The committee appointed by the executive committee for the purpose to define and interpret the office and work of the promotional department met in Wilson, July 5, 1956.

Members present: Revs. D. W. Alexander, R. N. Hinnant and L. R. Ennis.

Prayer by Rev. R. N. Hinnant.

(1) Defining: The constitution of the state convention provides for the office of a promotional director. (See Article 2, Section 2.)

The work and duties of the promotional director as prescribed by the bylaws of the convention is found in Article 2, Section 5.

(2) Interpretation: The office of the promotional director shall be localized; specifically designed for the purpose of promoting the entire denominational work within the bounds of the state of North Carolina.

The central public relations service of the North Carolina State Convention shall be administered from this office.

This department shall conduct and promote:

- a. Study courses.
- b. Clinics: Daily vacation Bible school, Sunday school, evangelism, mission, pastoral, auxiliary, deacons, conduct rallies, encampments, institutes, etc.

- c. Financial campaigns: Church budgets, corelation of departmental budgets.
 - d. Statistical information and keep records of same.
- e. Secretarial service: Reports, correspondence, bulletins, charts, maps, etc.

(3) Recommendations:

- a. This department shall be the receiving agency for all funds and keep separate accounts for each enterprise; exclusive of "Incorporated Bodies."
- b. This department shall distribute all funds received to the authorized agency for which the money was designated.
- c. This department shall keep accurate records of all money received and be able to give financial reports at designated intervals.
- d. That all state organizations of the state of North Carolina shall be subordinate to the North Carolina State Convention.
- e. The director of this department shall be bonded at the discretion of the Executive Committee of the North Carolina State Convention.
- f. The Executive Committee of the North Carolina State Convention shall be the directing and governing authority of this department.
- g. A suitable office be set up for this department in the town of Ayden, N. C.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

ARTICLE II

Section II

This convention shall be composed of its general officers, all members of standing boards, committees or commissions, the members of executive boards elected by affiliated state organizations, and all ordained ministers who belong to churches affiliated with the convention; one delegate from each church in good standing; one delegate from each union meeting, conference or association, in good standing, for every one thousand members or a fraction thereof.

AMENDMENT TO THE BYLAWS ARTICLE I

Section I

The work of this convention shall be departmentalized, with an affiliated state organization or a board of control over each department. Each affiliated state organization and board shall be governed by rules and regulations that prescribe cooperation with the state convention. It shall be the duty of the convention to solicit the cooperation of the conferences and associations in promoting the work of the departments and state organizations.

REPORT OF MOUNT OLIVE JUNIOR COLLEGE FOR THE FISCAL YEAR ENDING AUGUST 31, 1956

Greetings:

Mount Olive Junior College was chartered by and is owned and operated by the North Carolina State Convention of Free Will Baptists. It is to this convention that the college is responsible; it is also to this convention that the college must look for its support. This convention must assume financial responsibility to the college to the same degree that it exercises control over its operation.

The Objective of the College

Mount Olive Junior College was established because this convention realized that our denomination could not make progress or even survive without a sound program of Christian higher education. "The objective of the college is to train and educate young men and women for Christian life and service, thus preparing them for useful vocations and successful living in the home, the church, the school, the community and the world."

We believe that if we are to have an educational institution that can adequately serve our young people, it must be an accredited college. An accredited college is one that is approved by an association of other colleges. An accredited college is absolutely essential for an educational program that helps to train teachers, doctors, nurses, chaplains, lawyers, social workers, engineers and foreign missionaries. Our entire denominational program of foreign missions is in serious jeopardy unless we develop an accredited program of higher education.

Accreditation does not mean that our college would be controlled from the outside. We continue to choose our own faculty members, include whatever courses of study we desire, and regulate student life as we think best. Accreditation simply means that we measure up to certain required standards such as an adequate library, properly equipped science laboratory, sufficient income, trained faculty, etc.

Mount Olive Junior College expects to have met all requirements for

accreditation by the North Carolina College Conference during the current school year. We have already had a preliminary visit from the State Department of Education and we are looking forward to a full scale investigation this fall.

Who May Attend Mount Olive Junior College

The college is open to both men and women. Our program of study is designed for both laymen and ministers. We are adequately prepared to offer the first two years of college that are basic to almost all of the leading vocations, including teaching, the Christian ministry, social work and business education.

Credits earned at Mount Olive Junior College can be transferred without loss to the senior colleges of eastern North Carolina.

Progress

Facilities:

When the college opened in September, 1954, we were ill-equipped for the task ahead of us. We had no library, dining hall, auditorium seats, heating unit or science laboratory. Our classroom and office furniture was inadequate.

Today, we have a beautiful, well-equipped building. Our science laboratory is well furnished. Our library contains 4,000 volumes and is administered by a full-time professionally trained librarian, and due to the generosity of the Reverend J. C. Moye, of Snow Hill, had an endowment of \$12,500.00. Our cafeteria has maintained a sanitation grade of "A" since it was opened. On every hand we are adequately prepared to carry on our work for the current school year.

Enrollment:

The following figures tell the story of growth in the student body:

Fall of 1954—22 Fall of 1955—40 Fall of 1956—61

These are figures for full-time college students. Night and special students would increase these enrollment figures considerably.

The total enrollment for the current term is 87.

Financial:

Our total income for the year ending August 31, 1956, was more than \$80,000. For a complete financial report see the report of M. L. Johnson, treasurer, which is attached hereto.

In addition to the above amount we have received the following in endowments and student loan funds and scholarships.

A. Endowments:

1. \$5,000 in stock in the Mount Olive Pickle Company, donated by Dr. C. C. Henderson, of Mount Olive, North Carolina.

- 2. \$12,500 trust fund for the college library given by the Reverend J. C. Moye Sr., Snow Hill, North Carolina.
- 3. \$10,000 by the Mount Olive Pickle Company to be paid at the rate of \$2,000 per year.
- 4. \$600 by the First Union Meeting of the North Carolina Western Conference with plans for \$100 to be added each quarter.
- 5. \$1,000 life insurance policy by W. Burkette Raper, (policy will be paid up in 15 years).
- 6. \$1,000 life insurance policy by S. A. Smith, (policy will be paid up in 10 years).

These endowment funds total more than \$30,000; the capital of these funds is invested and only the interest is spent. But while we have made tremendous progress during the past year, we have hardly begun to reach our goal. We need, during the next year, to increase our permanent endowment funds to at least \$100,000. I hope to live to see Mount Olive Junior College with an endowment fund of one million dollars. Let us remember the words of the Lord to the children of Israel: "... thou shalt remember the LORD thy God: for it is he that giveth thee power to get wealth, ..." (Deuteronomy 8:18).

B. Loan Funds:

- 1. The William Cecil Raper Loan Fund. This fund was started in the fall of 1955 by the president of the college. It makes available \$50.00 per semester to a deserving student.
- 2. The Bruce Herring Loan Fund. This fund in the amount of \$250.00 was made available by Mr. and Mrs. Bruce Herring, of Mount Olive. They expect to increase this fund from time to time.

C. Scholarship:

The Business and Professional Woman's Club of Mount Olive awards \$50.00 each year to a student chosen by the students and faculty on the basis of need, character and ability.

Many more loan funds and scholarships are urgently needed to assist deserving students. A fund in any amount may be started by an individual, Sunday school class, church or auxiliary. The college will be happy to furnish further information to those interested.

A Look Ahead and Recommendations

We are both grateful and proud of the progress we have been able to make during the past two years. The success of the college is due to prayer, hard work, sacrifice and the generosity of hundreds of friends. But the progress of yesterday will not meet the ever growing and expanding needs of today and tomorrow.

It is safe to estimate that there are 500 Free Will Baptists enrolled in institutions of higher learning in North Carolina at this very hour. The State Department of Education expects the college population in North

Carolina to double within the next fifteen years. By 1970, there will be more than 1,000 of our own young men and women in college in North Carolina. To lose these students would be to lose our hope for a strong church in the days of our children. We can claim the allegiance of these young people only if we provide educational opportunities for them.

The Board of Directors of Mount Olive Junior College approved the following recommendations of the president at their meeting on September 7, and they are hereby passed on to this convention for ratification.

- I. That we purchase the Jessie Martin property consisting of 49.8 acres, located four-tenths of one mile from our present property, said purchase to be according to the terms of an option already taken on this property. (The option calls for Mr. Martin to deliver a fee simple deed to the college and for the college to pay a sum of \$40,000, payable at the rate of \$8,000 per year beginning October 1, for five (5) years with an interest rate of 5% on the unpaid balance after October 1, 1956. The purchase of this property would enable the college to continue using its present campus and to use this new land for future growth and expansion. The town of Mount Olive has already raised more than \$5,000 toward the payment of our first installment on this property, and we are asking this convention to appropriate \$1,000 during this session to be applied on the original purchase price.
- II. That we plan toward building a campus adequate to care for five hundred boarding students when complete, but the progress of the building program to be determined by our needs and the availability of funds. Such a campus could easily be expanded to accommodate five hundred day students, thus giving us a Christian liberal arts college prepared to care for a total enrollment of one thousand (1,000).

The board of directors of the college has already employed Mr. Milton Small, architect of Raleigh, North Carolina, to begin work on a master plan for the new campus. Mr. Small has personally surveyed our new proposed property and has recommended it as an ideal site for a college campus.

- III. That the fiscal year for Mount Olive Junior College be July I through June 30, beginning in 1957. This fiscal year would correspond with our academic year and would enable us to more adequately report to this convention.
- IV. That Mount Olive Junior College be authorized to conduct whatever financial campaign it deems necessary for the promotion of a progressive and sound program of Christian education.

Conclusion:

It is the purpose of Mount Olive Junior College to serve, so far as possible, the higher educational needs of Free Will Baptists in North Carolina. REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

The board of Christian education met at Mount Olive College on September 4, 1956, to organize and to discuss matters of business. Four members of the board were present for this meeting; they were: Rev. David Hansley, Rev. Roy Rikard, Mr. L. H. Wetherington and Rev. Michael Pelt.

The meeting was called to order by Rev. Hansley. A chairman, a vice-chairman and a secretary-treasurer were elected.

Rev. Hansley, the newly elected chairman, brought us up-to-date on the past activities and functions of this board.

Rev. Pelt was asked to report on his meeting with the executive board of the state convention, which met in June at Wilson, N. C. At this meeting the executive board asked that the Rev. Lloyd Vernon meet with the board of Christian education to decide what the future plans and functions of this board should be.

Rev. Vernon was asked to offer any advice or suggestions which would help this board to define its responsibilities for the present and the future.

Rev. Vernon then suggested that the board of Christian education had a broad field of responsibility according to the constitution of the state convention. He further suggested that this board might well continue to serve valuable purposes in the total program of Christian education among Free Will Baptists in this state. He felt that no change need be made in the constitution of the state convention affecting this board.

A program of activities for the coming year was then discussed by members of the board. The following is a summary of this program:

- 1. We propose, as the board of Christian education, to write and publish a pamphlet outlining an adequate program of Christian education for the local church. This pamphlet is to be made available to churches, pastors and individuals upon request.
- 2. Since this board has no means of financing its work, we ask that the state convention pay the expenses of board meetings, together with the cost of printing the proposed pamphlet mentioned above.

Rev. Rikard was given an opportunity to explain the need for a Bible Institute in the Piedmont Association. He asked that the board offer advice and any recommendations for establishing such an institute.

It was moved and carried that this board endorse the proposal of a Bible institute in the Piedmont Association.

It was moved and carried that the service at the state convention to be conducted by this board consist of a speaker to be selected by our chairman. The invocation will be by a representative of Mount Olive College and the benediction by a representative of Free Will Baptist Bible College.

The following is a list of recommendations by this board to the state convention:

1. We recommend that the state convention, through its executive committee, negotiate with the executive committee of the national association and

work out a coordinated financial program between the national association and the state of North Carolina in accordance with the seven point program.

- 2. We recommend the endorsement of the proposed Bible institute in the Piedmont Association.
- 3. We recommend that a program of extension courses at the institute level be conducted by teachers approved by Mount Olive College under the sponsorship of this board. These courses would be in such fields as Bible Doctrine, Church Administration, Sunday School Administration, and Sunday School Workers' courses. Each church holding such an institute will bear the expenses of same.

This year the board of trustees had the firm of Phelps and Green of Wilson, North Carolina, to survey the campus and make suggestions for future buildings. The old building is being taken down to make room for new buildings which will better serve the needs of the children's home. The first building to be built in the improvement program is a laundry building. It will be a modern structure of brick and concrete block with steel windows. The building will have space for the laundry equipment, boiler room, ironing room, sewing room and storage space.

HEALTH PROGRAM

The health of the children has been good this year. During the month of August, Dr. Edwards of the state health program spent two and one-half weeks treating the children's teeth. For this we are very appreciative.

CHANGE IN NAME

At the setting of the 1955 session of the North Carolina State Convention of Free Will Baptists, there was a motion passed to have the name changed from The Free Will Baptist Orphanage to The Free Will Baptist Children's Home. Since then the board of directors of the orphanage have complied with the motion and when the North Carolina State Convention

of Free Will Baptists accepts this report the official name will be The Free Will Baptist Children's Home.

SUPPORT AND FUTURE IMPROVEMENTS

REPORT OF NORTH CAROLINA STATE LEAGUE CONVENTION

The state league convention of the Original Free Will Baptist of North Carolina met in its twenty-ninth annual session on May 11 and 12, 1956, at Mount Olive Junior College, Mount Olive, North Carolina. 

CONSTITUTION and BYLAWS

North Carolina State Convention Original Free Will Baptists

PREAMBLE

We, the Original Free Will Baptists of North Carolina, assembled in order to advance, promote and increase the cause of Jesus Christ, do establish and ordain this constitution and these bylaws.

Constitution

ARTICLE I

Section 1: This assembly shall be known as the North Carolina State Convention of Original Free Will Baptists.

Section 2: This convention shall hold an annual session commencing on Wednesday after the second Sunday in September of each year. The place of such meetings to be determined by the convention or the executive committee. Special sessions may be called by the executive committee in the event of the existence of needs of sufficient urgency.

ARTICLE II

Section 1: The officers of this convention shall be a president, vicepresident, recording secretary, assistant recording secretary, promotional director and treasurer.

Section 2: The convention shall be composed of the general officers, members of standing boards, committees or commissions and all ordained ministers who belong to churches that are affiliated with the convention; one delegate from each church in good standing; one delegate from each union meeting, conference or association in good standing for every one thousand members or a fraction thereof.

Bylaws ARTICLE I

Section 1: The work of this convention shall be departmentalized, with a board of control over each department. Each board shall be governed by rules set forth by the convention. It shall be the duty of the convention to solicit the cooperation of the conferences and associations in promoting the work of these departments.

Section 2: All members of the convention shall have a right of voice and vote on any issue before the body, providing they have been properly recognized by the presiding officer. They shall serve the convention in any capacity when called upon by the proper authority. Before membership in the convention is established, all ministers and delegates must be properly registered.

ARTICLE II

OFFICERS, BOARDS, COMMITTEES AND THE MANNER OF THEIR ELECTION

Section 1: President: The president shall be elected for a term of two (2) years. He shall not be elected to succeed himself.

Section 2: Vice-President: The vice-president shall be elected for a term of two (2) years.

Section 3: Recording Secretary: The recording secretary shall be elected for a term of two (2) years.

Section 4: Assistant Recording Secretary: The assistant recording secretary shall be elected for a term of two (2) years.

Section 5: Promotional Director: The promotional director shall be elected for a term of one (1) year under such contract as may be agreed upon by himself and the convention or its executive committee. In case of a vacancy in this office between sessions of the convention the executive committee shall fill the vacancy until the next session.

Section 6: Treasurer: The treasurer shall be elected for a term of two (2) years.

Section 7: Children's Home Board: The board of trustees of the Free Bill Baptist Children's Home, Middlesex, shall be composed of nine (9) members with the terms of three members expiring each year; the vacancies to be filled by the convention.

Section 8: Board of Superannuation: The board of superannuation shall be composed of five (5) members with the term of one member expiring each year; the vacancy to be filled by the convention.

Section 9: Board of Missions: The board of missions shall be composed of five (5) members with the term of one member expiring each year; the vacancy to be filled by the convention.

Section 10: Board of Christian Education: The board of Christian Education shall be composed of five (5) members with the term of one member expiring each year; the vacancy to be filled by the convention.

Section 11: Board of Trustees: The board of trustees shall be composed of three (3) members with the term of one member expiring each year; the vacancy to be filled by the convention.

Section 12: Representatives of Cragmont Assembly Stock: The stock held by this convention in Cragmont Assembly, Inc., shall be represented by three members with the term of one member expiring each year; the vacancy to be filled by the convention.

Section 13: Representatives of Free Will Baptist Press Stock: The stock held by this convention in the Free Will Baptist Press shall be represented by one member elected annually by the convention.

Section 14: Representative of Church Finance Association Stock: The stock held by this convention in the Church Finance Association, Inc., shall be represented by one member elected annually by the convention.

Section 15: Historical Commission: The historical commission shall be composed of three members with the term of one member expiring each year; the vacancy to be filled by the convention.

Section 16: Executive Committee: The executive committee shall be composed of the president, vice-president, recording secretary, treasurer and three members elected by the convention for a term of two years.

Section 17: Board of Directors of Mount Olive College: The board of directors of Mount Olive College shall be composed of nine (9) members, with the term of office of three (3) members expiring biennially; the vacancies to be filled by the convention.

ARTICLE III

Duties and Responsibilities

Section 1: President: It shall be the duty of the president to preside over each session, preserve order, govern the body according to established parliamentary usage and appoint all temporary committees. He shall have power to declare any office of the convention vacant, temporarily, subject to the approval of the convention or the executive committee. He shall have authority to call meetings of the executive committee, when such is needful, and preside over said meetings.

The president shall be ex-officio member of all boards, standing committees and commissions of the convention.

Section 2: Vice-President: The duties of the vice-president shall be the duties of the president when that officer is not present.

Section 3: Recording Secretary: The recording secretary shall keep an accurate record of the transactions of the convention and preserve the same, keep all valuable documents and surrender the same to his successor in office.

Section 4: Assistant Recording Secretary: The duties of the assistant recording secretary shall be the duties of the recording secretary when that officer is not present and to assist the recording secretary when called upon.

Section 5: Promotional Director: The promotional director shall maintain an office for the purpose of centralizing the work of the convention. He shall prepare statistical tables necessary to keep the convention informed as to the growth and progress of the denomination. He shall work with the convention, the executive committee, all boards, committees and commissions of the convention in placing the work of the denomination before the various bodies of the state for their information and support; also perform any other promotional duties as directed by the convention or the executive committee.

When designated by a board, committee or commission the promotional director shall receive and (or) pay out any money controlled by said board, committee or commission as directed by them.

The promotional director shall be ex-officio member of all boards, standing committees and commissions of the convention.

Section 6: Treasurer: The treasurer shall hold all money belonging to the convention. He shall pay all bills ordered by the convention or the executive committee; other bills paid must be approved by the president and recording secretary. He shall give an annual report to the convention; also make reports to the executive committee when called for.

Section 7: Children's Home Board: The children's home board shall be responsible for the management and control of the Free Will Baptist Children's home at Middlesex. It shall give an annual report to the convention setting forth its progress, needs and achievements.

Section 8: Board of Superannuation: It shall be the purpose of this board to organize and unify all superannuation work throughout this state convention. They shall seek to provide for our aged, retired and infirm ministers in some form of a superannuation program; also seek to offer to our active ministers some program whereby they may help to provide for their future security and retirement.

Section 9: Board of Missions: The board of missions shall regulate and supervise all mission work under the control of this convention. It shall cooperate with the mission program of the national association. It shall endeavor to raise money for missions and build sentiment favorable to missions.

Section 10: Board of Christian Education: The board of Christian education shall keep our people informed as to our educational needs; endeavor to promote the cause of, receive funds for and stimulate interest among our people in the cause of Christian education. It shall be their duty to cooperate with the educational institutions of our denomination and use all funds for the best interest of Christian education as directed by this convention and the donors of funds for education.

Section 11: Board of Trustees: The board of trustees shall hold title to all property belonging to this convention. It shall have power to convey such property when authorized by the convention.

Section 12: Representatives of Cragmont Assembly Stock: The representatives of the stock held by this convention, in Cragmont Assembly. Inc., shall work jointly with representatives of other auxiliaries holding stock in said institution.

Section 13: Representatives of Free Will Baptist Press Stock: The representative of the stock held by this convention in the Free Will Baptist Press shall meet annually, or as often as called upon, with the stockholders of the press at Ayden, N. C., to transact any business that may come before them.

Section 14: Representative of Church Finance Association Stock: The representative of the membership stock held by this convention in the Church Finance Association, Inc., shall meet annually, or as often as called upon, with the stockholders of the corporation for the purpose of transacting any business that may come before them.

Section 15: Historical Commission: The historical commission shall

make research, compile same and record historical events of the denomination to date; these documents become the property of the convention and shall be held by the recording secretary.

Section 16: Executive Committee: The work of the executive committee shall be that of the convention when the convention is not in session. It shall call as many sessions as necessary between the annual sessions of the convention to transact business. It shall have the authority to suspend any officer of the convention when such officer proves a failure in duties, non-Christian or detrimental to the cause of Christ and appoint another to fill the vacancy; also fill vacancies made by any other cause.

The executive committee shall supervise the work of the promotional department between the annual sessions of the convention as most practicable to our state work and in keeping with the expressed will of the annual session of the convention.

A report of all transactions of this committee shall be made to the convention in annual session.

Section 17: Board of Directors of Mount Olive College: The board of directors of Mount Olive College shall be responsible for the management and operation of Mount Olive College under the certificate of incorporation granted by the state of North Carolina and the directives of this convention. It shall propose any necessary amendments or revisions of said certificate of incorporation, which amendments or revisions shall be approved by this convention before being put into force. It shall make an annual report to the convention, setting forth its progress, needs and achievements. It shall have power to organize at will and to create such bylaws as may be deemed essential for its government and for the control, administration and promotion of the college, consistent with the provisions of its certificate of incorporation and the constitution and regulation of this state convention.

AMENDMENTS

This constitution and these bylaws shall not be changed or altered except by a two-thirds vote of members present in a regular session. All amendments shall lie on the table not less than six hours prior to adoption and shall, during that time, be read not less than twice in open convention.
