev. Hinnant stated that the Press was anxious to serve the denomination and urged the manuscripts be well prepared, and as the author desired, and the Press would take care of the printing.

Executive Committee Meeting, May 30, 1951

At the home of Mrs. J. C. Griffin, New Bern, N. C.

The meeting was called to order by the President and we were led in prayer by Rev. J. C. Griffin, who was present for the beginning of the meeting.

The President stated the purpose of the meeting was to iron out the difficulties that had arisen over two resolutions that had been presented and wre found to be out of order and needed to be presented as a Constitutional amendment.

Motion by Mrs. Ballard, seconded by Mrs. Griffin, that the Amendment Committee, Mrs. Griffin, Mrs. Lupton and Mrs. Evans, recommend to the Convention that the 1932 Constitution and By-Laws be replaced with the Constitution and By-Laws that appear below, which will bring the government for our State Body up to date.

CONSTITUTION

Article 1. This organization shall be known as the Women's State Auxiliary Convention of North Carolina.

Article 2. The object of this Convention shall be to bring the women of convention districts within the state, together for the purpose of transacting business pertaining to the promotion of the work in general.

Article 3. This convention shall be composed of the officers of the Convention, together with district presidents, and delegates from each district convention, and delegates from local auxiliaries, one delegate for each twenty-five members of major fraction thereof. Article 4. The officers of this convention shall be a president, six vicepresidents, recording secretary, field worker, and treasurer. These officers shall compose the Executive Committee, six of whom shall constitute a quorum.

BY-LAWS

Article 1. The president shall preside over all meetings, appoint such committees as may be needed, call the Executive Committee together when necessary and perform such duties as usually devolve upon such an officer.

Article 2. The Vice presidents shall preside in order in the absence of the president and otherwise assist her in the oversight of the general work, and serve as chairman of the department of which she is elected. Each vice president shall devise ways and means of promoting her respective department of work through the State Auxiliary Convention.

Article 3. The recording secretary shall keep an accurate record of all proceedings of the Convention and the Executive Committee, take care of all papers of value and turn same over to her successor in office.

Article 4. The Field Worker shall have charge of plan of work and keep State and National Plan of work before the women of our state.

Article 5. The duty of the Executive Committee is to maintain an oversight of the work at large, have authority to call extra sessions of the Convention when deemed necessary, and act for the Convention, same to be subject to the will of the Convention at its regular meeting.

Article 6. The treasurer shall have charge of all funds belonging to this convention and shall pay out same only when authorized by the Convention. All money shall be placed in some reliable bank and paid out at each annual meeting of the convention, making quarterly reports to our state church paper.

Article 7. Each local auxiliary and District Auxiliary Convention shall be required to send its proportionate part of money prescribed by the state convention for its work.

Article 8. All officers of this convention shall serve for a term of two years and shall be elected by a majority vote of delegates and members composing the convention at time of election.

Article 9. This constitution and by-laws may be amended by a twothirds majority vote of all members present in regular session of the State Auxiliary Convention and amendment to be presented during morning session and acted on during afternoon session after having been read twice to the body.

The foregoing proposed Constitution and By-Laws is to be studied carefully by local auxiliary members, and District Conventions, same to be presented for adoption at the next State meeting in May of 1952.

Motion made, duly sustained, that Anna Phillip Loan Fund Rules and Regulations be printed in Constitution and by-laws and that a supply be furnished the second vice president.

Mrs. Woodard, the treasurer, stated there was an error made in count-

ing the public offering for the Orphanage taken the Convention on May 24, asking that she be allowed to take from the general fund to make up the difference. Permission granted.

After discussion, the Executive Committee agreed for the Fifth Vice President to ask the superintendent of the Orphanage if he would agree to use allocation to Orphanage from North Carolina Woman's Convention in order to take advantage of special price offers on linens and drapes for Orphanage.

Motion by Mrs. Willoughby, seconded by Mrs. Lupton, that the Executive Committee protest the written statement on page 20 of the 1950 Manual of Methods, reflecting on Free Will Baptist Presses. The statement reads as follows: "Today Free Will Baptist Women are asking for a magazine of their own; and this, like other Free Will Baptist literature, would be available if it were not hampered by the greed, selfishness, and lack of vision on the part of denominational printers." The motion also included the request that the above quoted statement be withdrawn. The delegate to National Convention was instructed to present this to National Woman's Auxiliary Convention. The meeting was adjourned with prayer by Mrs. Lupton.
