



REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

The Executive Committee of the North Carolina State Convention, met at Mt. Olive, N. C., Tuesday, December 15, 1953.

Members present: Revs. Lloyd Vernon, Walter Carter, R. N. Hinnant, J. W. Alford, L. B. Manning, W. B. Raper and Mr. R. W. Mallard.

Visitors present: Revs. J. C. Griffin, J. C. Calvert, Wade Calvert, D. W. Hansley, Clifton Rice and Mr. H. M. Mallard.

The meeting was opened with prayer by Rev. W. B. Raper.

The President stated that a joint session was desired between the Eastern Conference and the Piedmont Association; the Executive Committee of the State Convention to act as an advisory committee.

By motion, we accept the resignation of Rev. W. B. Raper as a member of the Executive Committee; having accepted the position as Promotional Director.

Rev. M. L. Johnson was elected to fill the unexpired term of Brother Raper. The Treasurer reported \$2,110.07 in the treasury.

The Promotional Director made a report of his activities during his tenure of office with recommendations. (See report)

By motion, the recommendations contained in the report of the Promotional Director be approved.

By motion, the Secretary be authorized to notify the chairman of each board,

operating under authority of the State Convention, to comply with the approved recommendations.

By motion, the President call the Executive Committee together not less than six weeks before the annual setting of the Convention for the boards to present their proposed budget for the ensuing year.

The President appointed a program committee for 1954, consisting of Revs. R. N. Hinnant, Walter Carter, W. B. Raper.

A recommendation was presented to the Executive Committee for consideration by Rev. J. W. Alford and it was deferred until a later session, by mutual consent.

RECOMMENDATION BY REV. J. W. ALFORD (see minutes above)

December 18, 1953

The following recommendations were presented to the State Executive Committee by John W. Alford, Tuesday, December 15, 1953 at the session held in Mount Olive, North Carolina. Consideration of these recommendations was delayed until our next Executive Board Meeting in order that each member of the Board might have opportunity to study them.

"Realizing that the State Convention of Free Will Baptists of North Carolina is not a Legislative body, and can act only as a suggestive body; and further

"Realizing that there has not always been the brotherly cooperation and coordination of the Conferences and Associations making up the membership, and constituting the body of the North Carolina State Convention; and further

"Realizing that in order to successfully promote the program of the denomination, there should always be manifested due and proper consideration and recognition of the rights and boundaries of each constituent body, so that no needless friction or controversy would arise among the brethren; we therefore urge

- "I. That each Conference or Association in the state give due recognition to the rights of all other Conferences or Associations in the State, and discourage the infringement of these rights by anyone, or any group of individuals under any pretense whatsoever.
- "2. That we encourage each Conference or Association to promote the idea of cooperation and coordination in all the plans and ideals of the State program, and seek to make progress in all things pertaining to the work and development of the denomination, by being in harmony and accord in all our dealings, cooperative in all our efforts, and duly considerate of the rights and jurisdictions of each other, so that we may be able to present a solid front to all the world.
- "3. That any one of the constituent bodies of the North Carolina State Convention refuse to conform to these suggestions, such refusal by that Conference or Association be considered just cause, and sufficient reason, to cite the offending body to defend itself before the State Convention, or such tribunal as may be

appointed by the State Convention, to consider the case, and if the findings are in support of the complaint, the offending Conference or Association be denied the privilege of membership in the State Convention until satisfaction is rendered by the offending body."

PROMOTIONAL DIRECTOR'S REPORT TO THE STATE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Conferences attended: Albemarle, Rock Fish, Western, Pee Dee, Eastern, Cape Fear, Central—Total 1,188 miles.

Each Conference agreed to send a representative to the State Meeting of the committee to work out a uniform examination for our ministers.

The Pee Dee Conference did not accept the State Treatise. The main objection appeared to have been that the new State Treatise did not specify card playing, movies and dances as sinful amusements.

I invited the Cape Fear Conference to send a committee to meet with the State Executive Committee to state the objections the Cape Fear Conference has to the State Treatise.

Board Meetings Attended: Mt. Allen Board of Directors Meeting, Orphanage Board.

Letters mailed: 655 for Mt. Allen College, 655 for Orphanage.

Received and forwarded money for: Christian Education, Missions, Superannuation, Orphanage, Promotional, Cragmont.

New office equipment: one 4-drawer steel file cabinet.

Recommendations:

- 1. That the State Executive Committee request each board of the 7 points of our United Program to submit a budget to the State Convention each year. This budget should be based on the membership of our church in this state so that each church might know what is expected of it for each enterprise. It would then be the duty of the Promotional Director to notify each church as to its quota for each phase of the United Program for the coming year. The idea would be that this information would be furnished the churches as soon after the meeting of the State Convention as possible. The advantage of this recommendation would be that the churches operating on a budget would know their quotas before they made up their budgets.
- 2. That the State Executive Committee request each board of the National Association that plans to solicit funds from our people to assign our state its proportionate quota and that the boards of the National Association operate in North Carolina in collaboration with our State Boards.

The following motion was passed: "Beginning as of this date, December 15, 1953, We, the members of the Executive Committee of the Eastern Conference and Piedmont Association of North Carolina, mutually agree and pledge ourselves not to infringe on the rights or jurisdiction of our fellow conference or Association mentioned above. By this we mean, not to ordain any person not previously known to us to be in good standing with his conference or association. The same pledge and agreement applies to church membership in conference or association."

A motion was made to adjourn. The benediction was by Wade Calvert.

The Executive Committee of the North Carolina State Convention met in Mt. Olive, N. C., July 22, 1954.

Members present: Revs. Lloyd Vernon, Walter Carter, R. N. Hinnant, M. L. Johnson, J. W. Alford, L. B. Manning and Mr. Rom Mallard.

Visitors present: Revs. S. A. Smith, W. B. Raper, D. W. Hansley, J. A. Evans, Winford Floyd, J. D. Liles.

The meeting was opened with prayer by Rev. Walter Carter.

The minutes of the December 15, 1953, Executive Committee meeting were read and all unfinished business was brought before the body.

The recommendation of December 18, 1953, presented by Rev. J. W. Alford was unanimously accepted.

The resignation of Rev. W. B. Raper, as Promotional Director, was read and accepted.

The resignation of Rev. L. R. Ennis, as Parliamentarian, was read and accepted.

The various boards presented a tentative budget for 1954-55 as follows:

Orphanage \$101,500.00; Missions \$31,000.00; Cragmont \$3,000.00; Superannuation \$10,000.00; Church Finance \$1,500.00; Education \$75,000.00; Promotional Department \$2,000.00; Total \$224,000.00.

By motion we adopt all tentative budgets as presented by the various boards for the year of 1954-55; and that the Promotional Director be requested to send mimeographed copies to all clerks and pastors of the various churches throughout the state.

By motion, we recommend to the State Convention, for all enterprises, the same months for 1954-55 as is specified in 1953-54 Seven Point Program.

By motion, we meet with the representatives of the Cape Fear Conference to clarify differences in the State Treatise.

By motion, Rev. Walter Carter notify the Executive Committee of the Piedmont Association to meet with the Executive Committee and Cape Fear representatives for any clarification they desire, should they feel so disposed.

By motion, we extend an invitation to all Executive Committees of the various Conferences and Associations in the state, to meet with us at the Orphanage, August 16, 1954, to discuss the requisitioning of funds by the National Association.

By motion, we request the Free Will Baptist paper to run a weekly directory of boards of the State Convention.

By motion, a committee be elected to secure a successor to Rev. W. B. Raper as Promotional Director. The following committee was elected: Revs. R. N. Hinnant, M. L. Johnson, J. A. Evans. This committee is to be invested with the power to replace Brother Raper at an early date.

Whereas the National Association of Free Will Baptists while convened in its 1954 annual session, passed certain measures, directives and authorizations prescribing the transfer and payment of funds contributed to the Free Will Baptist Bible College, Foreign Mission Board, Home Mission Board and Superannuation Board for the expressed programs, functions, and work of said institutions and entities (or Boards); which transfer and payment of funds to the Executive Department of the National Association is found to be in conflict with the stipulations and provisions of the charters and constitutions of the afore said institutions and agencies, therefore resolved:

- (1) That it is the opinion of the Executive Committee of the State Convention of Free Will Baptists of North Carolina and the Executive Boards of eight affiliated conferences and associations that the said act of the National Association of Free Will Baptists involving the transfer of funds of the aforesaid institution and departmental boards to the Executive Department was in conflict with previously assigned and enjoyed powers of the aforesaid agencies.
- (2) That the said conflicting act of the National Association with regard to previously assigned powers and prerogatives of the aforesaid agencies of the National Association was an error of moral judgment.
- (3) That the North Carolina State Convention of Free Will Baptists be authorized to inform the churches and general organizations of the state of the act of the National Association in reference to the "requisitions of funds" for the Executive Department of the National body. It is understood, however, that this announcement does not direct any individual or organization in the matter of supporting the institutions and agencies herein referred to.
- (4) That a copy of these resolutions be forwarded to the Moderator, Clerk, and Executive Secretary of the National Association.

Motion a committee of one member from each conference or association be appointed to draft a recommended form for National Association representation by states to be followed by the State Convention, and report to this body today. This motion was passed 17 for, 2 against.

We recommend that suitable resolutions be prepared for submission to the annual session of the State Convention which will:

- 1. Express our objection to the present provision for representation in the National Association;
- 2. Bear our urgent request for a revision of the constitution of the National Association to the end that representation by states in the National Association be on the basis of one delegate for each 1,000 members or fraction thereof.

These resolutions to be prepared by the Executive Committee of the State Convention, or by whomever they designate.

RESOLUTION

Whereas: Representation in the National Association of Free Will Baptists is by states, based upon the number of district Associations or Conferences and Union or Quarterly meetings, without regard to the number of members making up said district groups.

And Whereas: It is the opinion of the North Carolina State Convention of Free Will Baptists that the above plan of representation is not a fair representation, in that it allows the very small district group the same voice as is allowed for a district group with a membership many times as large.

- And Whereas: The last session of the National Association passed an amendment to Article 4 of its Constitution which increases the number of delegates allowed for each district group but still does not make any allowance for the size of the membership of the various groups.
- And Whereas: The above amendment was passed over the very strong objection of many persons who spoke from the floor of the Association, calling attention to the unfairness of such plan of representation.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED:

- First: That this North Carolina State Convention of Free Will Baptist does hereby express its very strong objection to the above mentioned plan of representation in the National Association, on the basis that it does not in any way take into consideration the actual size of the membership of the various district groups.
- Second: That we do hereby request the National Association to take steps at its next annual meeting, to amend Article 4 of its Constitution to provide for representation by the various states in direct proportion to the number of members represented.
- Third: That we strongly recommend that the provision for representation be based upon one delegate for each 1000 members or fraction thereof, said delegation to be appointed by their respective state bodies.
- Fourth: That a copy of this Resolution be printed in our minutes and copies be sent to the Moderator and Executive Secretary of the National Association and the Chairman of the General Board of the National Association.

The Executive Committee of the State Convention met in joint session with the Executive Committee of the Cape Fear Conference, Thursday, August 19, 1954, at Mt. Allen College, Mt. Olive, N. C.

Members of the Executive Committee present from the Cape Fear Conference: Revs. L. R. Ennis, T. E. Beaman, C. H. Coates, Bro. Owen Thomas, Bro. H. T. Hinson.

The meeting was opened with prayer by Rev. L. R. Ennis.

The purpose of the meeting, as related by the President, was to discuss certain phases of our North Carolina Treatise; primarily, the procedure of ministerial discipline.

After much discussion, a motion was passed to request the State Convention to appoint a committee to revise the North Carolina Treatise and the suggestions recorded in this joint session be passed on to the revision committee for consideration.

To comply with a recommended report of a committee relative to representation by states to the National Association, the President appointed a committee of three to draft recommended procedure to be followed by the State Convention. The committee: Revs. M. L. Johnson, L. R. Ennis, J. W. Alford.

Motion to adjourn and benediction.

Barrow delivered the message, reading James 5:7-12 as a Scripture reading, and "Saving Faith" as a subject. Singing, "Glory to His Name," by the congregation.

The afternoon session was opened by singing "We'll Work 'Till Jesus Comes," and prayer by Rev. Billie Morris.

The President expressed his appreciation to the convention for their cooperation.

REPORT OF NORTH CAROLINA PROMOTIONAL DIRECTOR TO THE STATE CONVENTION

September 15, 1954

I served as Promotional Director from October 1, 1953, to July 31, 1954, at which time the State Executive Committee accepted my resignation in order that I might accept the presidency of Mount Allen Junior College.

I attended every conference or association in North Carolina which met during my tenure in office.

In keeping with the request of this Convention I asked each conference to delegate one representative to serve on a state-wide committee to draw up a uniform examination for our ministers. Each conference complied with the request and authorized the following men:

In compliance with a directive from the State Executive Committee, I took up the matter of the State Treatise with those conferences which had not adopted it. The Cape Fear Conference authorized a committee to meet with the State Executive Committee to discuss their differences with the State Treatise. The Pee Dee Association voted down the State Treatise on the grounds that it did not specifically name dancing, movies, and card playing as being prohibited.

Note: This report does not include two conferences in our state (Western Yearly and Jacks Creek) because they do not report to the State Convention, and no statistical information was available on them.

In 1952 the North Carolina State Convention passed the following resolution: "Be it resolved: That the North Carolina State Convention of Original Free Will Baptists extend to our National Association an invitation to hold its 1954 session in our state. If unable to meet with us in 1954, our State Convention continues to extend the invitation yearly until accepted."

On the strength of the above resolution, the North Carolina State Convention invites the 1955 session of the National Association to meet in North Carolina. If this invitation is accepted, the details for entertaining this session will be worked cut by the State Conventon in September, 1954.

End: National Report

In keeping with the invitation of this convention to the National Association I went before the Placement Committee and plead that North Carolina be recommended as the site of the 1955 session of the National Association. The Placement Committee had other invitations also, including one from Tulsa, Oklahoma. The Committee asked the Association proper to decide between North Carolina and Oklahoma without discussion. The vote was extremely close, but in favor of accepting the invitation from Tulsa, and this in view of the fact that this forthcoming session will mark the third time the National Association has convened in Oklahoma since last coming to North Carolina. The vote was close enough, however, that if a few North Carolina ministers had not voted in favor of Tulsa, the vote would have been for the 1955 session to be in North Carolina.

During my tenure in office, I worked with every State and National Board that asked the service of the Promotional Department. Approximately 9,500 pieces of mail were sent from this office in promotional work.

REPORT OF THE HISTORICAL COMMISSION

We have received during the past year from Rev. Thomas Beamon, a former member of the Commission, two ring binders and a large number of minutes. Although the file of State Convention minutes is not complete, we do have a large number of old minutes which were turned over to us by Brother Beamon. These minutes are here at the Convention for your inspection.

We ask the approval of this Convention in the publication of a paper bound history of North Carolina Free Will Baptists. We are aware that such a history would not be complete, but it would be a beginning which, we hope, would be the forerunner of a larger cloth bound volume. Such a history can be produced and put on the market for \$1.00 per copy. The cost of producing a paper bound volume of 80 to 100 pages would be approximately \$600 for 1000 copies. We believe that this 1000 copies could easily be sold within a year.

We recommend the setting up of an historical library at the Mount Allen College. The materials of this library would be available to everyone, with the understanding that none of the materials were to be carried out of the building. We feel that there are many old books and minutes of an historical nature that would be donated if our people knew what use would be made of them.

We, the undersigned constituting the Board of Directors of Mount Allen Junior College, respectfully recommend to the convention that certain amendments be made to the Charter of Mount Allen Junior College as follows:

- That the principal place of business of the college be Mount Olive, Wayne County, North Carolina.
- 2.—That section K of the Charter be amended to read as follows: "To employ such teachers and assistants and other employees as may be necessary, in the opinion of the Board of Directors to properly carry on the work of said corporation."
- 3.—That section 6 of the Charter be amended to read as follows: "The corporation shall be controlled and all property owned by it shall be managed by the Board of Directors of the college which shall consist of nine members with the terms of office of three members expiring biannually according to the bylaws of the State Convention."
- 4.—That Section 7 of the Charter be amended to read as follows: "The Board of Directors shall annually elect a chairman and a secretary and a treasurer, any! two of which offices may be combined and held by one person."

We believe that the above suggested amendments will facilitate the work of the college and earnestly suggest that the convention, by proper resolutions, adopt the same and direct the Board of Directors to proceed to make the said amendments.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON STUDY OF CHARTER AND CONSTITUTION OF ORPHANAGE

This committee met in the office of the Free Will Baptist Orphanage, July 21, 1954, with the superintendent of the institution attending, and examined the Charter, the rules of management of the home, and also the constitution of the State Convention as directed by motion passed (motion recorded on pages 14 and 15 of the 1953 minutes) by this body last year.

- 1. The Charter of incorporation is a competent instrument that prescribes the basis of the organization of the Free Will Baptist Orphanage and such general provisions as should be established for the administration of the home.
- 2. The rules of management of the Free Will Baptist Orphanage, which are created by the board of trustees, revealed a few simple inconsistencies, such as "association" for "convention" that resulted from the use of the two titles formerly used by this body. These corrections have been suggested to the trustees of the orphanage, and the rules of management brought up to date.
- 3. The Charter and rules of management of the orphanage provide for the election of three (3) to nine (9) trustees without geographic restriction, at the option of the convention.

We recommend that this provision be adhered to in the future.

Plant Improvement

Much time and money has been spent this year in a building program. New cottages have been built for the girls and have been occupied since the first of June.

Alumni Association

The alumni association has been very active this year. Mr. Frank Hawkins, a teacher in Mt. Allen Junior College, has been elected president.

The support we have received from the churches and individuals during the past year has been very gratifying and encouraging, for which we shall be eternally grateful. CONSTITUTION and BY-LAWS

North Carolina State Convention Original Free Will Baptists

PREAMBLE

We, the Original Free Will Baptists of North Carolina, assembled in order to advance, promote, and increase the cause of Jesus Christ, do establish and ordain this Constitution and these By-Laws.

Constitution

ARTICLE I

Section 1: This assembly shall be known as the North Carolina State Convention of Original Free Will Baptists.

Section 2: This Convention shall hold an annual session commencing on Wednesday after the second Sunday in September of each year. The place of such meetings to be determined by the Convention or the Executive Committee. Special sessions may be called by the Executive Committee in the event of the existence of needs of sufficient urgency.

ARTICLE II

Section 1: The officers of this Convention shall be a President, Vice-President, Recording Secretary, Assistant Recording Secretary, Promotional Director, and Treasurer.

Section 2: The Convention shall be composed of the general officers, members of standing boards, committees or commissions, and all ordained ministers who belong to churches that are affiliated with the convention; one delegate from each church in good standing; one delegate from each Union Meeting, Conference or Association in good standing for every one thousand members or a fraction thereof.

By-Laws

ARTICLE I

Section 1: The work of this Convention shall be departmentalized, with a board of control over each department. Each board shall be governed by rules set forth by the Convention. It shall be the duty of the Convention to solicit the cooperation of the Conferences and Associations in promoting the work of these departments.

Section 2: All members of the Convention shall have a right of voice and vote on any issue before the body, providing they have been properly recognized by the Presiding Officer. They shall serve the Convention in any capacity when

called upon by the proper authority. Before membership in the Convention is established, all ministers and delegates must be properly registered.

ARTICLE II

Officers, Boards, Committees and the manner of their election

Section 1: President: The President shall be elected for a term of two (2) years. He shall not be elected to succeed himself.

Section 2: Vice-President: The Vice-President shall be elected for a term of two (2) years.

Section 3: Recording Secretary: The Recording Secretary shall be elected for a term of two (2) years.

Section 4: Assistant Recording Secretary: The Assistant Recording Secretary shall be elected for a term of two (2) years.

Section 5: Promotional Director: The Promotional Director shall be elected for a term of one (1) year under such contract as may be agreed upon by himself and the Convention or its Executive Committee. In case of a vacancy in this office between sessions of the Convention the Executive Committee shall fill the vacancy until the next session.

Section 6: Treasurer: The Treasurer shall be elected for a term of two (2) years.

Section 7: Orphanage Board: The Board of Trustees of the Free Will Baptist Orphanage, Middlesex, shall be composed of nine (9) members with the terms of three members expiring each year, the vacancies to be filled by the Convention.

Section 8: Board of Superannuation: The Board of Superannuation shall be composed of five members with the term of one member expiring each year; the vacancy to be filled by the Convention.

Section 9: Board of Missions: The Board of Missions shall be composed of five (5) members with the term of one member expiring each year; the vacancy to be filled by the Convention.

Section 10: Board of Christian Education: The Board of Christian Education shall be composed of five (5) members with the term of one member expiring each year; the vacancy to be filled by the Convention.

Section 11: Board of Trustees: The Board of Trustees shall be composed of three (3) members with the term of one member expiring each year; the vacancy to be filled by the Convention.

Section 12: Representatives of Cragmont Assembly Stock: The Stock held by this Convention in Cragmont Assembly, Inc., shall be represented by three members with the term of one member expiring each year; the vacancy to be filled by the Convention.

Section 13: Representatives of Free Will Baptist Press Stock: The stock held by this Convention in the Free Will Baptist Press shall be represented by one member elected annually by the Convention.

Section 14: Representative of Church Finance Association Stock: The stock held by this Convention in the Church Finance Association, Inc., shall be represented by one member elected annually by the Convention.

Section 15: Historical Commission: The Historical Commission shall be composed of three members with the term of one member expiring each year; the vacancy to be filled by the Convention.

Section 16: Executive Committee: The Executive Committee shall be composed of the President, Vice-President, Recording Secretary, Treasurer and three members elected by the Convention for a term of two years.

Section 17: Board of Directors of Mount Allen College: The Board of Directors of Mount Allen College shall be composed of nine (9) members, with the terms of office of three (3) members expiring biennially; the vacancies to be filled by the Convention.

ARTICLE III

Duties and Responsibilities

Section 1: President: It shall be the duty of the President to preside over each session, preserve order, govern the body according to established parliamentary usage and appoint all temporary committees. He shall have power to declare any office of the Convention vacant, temporarily, subject to the approval of the Convention or the Executive Committee. He shall have authority to call meetings of the Executive Committee, when such is needful, and preside over said meetings.

The President shall be ex-officio member of all boards, standing committees and commissions of the Convention.

Section 2: Vice-President: The duties of the Vice-President shall be the duties of the President when that officer is not present.

Section 3: Recording Secretary: The Recording Secretary shall keep an accurate record of the transactions of the Convention and preserve the same, keep all valuable documents and surrender the same to his successor in office.

Section 4: Assistant Recording Secretary: The duties of the Assistant Recording Secretary shall be the duties of the Recording Secretary when that officer is not present and to assist the Recording Secretary when called upon.

Section 5: Promotional Director: The Promotional Director shall maintain an office for the purpose of centralizing the work of the Convention. He shall prepare statistical tables necessary to keep the Convention informed as to the growth and progress of the denomination. He shall work with the Convention, the Executive Committee, all boards, committees and commissions of the Convention in placing the work of the denomination before the various bodies of the state for their information and support; also perform any other promotional duties as directed by the Convention or the Executive Committee.

When designated by a board, committee or commission the Promotional Director shall receive and (or) pay out any money controlled by said board, committee or commission as directed by them.

The Promotional Director shall be ex-officio member of all boards, standing committees and commissions of the Convention.

Section 6: Treasurer: The Treasurer shall hold all money belonging to the Convention. He shall pay all bills ordered by the Convention or the Executive Committee; other bills paid must be approved by the President and Recording

Secretary. He shall give an annual report to the Convention; also make reports to the Executive Committee when called for.

Section 7: Orphanage Board: The Orphanage Board shall be responsible for the management and control of the Free Will Baptist Orphanage at Middlesex. It shall give an annual report to the Convention setting forth its progress, needs and achievements.

Section 8: Board of Superannuation: It shall be the purpose of this Board to organize and unify all superannuation work throughout this State Convention. They shall seek to provide for our aged, retired and infirm ministers in some form of a superannuation program; also seek to offer to our active ministers some program whereby they may help to provide for their future security and retirement.

Section 9: Board of Missions: The Board of Missions shall regulate and supervise all mission work under the control of this Convention. It shall co-operate with the Mission program of the National Association. It shall endeavor to raise money for missions and build sentiment favorable to missions.

Section 10: Board of Christian Education: The Board of Christian Education shall keep our people informed as to our educational needs; endeavor to promote the cause of, receive funds for and stimulate interest among our people in the cause of Christian Education. It shall be their duty to co-operate with the educational institutions of our denomination and use all funds for the best interest of Christian Education as directed by this Convention and the donors of funds for education.

Section 11: Board of Trustees: The Board of Trustees shall hold title to all property belonging to this Convention. It shall have power to convey such property when authorized by the Convention.

Section 12: Representatives of Cragmont Assembly Stock: The Representatives of the stock held by this Convention, in Cragmont Assembly, Inc., shall work jointly with representatives of other auxiliaries holding stock in said institution.

Section 13: Representatives of Free Will Baptist Press Stock: The Representative of the stock held by this Convention in the Free Will Baptist Press shall meet annually, or as often as called upon, with the stockholders of the Press at Ayden, N. C., to transact any business that may come before them.

Section 14: Representative of Church Finance Association Stock: The Representative of the Membership Stock held by this Convention in the Church Finance Association, Inc., shall meet annually, or as often as called upon, with the stockholders of the corporation for the purpose of transacting any business that may come before them.

Section 15: Historical Commission: The Historical Commission shall make research, compile same and record historical events of the denomination to date; these documents become the property of the Convention and shall be held by the Recording Secretary.

Section 16: Executive Committee: The work of the Executive Committee shall be that of the Convention when the Convention is not in session. It shall call as many sessions as necessary between the annual sessions of the Convention to trans-

act business. It shall have the authority to suspend any officer of the Convention when such officer proves a failure in duties, proves non-Christian or detrimental to the cause of Christ and appoint another to fill the vacancy; also fill vacancies made by any other cause.

The Executive Committee shall supervise the work of the Promotional Department between the annual sessions of the Convention as most practicable to our state work and in keeping with the expressed will of the annual session of the Convention.

A report of all transactions of this Committee shall be made to the Convention in annual session.

Section 17: Board of Directors of Mount Allen College: The Board of Directors of Mount Allen College shall be responsible for the management and operation of Mount Allen College under the Certificate of Incorporation granted by the State of North Carolina and the directives of this Convention. It shall propose any necessary amendments or revisions of said Certificate of Incorporation, which amendments or revisions shall be approved by this Convention before being put into force. It shall make an annual report to the Convention, setting forth its progress, needs and achievements. It shall have power to organize at will and to create such by-laws as may be deemed essential for its government and for the control, administration and promotion of the college, consistent with the provisions of its Certificate of Incorporation and the constitution and regulation of this State Convention.

AMENDMENTS

This Constitution and these By-Laws shall not be changed or altered except by a two-thirds vote of members present in a regular session. All amendments shall lie on the table not less than six hours prior to adoption and shall, during that time, be read not less than twice in open Convention.
