

#### PROCEEDINGS

The fourty-fifth annual session of the North Carolina State Convention of Free Will Baptist Churches was held with Cramerton Free Will Baptist Church, Cramerton, North Carolina on September 11, 12, 1957. The assembly was called to order by the secretary.

The Rev. Henry Melvin conducted the morning devotional at 10:00 a.m. The congregation sang "All Hail the Power." Brother Melvin then led a responsive reading of Psalm 23. Brother Melvin and Brother Damon Dodd sang "The Lord Is My Shepherd." Prayer by Brother Melvin. The congregation sang "Amazing Grace."

It was moved and carried that we adopt the program as arranged by the executive committee with the exception of the morning schedule for Wednesday morning which was to be arranged at the discretion of the president.

The president introduced Mr. W. P. Biggerstaff, representative of the Allied Church League, who spoke to us briefly concerning the work of the Allied Church League in dealing with the problem of beverage alcohol in our state. He urged the full support of Christian people in the fight against beverage alcohol by legislative and educational means.

# REPORT OF CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE TO THE NORTH CAROLINA STATE CONVENTION September 11, 1957

- 4. That those who consider that they are included in the above report and have properly registered, may vote on this report.
- 5. That the committee will make a more complete report as early as it is convenient.
- 6. However, if there is any doubt about the membership of any one; we recommend that it be referred to the credentials committee.

#### REPORT OF MOUNT OLIVE JUNIOR COLLEGE to the North Carolina State Convention of Free Will Baptist Churches September 11, 12, 1957

Greetings:

Mount Olive Junior College is happy to present this report to the Free Will Baptist people of North Carolina who own and operate the college. During the past year we have made steady progress in every area of our college work, and we look forward to many more years of continued growth. Mount Olive Junior College is a sound and Christian educational institution for which all of our people are justly thankful.

#### Opportunity

It is safe to say that today there are at least 500 Free Will Baptist students in college in North Carolina alone, and that by 1970 there will be 1,000 of our sons and daughters in college. Add to this number the Free Will Baptist students in other states who are enrolled in state and denominational supported colleges and you begin to get a picture of the "open door" before us.

These students in college today are our teachers, doctors, nurses, ministers, engineers and business men of tomorrow, for tomorrow's leaders are in today's colleges. If Free Will Baptists will provide the best educational facilities possible for our youth, we can save our sons and daughters for service in our own church. If we leave the burden of educating our youth to others, we may expect those who educate our young people to receive their services.

Education is expensive not only to the student but also to the people who sponsor colleges. The Council for Financial Aid to Education reports that in state supported colleges students pay on the average 18%, which is less and one-fifth the total cost of their education and the tax-payer is responsible for 78%. In the church supported colleges the student pays 55% of the cost of his education and the balance is the responsibility of the college and its sponsoring body.

In short these figures mean that Mount Olive Junior Colloge needs \$500 per student per year over and above what the student pays. It costs a denomination to maintain a college, but it costs far more to lose our sons and daughters. When we lose our youth, we have lost our hope for progress and effective Christian service.

#### Growth

#### Students:

The college opened this week with an enrollment of eighty-seven regular students. The following figures show our growth.

Our enrollment is thus almost four times what it was three years ago. Library:

Today we have 4,000 approved and catalogued volumes in our library. The library alone is worth the entire purchase price of \$25,000 for Mount Olive Junior College four years ago. The Board of Directors have named our library The J. C. Moye Library in appreciation of Mr. Moye's endowment for the library in the amount of \$12,500.

We look forward to the establishment of a collection of historical records of the Free Will Baptist demonination in our library.

Curriculum:

The program of study at Mount Olive Junior College is designed to meet the requirements for the first two years of study basic to most professions, including teaching, the Christian ministry, missions, business, law, medicine, industry and related vocations. The college also offers both a one and two-year program in secretarial studies.

This year for the first time the college will have full-time instructors in science, mathematics, music, Bible and foreign language.

It should be pointed out that from the beginning of the college Bible has been a requirement for graduation in every program of study. Laboratory:

Through a generous gift in the amount of \$2,500 from Dr. C. C. Henderson of Mount Olive, the college has added much equipment to its laboratory and this fall for the first time will offer chemistry.

These endowments, insurance policies, and loan funds are ideal opportunities for lasting investments in honor or memory of friends or relatives. Scholarships:

The Business and Professional Woman's Club of Mount Olive awards a scholarship each year to the Mount Olive Junior College student selected by the faculty as the student making the most progress in one year.

The Carolina Patriots Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution, awards an annual scholarship to the first-year student with the highest academic average.

A tuition scholarship in the amount of \$250 is awarded any Free Will Baptist student attending Mount Olive Junior College who graduates as the valedictorian or salutatorian of his high school class.

#### Accreditation

Because we have heard much about "accredited colleges" recently, we have enclosed with this report the North Carolina reqirements for junior college accreditation. The value of accreditation is that credits earned in an accredited college are generally accepted by other colleges.

So far as we know, Mount Olive Junior College, has met all formal requirements for initial approval by the North Carolina College Conference,

but a final statement on this matter cannot be made until after the meeting of the College Conference in November.

Since last September, the college has been approved by the Veteran's Administration.

We are, however, obliged to have a dormitory for girls ready at the earliest possible date. Every effort must be put forth to reach this objective. We have retained the services of an architect but we have not had adequate funds to proceed with definite building plans.

We now have resident students in five different homes in Mount Olive in addition to our regular dormitory space.

#### Recommendations

The following recommendations have been approved by the Board of Directors in regular session and are passed to this convention for adoption.

- 1. That the college be authorized to continue to conduct whatever financial campaigns necessary for the operation and growth of the college;
- 2. That the Board of Directors of the college be increased from nine to eighteen members with three new members to be added every other year beginning in 1958 until the total of eighteen is reached, and that the other states be given official representation on the Board of Directors, such representation to be determined by the North Carolina State Convention (Admendments to the Charter and Constitution authorizing these changes to be presented for approval in 1958);
  - 3. That the attached budget be approved;
  - 4. That the attached financial report be approved.

#### Conclusion

Let us join together in prayer and dedication for the building of a program of Christian higher education for the preparation of our sons and daughters for Christian life and service. If we will provide our best for our youth, we can in return expect their best. If we lose our youth, we have lost our hope for denominational service.

The future belongs to those who prepare for it. May God help us!

#### NORTH CAROLINA COLLEGE CONFERENCE

The principles for accrediting junior colleges are as follows:

In defining standards for the junior colleges the committee had in mind an institution covering the first two years of college work.

1. The requirement for admission shall be the satisfactory completion of a four-year course in a secondary school approved by a recognized agency or the equivalent of such a course as shown by examination. The major portion of the secondary school course accepted for admission should be definitely correlated with the curriculum to which the student is admitted.

- 2. R quirements for graduation must be based on the satisfactory completion of thirty year hours, or sixty semester hours of work corresponding in grade to that given in the freshman and sophomore years of colleges or universities. In addition to the above quantitative requirements each institution should adopt other qualitative standards suited to its individual conditions.
- 3. Members of the teaching staff in regular charge of classes must have a bacculaureate degree and not less than one year of graduate work in a recognized graduate school. In the enforcement of this standard consideration will be given to teachers of long standing and effective service.
- 4. A schedule of sixteen credit hours a week is recommended for teachers with eighteen credit hours as a maximum.
- 5. The curriculum should provide for breadth of study and should have justifiable relation to the resources of the institution, but there should be a minimum of five departments, each in charge of a teacher giving at least half of his time to collegiate instruction in his department. This number of departments, and the size of the faculty should be increased with the developments of varied curricula and growth of the student body.
- 6. The limit of the number of students in a recitation or laboratory class in junior college should be thirty-five.
- 7. The college work should be the essential part of the curriculum. No junior college should be accredited until its registration in the college work has reached approximately fifty students.
- 8. The material equipment and upkeep of a junior college, its buildings, land, laboratories, apparatus and libraries should be judged by their efficiency in relation to the educational program.
- (a) The laboratory shall be adequate for all the experiments called for by the courses offered in the science (about \$2,000 worth of apparatus for each science offered) and these facilities shall be kept up by means of an annual appropriation in keeping with the curriculum. The laboratory equipment for a science in which twelve or more semester hours is offered should be worth at least \$2,500.

A junior college should have a live, well distributed, professionally administered library of at least 4.000 volumes exclusive of public documents, bearing specifically upon the subjects taught.

The librarian should be a full-time library employee holding a degree in library science and should have faculty rank. There should be an annual expenditure of an average of two dollars and fifty cents per student for books, periodicals and binding with a minimum expenditure or \$500 annually for new books.

9. The minimum annual operating income for the two years of junior college work should be \$10,000 of which not less than \$5,000 should be derived from stable sources, other than students, preferably permanent endowments. Increase in faculty, student body and scope of instruction should

be accompanied by increases of income from such stable sources. The financial status of each junior college should be judged in relation to its educational program.

10. No junior college shall be accredited that does not have a minimum salary of at least \$2,800 for departmental heads for nine months' term with no teachers receiving less than \$2,500 for the same period.

#### RELIGIOUS SERVICES MOUNT OLIVE JUNIOR COLLEGE 1957-58

Mount Olive Junior College considers the development of a sound Christian philosophy of life and Christian character to be an integral part of its educational objective. Someone has wisely said, "The heart of education is the education of the heart."

Although the college wishes that Christian experience and growth are dependent upon the attitude and will of the individual, every effort is made to cultivate the spiritual life of each student. The following religious activities are designed to integrate our Christian experience with our academic learning.

- 1. Chapel Services: These services are held throughout the school year on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays at 10:00 a.m. in the college auditorium and are intended to be a contribution to the spiritual life of students and faculty. Attendance is required.
- 2. Sunday School and Church: Sunday school is held each Sunday at 9:45 a.m. and morning worship is conducted the first and third Sundays of each month. Resident students on campus for the week end are required to attend these services. On Sundays when worship services are not held at the college, students are expected to attend a worshoip service at the church of their choice.
- 3. Free Will Baptist Fellowship Hour (League): A fellowship hour consisting of the evening meal and a youth program is held each Sunday evening at 5:30 in the college cafeteria. Resident students on campus for the week end are expected to attend.
- 4. Dormitory Devotions: Dormitory devotions are held each evening as arranged by the students.
- 5. Missionary Prayer Band: This organization is composed of interested students who meet at 1:00 p.m., Monday through Friday, to study and pray for the cause of world-wide Christian missions.
- 6. Spiritual Emphasis Week: During each school year a Spiritual Emphasis Week is held for the purpose of leading each student to make or renew his personal commitment to Jesus Christ as his Lord and Saviour.

Visitors are always welcome to any of these services.

#### REPORT OF NORTH CAROLINA STATE LEAGUE CONVENTION

The North Carolina State League Convention of the Original Free Will Baptists met in its 30th annual session at Saint Mary's Church, New Bern, North Carolina, May 3-5, 1957. The theme of the convention was: "For Him, My All." The Scripture was 1 Corinthians 29:5—"Who then is willing to consecrate his service this day unto the Lord?"

We would like to report that this meeting of the convention was the most successful of any that we have attended. Great emphasis was placed on a good spiritual program, with several of the National League Convention personalities appearing on the program. Results of this type of program were seen on Friday evening when nine young people made decisions for Christ, and on Saturday evening when 32 young people came to the altar to dedicate themselves to the Lord's will. We trust that the next session of the convention will be even greater than the one this year.

The league reports showed a total of 40 leagues reporting (this does not include the reports that were handed in late, and were not included in the digest report), with 1,066 leaguers enrolled. There was a total of 140 new members added to the enrollment during the past year. There was a contribution to the convention of \$236.89, with a total registration of about 400. This was the largest attendance during recent years.

Awards this year go to:

Primary—Hull Road Junior—Spring Branch Intermediate—Sound Side Senior—Sound Side Adult—Ruth's Chapel

The convention has launched a drive to raise \$500.00 for Cragmont. The plan was to secure one half dollar from each leaguer. So far only \$203.75 has been received.

The convention also sponsored a youth encampment at Cragmont this past summer, with a very successful week. Our plans are to continue with the encampment each year.

May we be allowed to request the following:

- 1. That our ministers pledge their support to the work of the league convention, and also the work of the leagues in their various pastorates.
- 2. That each delegate go back and encourage his league to support the 1958 league convention, and also seek to help raise the \$500.00 for Cragmont.

Our league work has been weak during the past years, but we trust

REPORT OF THE NORTH CAROLINA FREE WILL BAPTIST SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION-INSTITUTE
TO THE FORTY-FIFTH SESSION OF THE STATE CONVENTION OF CHURCHES, OF THE ORIGINAL FREE WILL BAPTISTS OF NORTH CAROLINA

Convening at Cramerton Church, Sept. 11, 12, 1957

GREETINGS, in the blessed name of our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ:

Our convention met in its 18th annual session, Thursday, March 28, 1957, at Little Creek Church, in Greene County. The theme for the program was "Keep on Going."

Throughout the day, all reports by the officers and directors were encouraging. They reflected the history of not only the past year, but also the record of the past seventeen years, in which our heavenly Father has remarkably blessed the Sunday schools of our state, and our efforts to combine our efforts into a great forward movement of teacher and officer training.

A complete report of our 18th session is reflected in the minutes which have been printed and distributed. The minutes give credit where credit is due to the seventy-four Sunday schools and four district conventions who were represented at the convention. The minutes also give credit to the seventy-five schools who had faith in the convention program, by supporting it financially during the year, by mailing 10% of their offerings to our treasurer, Mr. Milton Wiggs, Smithfield, North Carolina.

I wish each of you could have attended our executive board meeting last week, and heard our field secretary, Rev. L. E. Ballard, give his report. You would have been thrilled as we were and would have breathed a prayer of thanksgiving for the faithful schools who support this great program. You would have joined us, as we breathed a prayer for divine guidance for us as we attempt to "Keep on Going." The theme of our convention is 2 Timothy 2:15, "Study to shew thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth." We have not found a single teacher or officer who has come to the point that they do not need more training, therefore this great program must continue, to the glory of God.

In order that you might get a glimpse of the scope of this great work, the following is a brief summary of our field secretary's report:

FIELD CONTACT WORK—162 of the 345 schools in the state have been visited during the past four years, including meetings with officers and teachers, study courses, etc. 11 Area Institutes have been held in the past year. This is a study course for groups of Sunday schools, and they have been held from the coast to the mountains, with about 450 officers and teachers in attendance. Visits and contacts have been made to all new churches, and he has worked in cooperation with the mission boards in the establishment of new schools.

MAIL SERVICE—A monthly news-sheet for our Sunday schools, The Sunday School Reporter, has been written, published and mailed for over four years. Over 115,000 pieces of printed bulletins, teacher helps, and Sunday school reporters have been distributed from the field office since the United Program was established. For the past two years, at least three copies of The Sunday School Reporter have been mailed to each Sunday school in the state, for whom we have a mailing address of the superintendent or other officer or teacher. About 20 personal letters are written each month, answering requests for information and advice.

CRAGMONT YOUTH CONFERENCES—Twelve conferences have been held, beginning with two each summer since 1953, with three during the past two years. 818 young people have attended these 12 conferences. Each one received instruction in the Bible, in Sunday school and Free Will Baptist league work, and the majority were given instruction in personal evangelism, with group and personal counselling as a special part of the program. As an example of the importance of this great work, last summer, in the June and August conferences, 1,975 students were registered, with over 75 applications declined for lack of room. Out of this group, there were 48 decisions for Christ, 118 rededications, and 27 decisions for Christian service. They left in the spirit of Peter, James and John, who left the Mount of Transfiguration to return to their homes in the valley of Christian service. Give them something to do, and send us some more next year. We are trying to follow Proverbs 22:6 "Train up a child in the way he should Our church of tomorrow will need trained leaders as never before. Financially, these conferences are self supporting. The staff give their services, and if there is sufficient money on hand, they are given a small gift of \$10 or \$12. Over 90\% of the fees paid are used for room and board and transportation.

As the call of the Lord came to Samuel, and he answered and kept his covenant with the Lord, your officers and directors of your State Sunday School Convention-Institute are endeavoring to answer the call and need for a training program, so we might have better trained officers and teachers. We approach our duties in the spirit of the Apostle Paul, when he wrote in his epistle to the Philippians (Chapter 3, Verses 13, 14), "Brethren, I count not myself to have apprehended: but this one thing I do, forgetting those things which are behind, and reaching forth unto those things which are before, I press toward the mark for the prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus." We feel the responsibility of our positions, and soli-

cit your cooperation and prayers. Our field secretary is on a half-time basis now, we believe you want him to be on full-time basis that this great work might continue to grow to the glory of God. We urge you to go home and encourage your school to support the State Sunday School Convention with 10% of your offerings.

#### REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE

Report of the special committe appointed by the president to draft resolutions to clarify the position of the North Carolina State Convention with regard to the following:

- 1. That whereas the Cooperative Program of support of the National Association ignores the programs of the individual states and gives reason for participating churches to close their doors to the different denominational enterprises, therefore be it resolved that we ask the churches of North Carolina to support the enterprises of the National Association by sending their contributions to the appointed state treasurers.
- 2. That whereas the executive department of the National Association was originally designed as a service agency and not as a policy making office, therefore be it resolved that we register our opposition to the encroachment of the executive department upon the activities and duties of the various boards of the National Association and that we urge the boards of the association to function in direct responsibility to the association without the necessity of having their work approved or supervised by the executive department.
- 3. That whereas the expansion program of the National Sunday School Board is in conflict with the program and services of the Free Will Baptist Press, therefore, be it resolved that this convention express its confidence in the literature program of the Free Will Baptist Press and that we support the Free Will Baptist Press in discontinuance of its payment of 7½% of gross receipts on Sunday school literature to the National Sunday School Board and that we express opposition to those items of the proposed expansion program of the National Sunday School Board that deals with literature.
- 4. That whereas the policy of the Free Will Baptist Church is based on congregational government, therefore be it resolved that we affirm our position that any merger, union or official affiliation of our denomination with any other denomination must first be referred to the individual churches of our denomnation for ratification.

# CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS North Carolina State Convention Original Free Will Baptists

#### **PREAMBLE**

We, the Original Free Will Baptists of North Carolina, assembled in order to advance, promote and increase the cause of Jesus Christ, do establish and ordain this constitution and these bylaws.

# Constitution

#### ARTICLE I

Section 1: This assembly shall be known as the North Carolina State Convention of Original Free Will Baptists.

Section 2: This convention shall hold an annual session commencing on Wednesday after the second Sunday in September of each year. The place of such meetings to be determined by the convention or the executive committee. Special sessions may be called by the executive committee in the event of the existence of needs of sufficient urgency.

#### ARTICLE II

Section 1: The officers of this convention shall be a president, vicepresident, recording secretary, assistant recording secretary, promotional director and treasurer.

Section 2: The convention shall be composed of the general officers, members of standing boards, committees or commissions and all ordained ministers who belong to churches that are affiliated with the convention; one delegate from each church in good standing; one delegate from each union meeting, conference or association in good standing for every one thousand members or a fraction thereof.

# Bylaws

## ARTICLE I

Section 1: The work of this convention shall be departmentalized, with a board of control over each department. Each board shall be governed by rules set forth by the convention. It shall be the duty of the convention to solicit the cooperation of the conferences and associations in promoting the work of these departments.

Section 2: All members of the convention shall have a right of voice and vote on any issue before the body, providing they have been properly recognized by the presiding officer. They shall serve the convention in any capacity when called upon by the proper authority. Before membership in the convention is established, all ministers and delegates must be properly registered.

# ARTICLE II OFFICERS, BOARDS, COMMITTEES AND THE MANNER OF THEIR ELECTION

Section 1: President: The president shall be elected for a term of two (2) years. He shall not be elected to succeed himself.

Section 2: Vice-President: The vice-president shall be elected for a term of two (2) years.

Section 3: Recording Secretary: The recording secretary shall be elected for a term of two (2) years.

Section 4: Assistant Recording Secretary: The assistant recording secretary shall be elected for a term of two (2) years.

Section 5: Promotional Director: The promotional director shall be elected for a term of one (1) year under such contract as may be agreed upon by himself and the convention or its executive committee. In case of a vacancy in this office between sessions of the convention the executive committee shall fill the vacancy until the next session.

Section 6: Treasurer: The treasurer shall be elected for a term of two (2) years.

Section 7: Children's Home Board: The board of trustees of the Free Will Baptist Children's Home, Middlesex, shall be composed of nine (9) members with the terms of three members expiring each year; the vacancies to be filled by the convention.

Section 8: Board of Superannuation: The board of superannuation shall be composed of five (5) members with the term of one member expiring each year; the vacancy to be filled by the convention.

Section 9: Board of Missions: The board of missions shall be composed of five (5) members with the term of one member expiring each year; the vacancy to be filled by the convention.

Section 10: Board of Christian Education: The board of Christian education shall be composed of five (5) members with the term of one member expiring each year; the vacancy to be filled by the convention.

Section 11: Board of Trustees: The board of trustees shall be composed of three (3) members with the term of one member expiring each year; the vacancy to be filled by the convention.

Section 12: Representatives of Cragmont Assembly Stock: The stock held by this convention in Cragmont Assembly, Inc., shall be represented by three members with the term of one member expiring each year; the vacancy to be filled by the convention.

Section 13: Representatives of Free Will Baptist Press Stock: The stock held by this convention in the Free Will Baptist Press shall be represented by one member elected annually by the convention.

Section 14: Representatives of Church Finance Association Stock: The stock held by this convention in the Church Finance Association, Inc., shall be represented by one member elected annually by the convention.

Section 15: Historical Commission: The historical commission shall be composed of three members with the term of one member expiring each year; the vacancy to be filled by the convention.

Section 16: Executive Committee: The executive committee shall be composed of the president, vice-president, recording secretary, treasurer and three members elected by the convention for a term of two years.

Section 17: Board of Directors of Mount Olive College: The board of directors of Mount Olive College shall be composed of nine (9) members, with the term of office of three (3) members expiring biennially, the vacancies to be filled by the convention.

#### ARTICLE III

#### Duties and Responsibilities

Section 1: President: It shall be the duty of the president to preside over each session, preserve order, govern the body according to establish parliamentary usage and appoint all temporary committees. He shall have power to declare any office of the convention vacant, temporarily, subject to the approval of the convention or the executive committee. He shall have authority to call meetings of the executive committee, when such is needful, and preside over said meetings.

The president shall be ex-officio member of all boards, standing committees and commissions of the convention.

Scction 2: Vice-President: The duties of the vice-president shall be the duties of the president when that officer is not present.

Sction 3: Recording Secretary: The recording secretary shall keep an accurate record of the transactions of the convention and preserve the same, keep all valuable documents and surrender the same to his successors in office.

Section 4: Assistant Recording Secretary: The duties of the assistant recording secretary shall be the duties of the recording secretary when that officer is not present and to assist the recording secretary when called upon.

Section 5: Promotional Director: The promotional director shall maintain an office for the purpose of centralizing the work of the convention. He shall prepare statistical tables necessary to keep the convention informed as to the growth and progress of the denomination. He shall work with the convention, the executive committee, all boards, committees and commissions of the convention in placing the work of the denomination before the various bodies of the state for their information and support; also perform any other promotional duties as directed by the convention or the executive committee.

When designated by a board, committee or commission the promotional director shall receive and (or) pay out any money controlled by said board, committee or commission as directed by them.

The promotional director shall be ex-officio member of all boards, standing committees and commissions of the convention.

Section 6: Treasurer: The treasurer shall hold all money belonging to

the convention. He shall pay all bills ordered by the convention or the executive committee; other bills paid must be approved by the president and recording secretary. He shall give an annual report to the convention; also make reports to the executive committee when called for.

Section 7: Children's Home Board: The children's home board shall be responsible for the management and control of the Free Will Baptist Children's Home at Middlesex. It shall give an annual report to the convention setting forth its progress, needs and achievements.

Section 8: Board of Superannuation: It shall be the purpose of this board to organize and unify all superannuation work throughout this state convention. They shall seek to provide for our aged, retired and infirm ministers in some form of a superannuation program; also seek to offer to our active ministers some program whereby they may help to provide for their future security and retirement.

Section 9: Board of Missions: The board of missions shall regulate and supervise all mission work under the control of this convention. It shall cooperate with the mission program of the national association. It shall endeavor to raise money for missions and build sentiment favorable to missions.

Section 10: Board of Christian Education: The board of Christian education shall keep our people informed as to our educational needs; endeavor to promote the cause of, receive funds for and stimulate interest among our people in the cause of Christian education. It shall be their duty to cooperate with the educational institutions of our denomination and use all funds for the best interest of Christian education as directed by this convention and the donors of funds for education.

Section 11: Board of Trustees: The board of trustees shall hold title to all property belonging to this convention. It shall have power to convey such property when authorized by the convention.

Section 12: Representatives of Cragmont Assembly Stock: The representatives of the stock held by this convention, in Cragmont Assembly, Inc., shall work jointly with representatives of other auxiliaries holding stock in said institution.

Section 13: Representatives of Free Will Baptist Press Stock: The representatives of the stock held by this convention in the Free Will Baptist Press shall meet annually, or as often as called upon, with the stockholders of the press at Ayden, N. C., to transact any business that may come before them.

Section 14: Representatives of Church Finance Association Stock: The representative of the membership stock held by this convention in the Church Finance Association, Inc., shall meet annually, or as often as called upon, with the stockholders of the corporation for the purpose of transacting any business that may come before them.

Section 15: Historical Commission: The historical commission shall make research, compile same and record historical events of the denomina-

tion to date; these documents become the property of the convention and shall be held by the recording secretary.

Section 16: Executive Committee: The work of the executive committee shall be that of the convention when the convention is not in session. It shall call as many sessions as necessary between the annual sessions of the convention to transact business. It shall have the authority to suspend any officer of the convention when such officer proves a failure in duties, non-Christian or detrimental to the cause of Christ and appoint another to fill the vacancy; also fill vacancies by any other cause.

The executive committee shall supervise the work of the promotional department between the annual sessions of the convention as most practicable to our state work and in keeping with the expressed will of the annual session of the convention.

A report of all transactions of this committee shall be made to the convention in annual session.

Section 17: Board of Directors of Mount Olive College: The board of directors of Mount Olive College shall be responsible for the management and operation of Mount Olive College under the certificate of incorporation granted by the state of North Carolina and the directives of this convention. It shall propose any necessary amendments or revisions of said certificate of incorporation, which amendments or revisions shall be approved by this convention before being put into force. It shall make an annual report to the convention, setting forth its progress, needs and achievements. It shall have power to organize at will and to create such bylaws as may be deemed essential for its government and for the control, administration and promotion of the college, consistent with the provisions of its certificate of incorporation and the constitution and regulation of this state convention.

#### AMENDMENTS

This constitution and these bylaws shall not be changed or altered except by a two-thirds vote of members present in a regular session. All amendments shall lie on the table not less than six hours prior to adoption and shall, during that time, be read not less than twice in open convention.
