The forty-sixth annual session of the North Carolina State Convention of Free Will Baptist Churches was held at the Orphanage Memorial Chapel, Middlesex, North Carolina, on September 17 and 18, 1958. The convention was called to order by the secretary.

The Reverend Ronald Creech, pastor of Edgemont Church in Durham, conducted the morning devotional at 10:00 a. m. He used as the basis of his remarks a passage in the Gospel of Luke. In his message he emphasized the importance of going out to win the lost for Christ. Brother Creech concluded his message with a prayer.

Mr. H. M. Mallard extended a welcome to the delegates, ministers and visitors on behalf of the Children's Home.

The Reverend Melvin Everington, pastor of Daniel's Chapel Church near Wilson, responded to the welcome address and expressed appreciation on behalf of the convention for the hospitality extended by the Orphanage Memorial Chapel in entertaining this session of the State Convention.

It was moved and carried that this convention adopt the program as arranged by the Executive Committee with the understanding that the president may make such changes as are necessary to expedite the program of the convention.

The president of the State Convention in the absence of the credentials committee report declared that all ordained ministers and one delegate from each church and members of standing boards be seated at this convention until a report is given by the credentials committee.

The president brought his message at this time. He emphasized the need for facing the problem of radicalism, independentism and modernism which threatens us.

The president welcomed all visitors present at this session.

MINUTES OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

of the

North Carolina State Convention of Free Will Baptists

The Executive Committee of the North Carolina State Convention met in Ayden, N. C., on September 26, 1957. Members present were N. B. Barrow, Herman Hersey, R. B. Crawford, D. W. Alexander, Michael Pelt and Rom Mallard.

The vice-president called the meeting to order. Brother Lloyd Vernon led in prayer.

The minutes of the 1957 session of the North Carolina State Convention were read by the secretary. It was moved and carried that the Executive Committee approve these minutes.

The Rev. D. W. Alexander submitted his resignation as a member of the Executive Committee.

It was moved and carried that his resignation be accepted with regrets and apologies since he has been offended.

It was moved and carried that the executive committee adjourn.

Benediction by Brother D. W. Alexander.

The Executive Committee of the North Carolina State Convention met at Mount Olive Junior College on December 10, at 10:30 a. m. The president called the meeting to order. Brother Herman Hersey led the opening prayer. Members present were N. B. Barrow, Herman Hersey, R. B. Crawford, Michael Pelt, Rom Mallard and Lloyd Vernon.

It was moved and carried that the president and secretary be authorized to purchase such equipment as is needed by the promotional department in the establishment of a promotional office.

Brother James Evans was elected as a member of the Executive Committee to replace Brother D. W. Alexander. Brother Evans was called by telephone and invited to attend this meeting. He was present for the last part of the meeting.

It was moved and carried that the Executive Committee call a special session of the State Convention to study and execute the recommendations that came out of a meeting held at Mount Olive Junior College on November 22. It was moved and carried that this special session be held on January 31, 1958, at Mount Olive Junior College.

It was moved and carried that the president be authorized to select a speaker for the special session of the State Convention. The subject to be used will be "Christian Education and the Bible."

It was moved and carried that the resignation of Brother D. L. Whaley as the State Convention representative of Cragmont stock be accepted. The Rev. W. L. Moretz was elected to succeed Brother D. L. Whaley as the representative of Cragmont stock.

It was moved and carried that the Executive Committee of the State Convention pledge its support to the Free Will Baptist Press and notify the Press Board, the Executive Committee of the National Association and the National Sunday School Board <u>that we desire to work-with-each depart-</u> <u>ment of the National Association. However, if conditions arise that warrant action, we are prepared to set up our own departments.</u>

It was moved and carried that the Executive Committee adjourn.

The Executive Committee of the State Convention met in Ayden, North Carolina, on February 18, 1958. The chairmen of the various boards of the State Convention met with the Executive Committee.

The president of the Press Board explained the purpose of the meeting. The Reverend J. O. Fort explained the developing relationship between the National Sunday School Board and the Press Board. No official action on this matter was taken by the Executive Committee.

The Executive Committee discussed a dispute which had arisen concerning a church within the bounds of the Piedmont Association, which was not a member of that association. It was felt that the dispute could be settled among the brethren involved.

The Executive Committee discussed further the relationship between the Press Board and the National Sunday School Board. It was then agreed that a meeting should be held on February 20 in Ayden, North Carolina, in order to take some definite action on this matter.

It was moved and carried that the committee adjourn.

The Executive Committee of the State Convention met in Ayden, North Carolina, on February 20, 1958. Those present were N. B. Barrow, J. A. Evans, Lloyd Vernon, Rom Mallard, R. B. Crawford, Herman Hersey and Michael Pelt.

It was moved and carried that the minutes of the special session of the North Carolina State Convention, which met at Mount Olive College, Mount Olive, North Carolina, on January 31, 1958, be approved by the Executive Committee.

It was moved and carried that the resignation of Brother D. L. Whaley from the Cragmont Board be accepted and that the clerk notify Brother W. L. Moretz of his election to the Cragmont Board.

The recommendations presented at the meeting of the Executive Committee on February 18, at Ayden, North Carolina, were considered by the Executive Committee.

It was moved and carried that the Executive Committee of the State Convention inform the Executive Committee of the National Association that we feel the Sunday School Board of the National Association is in error in their <u>practice regarding the buying and selling of literature and we request</u> an opportunity to meet with the Executive Committee of the National Association to paint out our contention. We suggest that this meeting be held in Nashville, Tennessee, on one of the following dates: March 18, 19, or 20.

It was moved and carried that the Executive Committee of the State Convention inform the National Executive Committee that unless they take action regarding these grievances, the Executive Committee of the State Convention is prepared to present these grievances on the floor of the 1958 session of the National Association.

It was moved and carried that this Executive Committee reaffirm our position as stated in a motion passed by this committee when the committee met on December 10, 1957, at Mount Olive, North Carolina. This motion was as follows:

"That the Executive Committee of the State Convention pledge its support to the Free Will Baptist Press and notify the Press Board, the Executive Committee of the National Association, and the National Sunday School Board that we desire to work with each department of the National Association. However, if conditions arise that warrant action, we are prepared to set up our own departments."

The preceding action was taken by the Executive Committee in view

of the fact that the National Sunday School Board and the Press Board have not reconciled their differences.

Brother James Evans was directed to obtain a written statement of such information, including copies of the contract between the Free Will Baptist Press and the Sunday School Board of the National Association, as will help the Executive Committee to study the matters under consideration.

The Executive Committee of the North Carolina State Convention met in Ayden, North Carolina, on March 4, 1958. Brothers Charles Thigpen and M. L. Johnson, members of the Executive Committee of the National Association, met with us to discuss the relationship between the Free Will Baptist Press and the Sunday School Board of the National Association. Brother R. B. Crawford led in prayer.

It was moved and carried that the Executive Committee of the State Convention request the chairman of the Executive Committee of the National Association to call a meeting of the Executive Committee of the National Association to meet with the Executive Committee of the State Convention or else that he poll the members of said committee to determine whether or not such a meeting would be feasible at this time and report his findings to the president of the State Executive Committee.

It was moved and carried that this Executive Committee adjourn.

The Executive Committee of the North Carolina State Convention of Free Will Baptists met on Tuesday, May 12, 1958, at Mount Olive, North Carolina. Members present were: N. Bruce Barrow, Herman Hersey, R. B. Crawford, James A. Evans, Lloyd Vernon, Michael Pelt and Mrs. Rom Mallard, proxy for Rom Mallard.

The secretary read the minutes of the last meeting of the Executive Committee. The minutes were approved. By common consent the arrangement of the program of the 1958 session of the State Convention is to be left to a committee. This program committee was then appointed by the president. Serving on the committee are James Evans, Michael Pelt and Herman Hersey. The president will serve as ex-officio member.

It was moved and carried that after the members of the Executive Committee have reviewed the photostatic copy of the deed for church property under the name of Hillsdale Church in Rutherford County, that this deed be turned over to the trustees of the State Convention and that we authorize them to convey a deed on this property upon satisfactory negotiation.

It was moved and carried that the returns from the sale of the church property in Rutherford County be held in trust until such time as a need arises for a Free Will Baptist Church in Rutherford County.

It was moved and carried that the charter of incorporation of the Superannuation Board of the State Convention, which was effected in 1926, be referred to the present Board of Superannuation.

The following instructions are to be given to the board of Superannuation regarding the above charter: 1. That it be determined whether or not the incorporation of the Board of Superannuation has been authorized by the State Convention;

2. That it be determined whether or not this charter is of any value to the Board of Superannuation at present;

3. That the Board of Superannuation report their findings to the Executive Committee of the State Convention.

By common consent the matter of an invitation to the National Association to held its 1959 session in North Carolina was deferred until a later meeting of the Executive Committee at which time more information should be available.

Brother J. O. Fort, editor of the Free Will Baptist Press, gave a verbal report of two joint meetings between the Press Board and the Sunday School Board of the National Association. These meetings resulted in no satisfactory agreement between these two boards. Notes and official minutes of these two meetings were given to the secretary by Brother Fort.

It was moved and carried that it be brought to the attention of the General Board of the National Association at its meeting in St. Louis, Missouri, prior to the meeting of the National Association, that the Executive Committee of the North Carolina State Convention has not received any notice from the Executive Committee of the National Association regarding a possible agreement between the Free Will Baptist Press and the Sunday School Board of the National Association and that therefore we request that the General Board grant this Executive Committee an opportunity to present this matter to them.

It was moved and carried that the Executive Committee adjourn.

The Executive Committee of the State Convention met in Mount Olive on June 17, 1958. The following members were present: N. Bruce Barrow, Herman Hersey, Michael Pelt, Lloyd Vernon, James Evans, R. B. Crawford and Rom Mallard. Visitors present were: R. N. Hinnant, J. W. Alford, Wayne Smith, Rachie Kennedy and Carey Cheshire. Prayer by Brother Cheshire.

There followed a discussion of the relations between the Press Board and the National Sunday School Board concerning the publication of Sunday School literature for Free Will Baptists.

It was moved and carried that the president and secretary of the State Convention prepare a statement to be approved by the Executive Committee and submitted to the General Board of the National Association with reference to the National Sunday School Board's action in the publication and sale of literature contrary to the terms of agreement between the Board of the Free Will Baptist Press and the National Sunday School Board.

Brother Wayne Smith gave some information concerning an invitation to the National Association to hold its 1959 meeting in Asheville, North Carolina.

The committee adjourned for lunch and reassembled at 1:30 p.m. We continued the discussion concerning the invitation to the National Associa-

tion to hold its 1959 meeting in North Carolina.

It was moved and carried that the Executive Committee accept the apology of Brother W. S. Mooneyham regarding his procedure of arranging for an invitation for the National Association to come to North Carolina and that we refer this matter to the State Convention which meets in September, said body to determine whether or not to extend an invitation to the National Association in 1959 or extend an invitation to the National Association to come to North Carolina in 1960.

It was moved and carried that the prepared statement of the president, and secretary be accepted on condition that it be amplified at certain points and typewritten and that copies be prepared for presentation to the General Board of the National Association.

The program committee presented its report on the program of the 1958 session of the State Convention. It was moved and carried that the report be accepted.

It was moved and carried that the treasurer be authorized to give \$25.00 each to the president and secretary to be used in defraying expenses to the National Association in St. Louis, Missouri.

W. B. REPORT OF NORTH CAROLINA STATE LEAGUE CONVENTION

The North Carolina State League Convention of the Original Free Will Baptists met in its thirty-first annual session at the First Free Will Baptist Church, Wilson, North Carolina, May 2, 3, 1958. The theme of the convention was: "Let Go—Let God." The Scripture was Acts 9:6, ". . . Lord, what wilt thou have me to do? . . ."

REPORT OF THE NORTH CAROLINA FREE WILL BAPTIST SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION-INSTITUTE

The nineteenth annual session of the North Carolina State Free Will Baptist Sunday School Convention-Institute convened with Faith Free Will Baptist Church, Morehead City, N. C., on April 24, 1958. The theme for the day was "Today's Vision for Tomorrow." In every devotional thought and report the delegates were challenged to the fact that today's victories will not meet tomorrow's need.

Recent figures show that the population of the world is increasing at the rate of 5,000 every hour or 44 million a year. A number larger than the total population of France is being added every year to the people living on the earth. As Free Will Baptists, we are responsible for our share in the evange-lization of the world. The education of our youth begins in the Sunday school. Thus it is imperative that we continue our expansion program in new buildings, effective teacher and officer's training classes and consistent efforts of visitation.

The purpose of our Sunday School Convention as stated in our constitution is "to encourage and inspire the Sunday schools in (our) denomination to engage in a definite plan of work to labor together in unity, and to coordinate their efforts for a more successful plan of teaching God's word."

The officers and field secretary of your Sunday School Convention stand ready to help you in any way. Call upon us. We value highly your suggestions.

Here is a summary of our present program:

1. General Field Secretary Work: Our field secretary conducted eight area institutes during the year. These area institutes are taking the place of the second day of our convention. The total enrollment at these institutes was 338, which is considerable more than we reach at the convention. Almost 50,000 pieces of literature were prepared, duplicated and distributed during the year. He has worked with several new churches in aiding them in the establishment of their Sunday school.

2. Fellowship Suppers: Several county fellowship suppers are meeting periodically and the officers of the convention assist them when possible.

3. Sunday School Reporter: The Sunday School Reporter is now in its sixth year. This monthly news sheet has been sent to hundreds of pastors and Sunday school workers throughout the state.

4. Cragmont Youth Conference: Since 1953, 16 youth conferences have been sponsored by your Sunday School Convention. This year has been the greatest year in the history of our Cragmont program. There were four youth conferences held with a total enrollment of 288. You will rejoice with us at the report that scores of our youth made decisions during these conferences. Only eternity will show the results in the investment of our Cragmont program. However, we are saddened to realize that 30 young people had to be turned away this year for lack of accomodations. Brethren, this should not be. It is time to rethink the value of our summer camp and is time to turn more energies and monies in its support. We will continue to lose our young people if we do not have facilities for them in camp.

5. Workshops and Clinics: Last August we sponsored a county-wide simultaneous workshop in Pitt County. In five worshops there was a total attendance of 225. Pray as the Executive Committee of the Convention appraises our workshop and training endeavors. We have barely scratched the surface of our potential.

We look to the future with optimism, yet with humility, knowing the need for divine help. Here are a few suggestions we make to help you have a better Sunday school:

It was moved and carried that this report be received as information. A report of the National Association, which met in Saint Louis, Missouri, on July 8-10, was given by Mrs. Carl Dudley. This report is as follows:

REPORT OF THE NATIONAL ASSOCIATION 1958 The National Association of Free Will Baptists held its twenty-second annual session in St. Louis, Missouri, on July 8-10. The theme for the program was "Love." Our hearts were stirred as we listened to the messages in keeping with this theme.

Dr. Oswald J. Smith was an outstanding speaker during the convention. Rev. John Visser, pastor of the Free Will Baptist Church in Amsterdam, Holland, was in attendance.

The music was inspiring and was presented in a very worshipful manner.

Rev. Homer E. Willis gave the report on Home Missions. He said this year was the greatest in this department with more missionaries serving on more fields than at any time in our history. Ten home missionaries were employed this year. Receipts in this department for the year were \$33,318.97. The suggested quota for North Carolina for the current year is \$5,850.

The report on Foreign Missions was given by Rev. Raymond Riggs. We now have four approved missionaries for our new field in Africa. Work is to begin on the first station in the Bondoukou Circle this fall. We have one church in that area. Four stations are hoped for there as soon as possible. There are 200,000 people living there in spiritual darkness.

He reported that we have one church in Brazil.

The growth continues in our work in Cuba in spite of political revolutions. He said that we need more workers in both fields in India. We have four churches in Japan with four missionaries there. Two others are to be added this fall. They are the Herbert Waids. It was reported that we have one worker in Spain.

We have a total of thirty-three missionaries on foreign fields including children. We have 50 churches, 77 preaching points and a total membership in churches of 4,153. Receipts in this department were \$125,379.45. Suggested quota for North Carolina for this year is \$40,000.

Report from the Board of Superannuation was given, showing receipts of \$5,915.43 (under quota). Suggested quota for North Carolina is \$3,556.80.

The League Board reported that it plans to employ a full time promotional secretary. The National League project for this year is the "College Kitchen Campaign" with a goal of \$15,000.

Dr. L. C. Johnson gave the report of the Free Will Baptist Bible College. Total enrollment for the year was 197 with 101 of this number being ministerial students. Suggested quota for North Carolina for this college year is \$18,000.

Report of the Sunday School Board was given by Mr. W. J. Mishler. He reported 17 workers conferences held in 10 states. He further said that this board was shipping material in 23 states. Approximately 40,000 quarterlies were sold for the second quarter from this office. A question arose concerning the financial operation of this board. He stated that they began with an indebtedness of \$4,000 and the present was \$16,000, however, the board had not received payment for the second quarter literature and this amount would retire a considerable amount of the indebtedness when it was received.

There were three constitutional changes made during the business session.

It was moved and carried that this report be received as information.

REPORT OF THE ALLIED CHURCH LEAGUE

The State Convention of North Carolina Free Will Baptists may justly experience a feeling of gratification over its participation in The Allied Church League, an interdenominational temperance organization which labors faithfully and diligently to suppress the sale of alcoholic beverages and to correct other immoral and unchristian practices in the state. The league strives to correct these evils through publicity, education and efforts to secure good government.

Prior to the last session of the state legislature, the league circulated a petition throughout the state and secured the state and secured the signatures of more than 300,000 people for a state-wide referendum on the manufacture and sale of alcoholic beverages in the state. The league then presented the petition to the legislature and employd a lobby at the state capitol to work in the interest of getting a bill through the legislature calling the referendum. Although this project was not successful in securing the referendum, it did make the people of the state aware of the evils of strong drink; it also showed the wets in the state that they had strong opposition among the citizenry. This has served to curb the activities of the wets and inspire stricter adherence to the laws which do exist regarding beverage alcohol.

During the last year, the league was active in supporting the drys in three county ABC elections and two ABC city elections. The drys won in two of the counties and lost in one; the wets won both city elections. The league was active in two counties in beer and wine elections. The drys won one of these elections.

There are 69 dry and 31 wet counties in the state at the present time, with regard to the sale of liquor. Wine is sold in 48 counties and beer in 50 counties.

During the last legislature, the league was actice in hepling to kill a state-wide gambling bill and in defeating bills for ABC elections in four cities in dry counties.

The league administers alcohol education through an annual school on alcohol education; it also co-operates with denominations which sponsor such schools or which sponsor an alcohol education week.

This representative from your convention is honored in the league by being accorded the position of membership on the executive committee and also membership on the committee on good government.

In view of the excellent work which we believe the Allied Church League is doing, we recommend and earnestly urge that the North Carolina State Convention of Free Will Baptists allocate \$200 to the league at this 1958 session.

The secretary of the convention read the minutes of yesterday's session. The president asked for any questions or corrections in the minutes. There being no corrections suggested, the president declared these minutes approved.

REPORT OF THE FREE WILL BAPTIST PRESS

It is with profound thankfulness to God and gratitude toward Free Will Baptists throughout the denomination that we announce to the North Carolina State Convention of Free Will Baptists in its 1958 session that the Free Will Baptist Press has just concluded the greatest year in its entire history of more than fifty years. Because we have seen the hand of Almighty God at work in much power on behalf of the institution, we have been humbled and our faith has been immensely strengthened.

Despite the fact that fires of opposition which had been smoldering for several years broke forth in active competition in the beginning of the fiscal year, the Press has continued to render an ever-expanding service and show a normal increase in financial gain. We give below some figures from the audit of our fiscal year, July 1, 1957—June 30, 1958:

Total income was up \$26,764.91 over last year.

Total net profits were up \$2,635.00 over last year.

Current assets over liabilities were up \$19,957.85 over last year.

Total worth of the institution has climbed to \$230,726.23 (almost onequarter million dollars).

There are 1,173 shares of stock outstanding at \$10 per share, leaving 827 shares of the original issue unsold.

The book value of each outstanding share of stock is \$172.68.

New publications which were added during the year are:

1. Story Hour Free Will Baptist League Quarterly.

2. The Senior Free Will Baptist League Quarterly.

3. The Adult Leaguer.

4. The Free Will Baptist Hymnal.

5. A History of Free Will Baptists, by G. W. Million, has been edited and printed; it is now being folded and made ready for the binders.

A substantial part of our gain in current assets is reflected in enlargement of our book store and placing more books on our shelves to offer for sale to our people. We have classified the books and are building up the total number and variety of books in every field of Christian reading. We hope to be able to offer one or more books of enlightenment and instruction for ministers and other church workers in every phase of church work. We are continually adding to our books of Christian fiction for adults, young people, teen-agers, youth and children, hoping that our churches will let us supply them with a well-rounded selection of sound, fundamental, Christian reading for the enjoyment and edification of all their members. In the field of church supplies, our purpose is to be able to supply all the needs of all the churches. We realize that we cannot stock all the supplies which will be needed, but our slogan is, "If we do not have it, we shall do our best to get it."

We are now in the process of publishing our third series in the cycle of daily vacation Bible school materials which will cover the entire Bible. The title of the 1959 series is, "Lamp of Faith." It will cover that portion of the Bible from the call of Abraham through the death of Joseph. We urge that all our churches hold daily vacation Bible schools next summer, and that they send their workers and teachers to Mount Olive Junior College next spring to the daily vacation Bible school clinic. There, they will become acquainted with the materials and be better prepared to conduct the school.

Although subscriptions to The Free Will Baptist and Youth Banner have shown some small growth during the year, we feel that both these publications can have a much wider ministry right here in North Carolina, as well as in the rest of the nation. We urge that more churches adopt the Every Family Plan, that more church groups enlist in our Church Group Plan and that more of our church leaders become individual solicitors of subscriptions. Write us for details on these plans, and select the one which is most easily adapted to your particular situation.

Our new catalogue will be off the press shortly. If your church does not get one or more through the mail, write us and we shall be glad to send you one.

Finally, we recognize that our field of service is the entire denomination; but we want you in North Carolina to know that we consider you as our home folk, and we are depending upon you to remain loyal to us, to let us help you with your church needs, and to let us serve you while you materially assist us in this ministry of the printed word.

II. Because of the sacredness of divine worship, be it resolved that no board or committee function during the worship service and that all ministers, delegates, and visitors be requested to remain in the building for worship.

It was moved and carried that this resolution be adopted.

III. WHEREAS, the Free Will Baptist Press, Ayden, North Carolina, has furnished Free Will Baptist literature for our denomination for more than half a century; and

WHEREAS, the Free Will Baptist Press is a non-profit institution which invests its earnings in improved service to the denomination; and

WHEREAS, the Free Will Baptist people of North Carolina have individually and through this convention, conferences, union meetings, and local churches sacrificially given to make the Free Will Baptist Press an adequate publishing house for the denomination; there be it

RESOLVED: 1. That the North Carolina State Convention express its disapproval of the action taken by the 1958 session of the National Association in authorizing a competitive program of literature through the National Sunday School Board; and

2. That this convention go on record today as commending the Free Will Baptist Press for its literature program and other service to the denomination; and

3. That this convention requests that the National Association extend the courtesy to the Free Will Baptist Press of allocating to it adequate display at future sessions of the association; and 4. That this convention recommend to the churches of North Carolina that they use the literature and services of the Free Will Baptist Press.

5. That a copy of this resolution be printed in *The Free Will Baptist* and that a copy be filed with the executive secretary of the National Association.

It was moved and carried that this resolution be adopted.

IV. WHEREAS, God is using the Billy Graham evangelistic campaigns to present the gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ to non-Christians and to strengthen Christians; and

WHEREAS, the Billy Graham Evangelistic Team is currently beginning a campaign in Charlotte, North Carolina, therefore be it

RESOLVED, 1. That the 1958 session of the North Carolina Convention of Free Will Baptist Churches go on record as pledging our prayerful and moral support to Mr. Graham in his evangelistic endeavors; and

2. That the secretary of this convention be instructed to send a copy of this resolution to Mr. Graham.

It was moved and carried that this resolution be adopted.

V. WHEREAS, there is a need for great participation in our denominational activity by our laymen; and

WHEREAS, there is also a need for our laymen to be better informed on our denominational policies and functions of our institutions; and

WHEREAS, regular employment prohibits many of our laymen from attending our regular conferences and other daytime meetings; therefore be it

RESOLVED: That the State Convention give its approval to the idea that laymen's organizations may be conducted on conferences, union meetings or other levels for the purpose of better acquainting our laymen with the activities and needs of our institutions and denominational agencies.

It was moved and carried that this resolution be adopted.

VI. WHEREAS, the 1958 session of the National Association of Free Will Baptists officially went on record as declaring the use of tobacco to be sinful and classified the use of tobacco with the drinking of alcoholic beverages; and

WHEREAS, there is no moral distinction between the growth, use, manufacture and sale of tobacco; and

WHEREAS, a major portion of the income of Free Will Baptists in North Carolina is derived from the growth, sale and manufacture of tobacco; therefore be it

RESOLVED: 1. That the North Carolina State Convention respectfully requests that those agencies of the National Association that consider the use of tobacco to be sinful refrain from direct solicitation of funds from our churches whose major source of income is from tobacco; and 2. That this convention express its opinion that the growth, sale, manufacture or use of tobacco is a matter of individual conscience.

The president declared that debate on this question shall be delayed until after lunch.

REPORT OF MOUNT OLIVE JUNIOR COLLEGE to the

North Carolina State Convention of Free Will Baptist Churches September 17, 18, 1958

Greetings:

Mount Olive Junior College is happy to present to this body a report of its activities, growth, and plans for continued and improved service to the Free Will Baptist denomination. I believe that you will find this report to be both encouraging and challenging.

Philosophy

Mount Olive Junior College is dedicated to the task of providing Christian higher education for the Free Will Baptist denomination and the community wherein it is located. The Board of Directors of the college have worked harmoniously with the administration in making Mount Olive Junior College the best institution possible.

The educational policy of the college is to maintain high academic standards and to advance the cause of truth. <u>Free inquiry</u> and the <u>development of</u> <u>precise thinking</u> is encouraged among students and faculty.

The theological position of Mount Olive Junior College is our Faith and Discipline as approved by the North Carolina State Convention of Free Will Baptist Churches. In all matters of Christian doctrine and church polity, the administration and faculty of the college shall perform their duties in harmony with the above statement. We believe that the aims of true education can best be achieved in an institution committed to the person and teachings of Jesus Christ; and in the Spirit of our Lord we deplore those narrow concepts of dogmatism that would enslave men and defeat the true purpose of education.

Mount Olive Junior College seeks to promote among its students the full Christian concept of <u>wholesome_thinking</u>, right personal conduct and just dealings with all mankind. It is the duty of the administration of the college to see that proper programs of worship and Christian study are provided. Furthermore, it is the responsibility of the administration, if after due counseling has failed, to dismiss any student, or recommend to the board for dismissal any faculty member, whose attitude or influence shall be detrimental to the spiritual welfare of the campus.

We believe that every person capable of benefiting from a college education should have that privilege, and to that end Mount Olive Junior College maintains a liberal program of financial aid to worthy and needy students.

At the present, Mount Olive Junior College has two basic curricula: one in liberal arts, which is preparatory for almost any vocation; the other is in business education. We look forward to expanding our offerings as rapidly as is consistent with the purpose of the college, good education, and sound finance. This fall we have established a College Evening Division in which regular members of the faculty offer for full college credit a number of courses included in the day schedule.

It is our purpose to provide educational opportunities for the greatest number of our people. Special courses designed as an educational service to the denomination are being planned, such as short courses for deacons, church clerks, and finance committees. We are working with the State Auxiliary Convention and Sunday School Convention in exploring areas of mutual educational co-operation. We also wish to work with the various boards of the State Convention in promoting their work. Faculty

The heart of any college is its faculty, and I believe that Mount Olive Junior College is fortunate in having a competent and dedicated Christian faculty. They are persons, without exception, in whose Christian commitment and spiritual integrity I have confidence. Their names, qualifications, and assignments are given elsewhere in this report. Library

During the past year Mount Olive Junior College has added 1,000 approved and catalogued volumes to its library, which now contains more than 5,000 volumes. We need to add another 1,000 books during the current year.

Our collection of historical material on the Free Will Baptist denomination is growing, and we hope to build up one of the most comprehensive sources of information on our church anywhere. Persons who have copies of old minutes and back issues of *The Free Will Baptist* are urged to contribute those to this collection. Anything written by or about Free Will Baptists is desired, such as old disciplines, sermons, hymn books, etc.

The J. C. Moye Trust Fund for the library has been increased from \$6,000 to \$7,500 during the past year. The Reverend and Mrs. Moye plan to continue adding to this fund until it reaches a minimum of \$12,500.

Student-Aid Program

Because Mount Olive Junior College believes that no worthy and qualified student should be denied a college education due to the financial limitations that may have been imposed on him through no fault of his own, every effort has been made to establish an adequate program of student aid. During the 1957-1958 school year, the college gave financial assistance in some form to one half of its student body. This help was of three types.

1. Work Scholarships—Whenever possible, work assignments on the campus are given students rather than outside employees. This work consists of jobs which earn from \$100 to \$300 per year through part-time employment in the cafeteria, library, office, bookstore, and general cleaning. Thirty (30) students currently hold such jobs.

2. Student Loan Funds-Nine education loan funds have been estab-

lished at Mount Olive Junior College for the purpose of making loans to students. The loans are secured by legal notes and are interest free until the student has been out of college for one year. As indicated below the college has made notable progress during the past year in establishing new loan funds and enlarging existing ones.

One of the best ways to pay a lasting tribute to a friend or relative is through an investment in people. The resources of the above funds were all put on loans to students last year. In order for the college to meet the demands of its students for the current year, we must establish new loan funds and encourage the benefactors of the above funds to make additional contributions.

3. Scholarships—The college now offers a limited number of scholarships as follows:

a. Scholarships in the amount of \$125 per year are given valedictorians and salutatorians.

b. Pre-ministerial and missionary students are given scholarships equivalent to one-half the cost of tuition, if they meet certain requirements. (Beginning with the fall semester 1959, the Board of Directors has authorized that these scholarships be increased to cover the full amount of tuition.)

c. The <u>Reverend and Mrs. Fred S. Powers of Timmonsville, South</u> <u>Carolina</u>, have begun an annual scholarship in the amount of \$250 to be awarded a student from South Carolina.

d. The <u>Carolina Patriot's Chapter of the Daughters of the American</u> <u>Revolution gives an annual scholarship in the amount of \$50.</u>

c. The Mount Olive Business and Professional Woman's Club also gives an annual scholarship in the amount of \$50.

f. The Sunday School of Deep Run Free Will Baptist Church has pledged a scholarship in the amount of \$100.

We need to give further study to this matter of scholarships and explore every means of establishing as many as possible to the end that Mount Olive Junior College may be able to recruit and assist capable and needy students.

Endowment

The future success and stability of Mount Olive Junior College may well depend upon whether or not substantial endowment funds are secured during the formative years in order that the college may be assured of an adequate income for its operational needs. Our current endowment funds are listed below.

We should encourage Free Will Baptists everywhere to include Mount Olive Junior College in their wills.

Loyalty Fund Campaign

As of August 1, Mount Olive Junior College launched a campaign to raise in gifts \$50,000 by November 5 for operating funds during the current school year. We are calling this drive the Loyalty Fund Campaign because we believe that the responsibility of helping to preserve the faith and heritage of our denomination has fallen upon Mount Olive Junior College. The eyes of Free Will Baptists everywhere are upon us. In directing the course of Mount Olive Junior College, we are determining the destiny of generations too young to choose for themselves. It is our prayer that we shall not betray the heritage of our fathers nor fail the youth of our times.

This campaign is under the direction of the Reverend M. L. Johnson, business manager-treasurer of the college.

Last year Free Will Baptists increased their giving to Mount Olive Junior College by approximately fifty per cent, and for this generosity and expression of confidence, we are profoundly grateful. But if we are to adequately serve our youth, even greater support is needed. At the present only ten per cent of Free Will Baptist college students are in a Free Will Baptist college; the other ninety per cent have gone outside the denomination for their education. The loss of our best youth is a luxury we can no longer afford.

Accreditation

Last November Mount Olive Junior College was approved by the North Carolina College Conference and the State Department of Education. Formal and full state accreditation will be given in November of this year if the college has maintained adequate standards and made satisfactory progress. I believe the college will be successful in its bid for accreditation.

Mount Olive Junior College also looks toward regional accreditation by the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. The Executive Secretary of the Southern Association has already visited the college, and a member of the Standards Committee of the Association is scheduled to be on our campus later this month.

To adequately serve the needs of our youth, Mount Olive Junior College must have full accreditation at the earliest possible date.

Expansion Program

We now have an academic program that is worthy of the best buildings and facilities, and we must plan ahead on our expansion program. In doing so, however, we must not jeopardize our academic standing. Funds that are needed for faculty, library, laboratory, and other basic needs must not be diverted into brick and mortar. Over and above our general operation, we need to secure funds for a more adequate plant; and those funds must soon be found or we shall reach a plateau in our growth that will be beneath the necessary standards for sound educational and economical operation.

The college has purchased fifty acres of land for future buildings; an architect has drawn a master plan; but we have not had the funds to launch a building program. This year the college will pay \$5,000 in rent for the necessary facilities to carry on our program.

The time has come when we must enlarge the place of our tent. We are ready to lengthen the cords if you will strengthen the stakes.

Religious Life

Mount Olive Junior College maintains a well-rounded program of religious activities as a regular part of its academic schedule. Bible is required in every curriculum: chapel attendance is compulsory; dormitory devotions and prayer groups are encouraged.

A full-time Free Will Baptist church program is now maintained in Mount Olive under the joint supervision of the State Mission Board and the college. The Reverend R, P. Harris has been chosen to direct this work. A church will be organized as soon as feasible. Until better arrangements can be made, all activities of the Mission are held on our campus with student, faculty, and community participation.

Enrollment

As of 5:30 p. m. September 16, enrollment at Mount Olive Junior College for the fall semester was as follows:

110 students in the Junior College Division

32 special and adult students

142 Total enrollment

We believe that Mount Olive Junior College has been called into existence by God for the purpose of helping to meet the need for Christian higher education in the Free Will Baptist denomination and eastern North Carolina. We call upon you to give Mount Olive Junior College your prayerful, moral, and financial support. By the grace of God, let us build an institution that is worthy of being called a college and one that will help us to pass on to our children the faith and heritage of our fathers.

Recommendations

1. That this report of Mount Olive Junior College be approved and that the budget be adopted.

2. That, as an act of Christian brotherhood, the North Carolina State Convention officially go on record as offering the educational services of Mount Olive Junior College to Free Will Baptists everywhere.

3. That whereas the need for an adequate endowment represents one of the most crucial needs of Mount Olive Junior College, this convention recommends that beginning with the 1959 session, each church send to the convention with its report a special contribution in the amount of \$5, or more, for an endowment fund at Mount Olive Junior College.

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CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS

North Carolina State Convention Original Free Will Baptists

PREAMBLE

We, the Original Free Will Baptists of North Carolina, assembled in order to advance, promote and increase the cause of Jesus Christ, do establish and ordain this constitution and these bylaws.

Constitution

ARTICLE I

Section 1: This assembly shall be known as the North Carolina State Convention of Original Free Will Baptists.

Section 2: This convention shall hold an annual session commencing on Wednesday after the second Sunday in September of each year. The place of such meetings to be determined by the convention or the excutive committee. Special sessions may be called by the executive committee in the event of the existence of needs of sufficient urgency.

ARTICLE II

Section 1: The officers of this convention shall be a president, vicepresident, recording secretary, assistant recording secretary, promotional director and treasurer.

Section 2: The convention shall be composed of the general officers, members of standing boards, committees or commissions and all ordained ministers who belong to churches that are affiliated with the convention; one delegate from each church in good standing; one delegate from each union meeting, conference or association in good standing for every one thousand members or a fraction thereof.

Bylaws

ARTICLE I

Section 1: The work of this convention shall be departmentalized, with a board of control over each department. Each board shall be governed by rules set forth by the convention. It shall be the duty of the convention to solicit the co-operation of the conferences and associations in promoting the work of these departments.

Section 2: All members of the convention shall have a right of voice and vote on any issue before the body, providing they have been properly recognized by the presiding officer. They shall serve the convention in any capacity when called upon by the proper authority. Before membership in the convention is established, all ministers and delegates must be properly registered.

ARTICLE II

OFFICERS, BOARDS, COMMITTEES AND THE MANNER OF THEIR ELECTION

Section 1: President: The president shall be elected for a term of two (2) years.

Section 2: Vice-President: The vice-president shall be elected for a term of two (2) years.

Section 3: Recording Secretary: The recording secretary shall be elected for a term of two (2) years.

Section 4: Assistant Recording Secretary: The assistant recording secretary shall be elected for a term of two (2) years.

Section 5: Promotional Director: The promotional director shall be elected for a term of one (1) year under such contract as may be agreed upon by himself and the convention or its executive committee. In case of a vacancy in this office between sessions of the convention the executive committee shall fill the vacancy until the next session.

Section 6: Treasurer: The treasurer shall be elected for a term of two (2) years.

Section 7: Children's Home Board: The board of trustees of the Free Will Baptist Children's Home, Middlesex, shall be composed of nine (9) members with the terms of three members expiring each year; the vacancies to be filled by the convention.

Section 8: Board of Superannuation: The board of superannuation shall be composed of five (5) members with the term of one member expiring each year; the vacancy to be filled by the convention.

Section 9: Board of Missions: The board of missions shall be composed of five (5) members with the term of one member expiring each year; the vacancy to be filled by the convention.

Section 10: Board of Christian Education: The board of Christian education shall be composed of five (5) members with the term of one member expiring each year; the vacancy to be filled by the convention.

Section 11: Board of Trustees: The board of trustees shall be composed of three (3) members with the term of one member expiring each year; the vacancy to be filled by the convention.

Section 12: Representatives of Cragmont Assembly Stock: The stock held by this convention in Cragmont Assembly, Inc., shall be represented by three members with the term of one member expiring each year; the vacancy to be filled by the convention.

Section 13: Representatives of Free Will Baptist Press Stock: The stock held by this convention in the Free Will Baptist Press shall be represented by one member elected annually by the convention. Section 14: Representatives of Church Finance Association Stock: The stock held by this convention in the Church Finance Association, Inc., shall be represented by one member elected annually by the convention.

Section 15: *Historical Commission*: The historical commission shall be composed of three members with the term of one member expiring each year; the vacancy to be filled by the convention.

Section 16: Executive Committee: The executive committee shall be composed of the president, vice-president, recording secretary, treasurer and three members elected by the convention for a term of two years.

Section 17: Board of Directors of Mount Olive College: The Board of Directors of Mount Olive College which now consists of nine (9) members shall be increased to eighteen (18) members with three new members to be added to the board every two (2) years beginning in 1958 with the addition of three (3) new members every other year thereafter until the total of eighteen (18) is reached. The term of office of three (3) members of the board shall expire annually; the vacancies to be filled by the convention. It is expressly provided that the North Carolina State Convention may elect to the Board of Directors of Mount Olive College, Free Will Baptists from states other than North Carolina provided that a majority of the members shall be affiliated with the North Carolina State Convention, and provided further that any members from outside North Carolina who may be elected to the Board of Directors shall be in good and regular standing in their respective states.

ARTICLE III

Duties and Responsibilities

Section 1: President: It shall be the duty of the president to preside over each session, preserve order, govern the body according to established parliamentary usage and appoint all temporary committees. He shall have power to declare any office of the convention vacant, temporarily, subject to the approval of the convention or the executive committee. He shall have authority to call meetings of the executive committee, when such is needful, and preside over said meetings.

The president shall be ex-officio member of all boards, standing committees and commissions of the convention.

Section 2: Vice-President: The duties of the vice-president shall be the duties of the president when that officer is not present.

Section 3: Recording Secretary: The recording secretary shall keep an accurate record of the transactions of the convention and preserve the same, keep all valuable documents and surrender the same to his successors in office.

Section 4: Assistant Recording Secretary: The duties of the assistant recording secretary shall be the duties of the recording secretary when that officer is not present and to assist the recording secretary when called upon.

Section 5: Promotional Director: The promotional director shall main-

tain an office for the purpose of centralizing the work of the convention. He shall prepare statistical tables necessary to keep the convention informed as to the growth and progress of the denomination. He shall work with the convention, the executive committee, all boards, committees and commissions of the convention in placing the work of the denomination before the various bodies of the state for their information and support; also perform any other promotional duties as directed by the convention or the executive committee.

When designated by a board, committee or commission the promotional director shall receive and (or) pay out any money controlled by said board, committee or commission as directed by them.

The promotional director shall be ex-officio member of all boards, standing committees and commissions of the convention.

Section 6: Treasurer: The treasurer shall hold all money belonging to the convention. He shall pay all bills ordered by the convention or the executive committee; other bills paid must be approved by the president and recording secretary. He shall give an annual report to the convention; also make reports to the executive committee when called for.

Section 7: Children's Home Board: The Children's Home board shall be responsible for the management and control of the Free Will Baptist Children's Home at Middlesex. It shall give an annual report to the convention setting forth its progress, needs and achievements.

Section 8: Board of Superannuation: It shall be the purpose of this board to organize and unify all superannuation work throughout this state convention. They shall seek to provide for our aged, retired and infirm ministers in some form of a superannuation program; also seek to offer to our active ministers some program whereby they may help to provide for their future security and retirement.

Section 9: Board of Missions: The board of missions shall regulate and supervise all mission work under the control of this convention. It shall co-operate with the mission program of the national association. It shall endeavor to raise money for missions and build sentiment favorable to missions.

Section 10: Board of Christian Education: The board of Christian education shall keep our people informed as to our educational needs; endeavor to promote the cause of, receive funds for and stimulate interest among our people in the cause of Christian education. It shall be their duty to co-operate with the educational institutions of our denomination and use all funds for the best interest of Christian education as directed by this convention and the donors of funds for education.

Section 11: Board of Trustees: The board of trustees shall hold title to all property belonging to this convention. It shall have power to convey such property when authorized by the convention.

Section 12: Representatives of Cragmont Assembly Stock: The representatives of the stock held by this convention, in Cragmont Assembly, Inc., shall work jointly with representatives of other auxiliaries holding stock in said institution.

Section 13: Representatives of Free Will Baptist Press Stock: The representatives of the stock held by this convention in the Free Will Baptist Press shall meet annually, or as often as called upon, with the stockholders of the press at Ayden, N. C., to transact any business that may come before them.

Section 14: Representatives of Church Finance Association Stock: The representative of the membership stock held by this convention in the Church Finance Association, Inc., shall meet annually, or as often as called upon, with the stockholders of the corporation for the purpose of transacting any business that may come before them.

Section 15: Historical Commission: The historical commission shall make research, compile same and record historical events of the denomination to date; these documents become the property of the convention and shall be held by the recording secretary.

Section 16: Executive Committee: The work of the executive committee shall be that of the convention when the convention is not in session. It shall call as many sessions as necessary between the annual sessions of the convention to transact business. It shall have the authority to suspend any officer of the convention when such officer proves a failure in duties, non-Christian or detrimental to the cause of Christ and appoint another to fill the vacancy; also fill vacancies by any other cause.

The executive committee shall supervise the work of the promotional department between the annual sessions of the convention as most practicable to our state work and in keeping with the expressed will of the annual session of the convention.

A report of all transactions of this committee shall be made to the convention in annual session.

Section 17: Board of Directors of Mount Olive College: The board of directors of Mount Olive College shall be responsible for the management and operation of Mount Olive College unto the certificate of incorporation granted by the state of North Carolina and the directives of this convention. It shall propose any necessary amendments or revisions of said certificates of incorporation, which amendments or revisions shall be approved by this convention before being put into force. It shall made an annual report to the convention, setting forth its progress, needs and achievements. It shall have power to organize at will and to create such bylaws as may be deemed essential for its government and for the control, administration and promotion of the college, consistent with the provisions of its certificate of incorporation and the constitution and regulation of this state convention.

AMENDMENTS

This constitution and these bylaws shall not be changed or altered except by a two-thirds vote of members present in a regular session. All amendments shall lie on the table not less than six hours prior to adoption and shall, during that time, be read not less than twice in open convention.
