

REPORT AND RECOMMENDATION OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF MOUNT ALLEN JUNIOR COLLEGE

We, the undersigned constituting the Board of Directors of Mount Allen Junior College, respectfully recommend to the convention that the following amendment be made to the Charter of Mount Allen Junior College as follows: 1-That the name of Mount Allen Junior College be changed to Mount Olive Junior College.

We have carefully considered this recommendation and report:

We have received repeated suggestions and requests that the name of our college be changed to Mount Olive Junior College.

We believe that this change of name will stimulate the interest of the citizens of Mount Olive in the welfare and progress of our college and that by so doing we will further the best interest of the college.

We believe that the above suggested amendment will facilitate the work of the college and earnestly suggest that the convention, by proper resolution, adopt the same and direct the Board of Directors to proceed to make the said amendment.

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, at the forty-third annual session, State Convention of Churches of the Original Free Will Baptists of North Carolina, held on September 14, 1955, a report and recommendation of the Board of Directors for Mount Allen Junior College was duly reported to this convention, that in their opinion the best interest of the college will serve by changing its name to Mount Olive Junior College, as will appear from the Directors' report made to this convention.

Now THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED: "That the report and recommendation of the Board of Directors is hereby approved, and the said Board of Directors are authorized and directed by this convention to proceed with the necessary legal requirements to effect this change of name.

"That it is hereby expressly understood that in effecting the above change in name; all the assets of Mount Allen Junior College shall become the assets of Mount Olive Junior College and that, all liabilities of Mount Allen Junior College shall be assumed by Mount Olive Junior College."

REPORT OF FREE WILL BAPTIST BIBLE COLLEGE NASHVILLE, TENNESSEE

to

NORTH CAROLINA STATE CONVENTION OF FREE WILL BAPTISTS

By J. R. DAVIDSON

Brother President and members of this convention, I count myself happy with the privilege of making this report to this honorable body. First of all, because of what Free Will Baptist Bible College is. Beyond a shadow of doubt it has proved to be the most outstanding instrument being used in the development of a people whose growth remained greatly retarded for some thirty to forty years. The cause of the Bible College was pushed out as the means to the end in service for our people some thirteen years ago, having been held in incubation stage for about five years before its birth. The end for which it was launched, and is serving, is the whole gospel to the whole world. Let us take it for what it truly is: the lone institution of Free Will Baptist order wholly dedicated to the training of talent for spreading the gospel at home and abroad. It is true we have many institutions and enterprises operated by our people which are very worthy. In fact I feel all of them are. Surely we are adhering to the Word, "to visit the widows and the orphans" in our superannuation and orphanage programs, and, it is no less true, that all education where Christ's name is honored is to have our hearty approval. But the fact stands, we have one institution wholly dedicated to the task of carrying out the Great Commission in its service of specifically preparing lives to this end; namely, Free Will Baptist Bible College. Surely each of us thank God for this great institution.

Secondly, I am happy to bring the cause of our Bible College to you because of what it has done. It has served in its sphere for revolutionizing our cause which might be described as stagnant for many years. We had no such source to which to look just fourteen years ago. I apologize for being unable to present exact statistics as to its fruition, but let it suffice to say that territory is being reached from the home base to the ends of the earth by the instrumentality of men and women who have received training, spiritual vision and missionary enthusiasm through the Bible College. It has been in the forefront of emphasis for a correct Biblical Stewardship among our people and churches, and I wonder who among us can question the outstanding fruit which is steadily being stepped up as indicated in most every report one can hear from any assembly of our people throughout the many states where we are active. Who can question the part the services of the Bible College is contributing in most every way toward the success of our Home Mission cause, with the bringing into existence more than four hundred and fifty new churches during the past three years.

I am persuaded that indirectly, and in many cases directly, the influence of Free Will Baptist Bible College has contributed to the springing up of new homes for orphans (and other needy souls) among us in the several states. I am positive history would still be in the making for anyone to be able to successfully attempt to organize a Christian education institution in any state were it not for influence stemming out from the services rendered by the Bible College. What the Bible College is, consequently what it has done, has created a reversal of attitude among our people sufficiently to enable her to stand a shock of strong attacks from the floor of our top assembly and come out the healthier for rendering a service which Free Will Baptists need as they need no service which can be rendered by any institution. Who can gainsay such achievement? Finally, I say the emphasis on separation from the world, with the Bible-centered training, emphasis on guidance of the Holy Spirit and services of those who have in different ways associated in the training service of our Bible College has had much to do with causing the burning of revival fires over our territory.

But I must hasten to this final word. I am happy in making this report here, and to this particular people because of the relationship which exists between North Carolina Free Will Baptists and the Bible College.

From the very inception of the idea of such an institution North Carolinians began their expression of faith in the movement in financial gifts, the very first gift toward what we now have having been sent by Mrs. J. R. Bennett from our church in Bridgeton. Others began to respond to appeals and I wish you would look at the following figures: from July 1954, through June 1, 1955, gifts from this state amounted to \$9,413.03. From July 1955, to September 9, 1955, \$2,683.57 were realized. This makes a total of \$12,096.60 in a bit over fourteen months. It should have been much more in light of services being rendered to our cause by the college, and in light of the present and future needs, but we are glad for the record.

Did you know that enrollment from this state has jumped from a nominal per cent of the numbers enrolled in early history to above thirty per cent during the past few years? This status may not remain exactly the same this year, since anticipated enrollment totals two hundred with forty-eight of them being North Carolinians. Thirty-three enrolled last year from this state are returning to continue courses of study and fifteen new ones have been accepted.

Finally I want us to look at the relationship which should continue to healthfully exist between us and the Bible College. Giving for current operational needs to be stepped up considerably, remembering educational needs in preparing talent for spreading the gospel must be met in order for other denominational expectations to be realized. The call for expansion of the institution in every way brings proportionate responsibilities and privileges to North Carolina Free Will Baptists. Report from the school with present enrollment prospects is to the effect that there is dire need for more beds and other necessary accommodations in rooms which are to be provided by additional arrangements by renting houses. And constancy in prayer for the institution with its administrative staff, its entire staff of workers, the student body, its supporters on the field with its Board of Trustees, three of whom are residents of North Carolina.

The editor is extremely gratified with the response given to the publications of the institution. The Press is in the process of publishing a Cradle Roll Packet for Sunday school (ages, birth to second birthday), a teachers' guide and activity material to be used in coordination with the Acme Picture Cards (ages 2, 3), and a teachers' guide and activity materials to be used in coordination with Tiny Tots (ages 4, 5). Plans are made to put these new materials on sale at the beginning of the second quarter of 1956. Mrs. N. Bruce Barrow will write the nursery manuscript, Mrs. J. O. Fort will write the additional manuscript for the beginners' department, and negotiations are under way for a writer of the cradle roll manuscript.

Plans are also in the process of execution to publish the first Free Will Baptist daily vacation Bible school material. These plans are not far enough along at the present to tell whether or not the material will be ready for use during the summer of 1956.

Our weekly publication, *The Free Will Baptist*, has a circulation of approximately 3,800. We urgently recommend that every family in North Carolina subscribe to this weekly periodical. We believe it will be an influence for God and for good in every home. If every Free Will Baptist family in North Carolina would become a subscriber, we would have a circulation of approximately 13,000 in North Carolina alone, not counting the hundreds of subscribers in other states.

REPORT OF TEMPERANCE COMMITTEE SEPTEMBER 14, 15, 1955

We, your Temperance Committee, wish to submit the following for your consideration:

I. Whereas we have a committee, from this State Convention of Original Free Will Baptists of North Carolina, to work with the Allied Church League of North Carolina; and whereas the Allied Church League is an interdenominational organization, made up of different denominations in the State of North Carolina, to combat the evil forces of the liquor traffic in the state; and whereas each denomination wishing to become a member is requested to pay into the Allied Church League some amount of money for membership fees; we therefore recommend that this convention allocate two hundred dollars (\$200.00) to be used for this membership fee in the Allied Church League of North Carolina for the next conventional year.

2. Whereas this membership fee should be paid each year, we therefore recommend that we ask our conferences, union meetings and churches to increase the amount they send to the State Convention by two dollars (\$2.00) each year to take care of this fee.

3. We further recommend that if the question of a liquor, wine or beer referendum shall arise in any town, locality, county or in the state, that our people cooperate with the committee from the convention and the Allied Church League to the extent of asking for help from them in the campaign.

4. We further recommend that this convention of September 14 and 15, 1955, go on record as opposing the sale and use of intoxicating beverages in any form, and that the president of the convention be asked to file with the Governor of North Carolina a copy of this action by our convention. That our president represent and voice this action to the next Legislature, when it shall meet in session.

5. Whereas television has become the leading means of communication and relaxation in the homes of our people, and since many of the programs are not kept to the standards of good clean entertainment, and since liquor, wine and beer are advertised, displayed and consumed during certain programs; we therefore recommend that this convention go on record as opposing such programs, and that our secretary be instructed to notify, the National Board of Television Programing, the Federal Board of Television Programing and each television station within the state of North Carolina, of our action. 6. We further recommend that our people study the Holy Bible and our Treatise for enlightment on how to be temperate in all things.

CONSTITUTION and BY-LAWS North Carolina State Convention Original Free Will Baptists

PREAMBLE

We, the Original Free Will Baptists of North Carolina, assembled in order to advance, promote, and increase the cause of Jesus Christ, do establish and ordain this Constitution and these By-Laws.

Constitution

ARTICLE I

Section 1: This assembly shall be known as the North Carolina State Convention of Original Free Will Baptists.

Section 2: This Convention shall hold an annual session commencing on Wednesday after the second Sunday in September of each year. The place of such meetings to be determined by the Convention or the Executive Committee. Special sessions may be called by the Executive Committee in the event of the existence of needs of sufficient urgency.

ARTICLE II

Section 1: The officers of this Convention shall be a President, Vice-President, Recording Secretary, Assistant Recording Secretary, Promotional Director, and Treasurer.

Section 2: The Convention shall be composed of the general officers, members of standing boards, committees or commissions, and all ordained ministers who belong to churches that are affiliated with the Convention; one delegate from each church in good standing; one delegate from each Union Meeting, Conference or Association in good standing for every one thousand members or a fraction thereof.

By-Laws

ARTICLE I

Section 1: The work of this Convention shall be departmentalized, with a board of control over each department. Each board shall be governed by rules set forth by the Convention. It shall be the duty of the Convention to solicit the cooperation of the Conferences and Associations in promoting the work of these departments.

Section 2: All members of the Convention shall have a right of voice and vote on any issue before the body, providing they have been properly recognized

by the Presiding Officer. They shall serve the Convention in any capacity when called upon by the proper authority. Before membership in the Convention is established, all ministers and delegates must be properly registered.

ARTICLE II

Officers, Boards, Committees and the manner of their election

Section 1: *President:* The President shall be elected for a term of two (2) years. He shall not be elected to succeed himself.

Section 2: Vice-President: The Vice-President shall be elected for a term of two (2) years.

Section 3: Recording Secretary: The Recording Secretary shall be elected for a term of two (2) years.

Section 4: Assistant Recording Secretary: The Assistant Recording Secretary shall be elected for a term of two (2) years.

Section 5: *Promotional Director*: The Promotional Director shall be elected for a term of one (1) year under such contract as may be agreed upon by himself and the Convention or its Executive Committee. In case of a vacancy in this office between sessions of the Convention the Executive Committee shall fill the vacancy until the next session.

Section 6: *Treasurer*: The Treasurer shall be elected for a term of two (2) years.

Section 7: Orphanage Board: The Board of Trustees of the Free Will Baptist Orphanage, Middlesex, shall be composed of nine (9) members with the terms of three members expiring each year, the vacancies to be filled by the Convention.

Section 8: *Board of Superannuation*: The Board of Superannuation shall be composed of five members with the term of one member expiring each year; the vacancy to be filled by the Convention.

Section 9: *Board of Missions:* The Board of Missions shall be composed of five (5) members with the term of one member expiring each year; the vacancy to be filled by the Convention.

Section 10: *Board of Christian Education*: The Board of Christian Education shall be composed of five (5) members with the term of one member expiring each year; the vacancy to be filled by the Convention.

Section 11: *Board of Trustees*: The Board of Trustees shall be composed of three (3) members with the term of one member expiring each year; the vacancy to be filled by the Convention.

Section 12: Representatives of Cragmont Assembly Stock: The stock held by this Convention in Cragmont Assembly, Inc., shall be represented by three members with the term of one member expiring each year; the vacancy to be filled by the Convention.

Section 13: Representatives of Free Will Baptist Press Stock: The stock held by this Convention in the Free Will Baptist Press shall be represented by one member elected annually by the Convention.

Section 14: Representative of Church Finance Association Stock: The stock

held by this Convention in the Church Finance Association, Inc., shall be represented by one member elected annually by the Convention.

Section 15: *Historical Commission*: The Historical Commission shall be composed of three members with the term of one member expiring each year; the vacancy to be filled by the Convention.

Section 16: *Executive Committee*: The Executive Committee shall be composed of the President, Vice-President, Recording Secretary, Treasurer and three members elected by the Convention for a term of two years.

Section 17: Board of Directors of Mount Olive College: The Board of Directors of Mount Olive College shall be composed of nine (9) members, with the terms of office of three (3) members expiring biennially; the vacancies to be filled by the Convention.

ARTICLE III

Duties and Responsibilities

Section 1: *President*: It shall be the duty of the President to preside over each session, preserve order, govern the body according to established parliamentary usage and appoint all temporary committees. He shall have power to declare any office of the Convention vacant, temporarily, subject to the approval of the Convention or the Executive Committee. He shall have authority to call meetings of the Executive Committee, when such is needful, and preside over said meetings.

The President shall be ex-officio member of all boards, standing committees and commissions of the Convention.

Section 2: Vice-President: The duties of the Vice-President shall be the duties of the President when that officer is not present.

Section 3: *Recording Secretary:* The Recording Secretary shall keep an accurate record of the transactions of the Convention and preserve the same, keep all valuable documents and surrender the same to his successor in office.

Section 4: Assistant Recording Secretary: The duties of the Assistant Recording Secretary shall be the duties of the Recording Secretary when that officer is not present and to assist the Recording Secretary when called upon.

Section 5: *Promotional Director*: The Promotional Director shall maintain an office for the purpose of centralizing the work of the Convention. He shall prepare statistical tables necessary to keep the Convention informed as to the growth and progress of the denomination. He shall work with the Convention, the Executive Committee, all boards, committees and commissions of the Convention in placing the work of the denomination before the various bodies of the state for their information and support; also perform any other promotional duties as directed by the Convention or the Executive Committee.

When designated by a board, committee or commission the Promotional Director shall receive and (or) pay out any money controlled by said board, committee or commission as directed by them.

The Promotional Director shall be ex-officio member of all boards, standing committees and commissions of the Convention.

Section 6: *Treasurer*: The Treasurer shall hold all money belonging to the Convention. He shall pay all bills ordered by the Convention or the Executive Committee; other bills paid must be approved by the President and Recording Secretary. He shall give an annual report to the Convention; also make reports to the Executive Committee when called for.

Section 7: Orphanage Board: The Orphanage Board shall be responsible for the management and control of the Free Will Baptist Orphanage at Middlesex. It shall give an annual report to the Convention setting forth its progress, needs and achievements.

Section 8: Board of Superannuation: It shall be the purpose of this Board to organize and unify all superannuation work throughout this State Convention. They shall seek to provide for our aged, retired and infirm ministers in some form of a superannuation program; also seek to offer to our active ministers some program whereby they may help to provide for their future security and retirement.

Section 9: *Board of Missions*: The Board of Missions shall regulate and supervise all mission work under the control of this Convention. It shall co-operate with the Mission program of the National Association. It shall endeavor to raise money for missions and build sentiment favorable to missions.

Section 10: Board of Christian Education: The Board of Christian Education shall keep our people informed as to our educational needs; endeavor to promote the cause of, receive funds for and stimulate interest among our people in the cause of Christian Education. It shall be their duty to co-operate with the educational institutions of our denomination and use all funds for the best interest of Christian Education as directed by this Convention and the donors of funds for education.

Section 11: *Board of Trustees:* The Board of Trustees shall hold title to all property belonging to this Convention. It shall have power to convey such property when authorized by the Convention.

Section 12: Representatives of Cragmont Assembly Stock: The Representatives of the stock held by this Convention, in Cragmont Assembly, Inc., shall work jointly with representatives of other auxiliaries holding stock in said institution.

Section 13: Representatives of Free Will Baptist Press Stock: The Representative of the stock held by this Convention in the Free Will Baptist Press shall meet annually, or as often as called upon, with the stockholders of the Press at Ayden, N. C., to transact any business that may come before them.

Section 14: Representative of Church Finance Association Stock: The Representative of the Membership Stock held by this Convention in the Church Finance Association, Inc., shall meet annually, or as often as called upon, with the stockholders of the corporation for the purpose of transacting any business that may come before them.

Section 15: *Historical Commission*: The Historical Commission shall make research, compile same and record historical events of the denomination to date; these documents become the property of the Convention and shall be held by the Recording Secretary.

Section 16: Executive Committee: The work of the Executive Committee shall be that of the Convention when the Convention is not in session. It shall call as many sessions as necessary between the annual sessions of the Convention to transact business. It shall have the authority to suspend any officer of the Convention when such officer proves a failure in duties, proves non-Christian or detrimental to the cause of Christ and appoint another to fill the vacancy; also fill vacancies made by any other cause.

The Executive Committee shall supervise the work of the Promotional Department between the annual sessions of the Convention as most practicable to our state work and in keeping with the expressed will of the annual session of the Convention.

A report of all transactions of this Committee shall be made to the Convention in annual session.

Section 17: Board of Directors of Mount Olive College: The Board of Directors of Mount Olive College shall be responsible for the management and operation of Mount Olive College under the Certificate of Incorporation granted by the State of North Carolina and the directives of this Convention. It shall propose any necessary amendments or revisions of said Certificate of Incorporation, which amendments or revisions shall be approved by this Convention before being put into force. It shall make an annual report to the Convention, setting forth its progress, needs and achievements. It shall have power to organize at will and to create such by-laws as may be deemed essential for its government and for the control, administration and promotion of the college, consistent with the provisions of its Certificate of Incorporation and the constitution and regulation of this State Convention.

AMENDMENTS

This Constitution and these By-Laws shall not be changed or altered except by a two-thirds vote of members present in a regular session. All amendments shall lie on the table not less than six hours prior to adoption and shall, during that time, be read not less than twice in open Convention.
