

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PROCEEDINGS

The North Carolina State Convention held its forty-eighth annual session at Elm Grove Church, Pitt County, on September 14 and 15, 1960. The secretary called the convention to order.

Brother Clarence Bowen led the congregation in singing "Majestic Sweetness Sits Enthroned" and "Higher Ground."

Brother Edward Miles conducted a devotional based upon the reading of Isaiah 6:1 ff. He emphasized the need for a vision of God exalted and calling us into His service. He concluded his message with a prayer for this convention after which Brother Bowen led the singing of "The Church's One Foundation."

The president then introduced Brother Robert May, who welcomed the ministers, delegates, and visitors to this session. Brother M. E. Godwin responded to the welcome on behalf of those attending the convention.

A partial report of the credentials committee was presented by Brother R. N. Hinnant.

By common consent these ministers were given all privileges of members of this body except that of voting.

The president presented his message to the convention in which he called attention to the fact that we are not alone in the struggle for righteousness. He used the example of the prophet, Elijah, as a basis for his remarks.

Patrick led the congregation in prayer after which the speaker of the hour, Dr. W. Burkette Raper, was introduced by the president. Dr. Raper delivered a message based upon Deuteronomy 8, reminding us of the importance of our history in shaping the character of the present and future. His emphasis was that "denominations which forget their past must relive it."

Brother Billy Melvin prayed the benediction.

The evening session was called off by the president due to the small number present.

THURSDAY MORNING

The morning session on Thursday began with the congregation singing "To the Work," conducted by Brother R. H. Jackson. Brother Henry Armstrong of Washington, North Carolina, then read from Paul's letter to the Romans (Chapter 12:1 ff), and prayed for divine leadership during the business and other activities of this day.

Brother Jackson presented Brother Billy Melvin, executive secretary of the National Association, who spoke briefly on the work of the National Association. He then presented Brother Walter Reynolds, chairman-treasurer of the superannuation board, who outlined the responsibilities we have to those who have served us as ministers in the past along with the widows of deceased ministers. An offering for aged ministers was received in the amount of \$96.28.

The promotional secretary of the National League Board, Brother Ray

Turnage, was presented to the convention. In his remarks he urged Free Will Baptists of North Carolina to promote the league in the local church as a means of training future leaders of the church.

MORNING WORSHIP

To begin morning worship, Brother Earl Glenn led the congregation in singing, "There Is a Name I Love to Hear." Then Miss Leah McGlohon of

Mount Olive College sang "Wonderful Peace of My Saviour."

The president introduced the speaker of the hour, Brother Walter Reynolds, pastor of Hull Road Church. The speaker read from the Epistle of James, Chapter 4, and preached on the church of this age. He declared that the church of this generation is seeking to conform to this age. In developing his theme he presented the following outline which characterizes the church of this age: (1) Aimless activity; (2) giving attention to secondary things; (3) not cautious of the dangers ahead.

Brother R. B. Crawford prayed the benediction.

LUNCH

The body reassembled following the lunch hour and began the afternoon session by singing "Glory to His Name."

The secretary read the proposed constitutional change which was presented in the afternoon session on Wednesday. This was the second reading of the proposed change.

The president presented the newly elected moderator of the National Association, Brother Ralph Staten, who made a few comments concerning the forthcoming meeting of the National Association which will be held in Norfolk, Virginia.

It was moved and carried that the executive committee be charged with the responsibility of approving the minutes of this session.

It was moved and carried that we delete from the record the entire resolution presented in the morning session concerning the autonomy of the local church, together with the subsequent motions dealing with this resolution.

The resolutions committee continued its report by presenting a second resolution.

REPORT OF FREE WILL BAPTIST PRESS

C. H. Overman, Editor

We are happy to report again this year, at this the forty-eighth annual session of the North Carolina State Convention of Free Will Baptists, that the Free Will Baptist Press can give a report which shows considerable progress in most every area of service.

Again this year, the press shows the greatest year from the standpoint of gross income. Our gross income this year has been \$249,208.34 as compared with \$223,023.04 last year. This represents an increase of \$26,186.30. There has been an increase in literature sales, merchandise sales and job work.

There has been a net profit of \$9,905.74. The net worth of the institution is now \$232,284.72 as compared to \$222,208.98 last year. The book value of capital stock is \$196.37 per share. Application for purchase of stock may now be made.

The manuscript is now being completed on the old History of Free Will Baptists of North Carolina, by Harrison and Barfield. The manuscript is in the hands of the former editor, the Rev. J. O. Fort.

We are happy to report the offset equipment, camera and dark room equipment is now in operation. Some of the publications which are now being printed on it are: The Free Will Baptist, Youth Banner, Junior and Little Folk's Workbooks, Little Folk's Quarterly and all of the quarterly covers. Color has been added to the fourth quarter, 1960, quarterly covers. Much of the 1960 daily vacation Bible school material was also printed on the offset press. There is much to be learned in this work and we sincerely seek your patience and understanding.

The 1961 series of daily vacation Bible school material is now being written and prepared. May we urge each of you to subscribe to *The Free Will Baptist*. We hope to put on a subscription campaign sometime this fall, and we beseech your help and co-operation to make it a success.

On January 1, 1960, the Press began its Sunday school operation under contract with the Sunday School Board of the National Association of Free Will Baptists. We are happy to report that sales of Sunday school material to a point of slightly above average. We know this is a result of the contract. At a recent meeting of the Sunday School Board, it was decided to open the Sunday school office at the Headquarters Building in Nashville, on January 1, 1960. Other plans of the Sunday school board are indefinite.

As you know by now, the Press is under new management. We regretted to see Mr. Fort leave the institution, but we are thankful for the contribution which he made to the cause of Christ in the publishing of Christian literature. The Rev. N. Bruce Barrow, the new manager, and I, as editor, earnestly request your prayers for the continual success of the institution. Please remember that we are seeking to serve our Lord and the denomination to the best of our ability.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

The Executive Committee of the State Convention met in Mount Olive, North Carolina, on Friday, September 25, 1959.

The president called the meeting to order and Brother Clyde Clearman, an invited visitor in this meeting, led in prayer.

The president called upon Brother Clearman to present a recommendation, which he had asked to present to this committee. After some discussion, it was moved and carried that we express appreciation to Brother Clyde Clearman for bringing his recommendation for harmony to our attention and that we instruct our secretary to prepare copies for the members of the executive committee so that the recommendation may be given thorough and prayerful study, and that we consider this recommendation at our next meeting.

The committee reconvened after lunch and the minutes of the fortyseventh session of the North Carolina State Convention were read and approved. By common consent, it was agreed that 1500 copies of the minutes shall be printed.

It was moved and carried that we authorize the president to locate the place for the convention to meet next year. The meeting was adjourned.

The Executive Committee of the State Convention met in Mount Olive, North Carolina, on Monday, March 21, 1960. The president called the meeting to order. Brother E. E. Edwards led the opening prayer.

The resignation of Brother James Evans as vice-president of the State Convention was submitted to the executive committee. His resignation was accepted and Brother R. H. Jackson was elected to succeed him.

The minutes of the last meeting on September 25, 1959, were read and approved.

The president appointed the program committee for the next session of the State Convention as follows: E. E. Edwards, R. H. Jackson and Michael Pelt. The president will serve as ex-officio member. Davis Church was confirmed as the place of meeting by the executive committee.

Brothers E. E. Edwards and Herman Hersey were asked to serve as a committee to prepare a statement regarding the issue between the Eastern and Cape Fear Conferences involving the Evangelical Baptist Church of Kinston, North Carolina. This statement is to be submitted to the secretary. It is as follows: We recommend that the Executive Committee of the Cape Fear Conference be requested to write a letter to the Executive Committee of the Eastern Conference stating the present status of the Evangelical Church of Kinston as it relates to the Cape Fear Conference.

E. E. Edwards Herman Hersey

It was moved and carried that the committee retain and give further study to the recommendation for harmony presented by Brother Clyde Clearman at the meeting on September 25, 1959.

By mutual consent of the committee Brothers E. E. Edwards and Herman Hersey were asked to discuss the matter of conference boundary lines as it relates to the action of the Cape Fear Conference in its 1959 session and report in writing to this committee. This report is as follows: After discussion of the matter of conference boundary lines as it relates to the action of the Cape Fear Conference in its 1959 session, we are unable to agree.

E. E. Edwards Herman Hersey It was moved and carried that \$100 be allocated from the State Convention treasury to Cragmont Assembly, Inc.

It was moved and carried that the State Convention treasury allocate \$500 to the State Convention Loan Fund of Mount Olive Junior College, in keeping with the motion passed at the last session of the State Convention on Thursday, September 17, 1959.

A resolution was adopted pledging confidence in and support for Mount Olive College and endorsing plans for observing April 24 as "Challenge Day," recommending it to our people as an opportunity to demonstrate their support for this college and their interest in our youth and in the future of our denomination.

It was moved and carried that the executive committee authorize the president to write a letter to the administration of the Free Will Baptist Bible College commending them for their proposal to offer additional curricula and to seek approval by the state of Tennessee for such work.

It was moved and carried that the committee adjourn.

The executive committee met at Elm Grove Church on May 12, 1960. The meeting was called at the request of the administration of Mount Olive College, to hear charges directed against the college and its administration.

After the meeting had begun, the president called for any charges to be presented. Formal statements were read by the following brethren: Ronald Creech, Jerry Ballard and Carroll Alexander.

After all these statements were read in the presence of the executive committee and the Board of Directors of Mount Olive College, who were inviting to hear the charges and the evidence presented, Mr. Raper was given an opportunity to reply to the statements presented. Mr. Raper replied orally to the specific charges directed against the college, taking them one by one.

At the conclusion of the hearing it was moved and carried that the executive committee adjourn and go into executive session to consider the charges presented and report their findings.

The executive committee met on May 17, at Mount Olive Junior College for the purpose of studying the observations and grievances which were presented against the college at the meeting on May 12. The Board of Directors were represented at this meeting by chairman David Hansley. Again, the formal statements of the three brethren were read and discussed in detail. Careful attention was given to each statement and opinions of members of the committee were freely expressed. It was finally agreed that the president and the assistant secretary should draft a statement to be submitted to members of the committee for their approval or rejection. The meeting was adjourned.

The statement was subsequently prepared and submitted to each member of the committee. It reads as follows:

"An official executive committee of the North Carolina State Convention of Free Will Baptists was held at Elm Grove Church, May 12, 1960, for the purpose of hearing charges against Mount Olive Junior College; Mount Olive, North Carolina.

"On May 17, 1960, the executive committee met in official session at Mount Olive Junior College for the purpose of studying the observation and grievances which were presented against said college at the above mentioned meeting.

"After carefully and prayerfully considering the matters against the college, and after a period of questioning the administration and chairman of the board, we, the executive committee, wish to make public the following report:

"In view of our study of the attacks against Mount Olive Junior College, a college owned and operated by the North Carolina State Convention of Free Will Baptists, we, as the executive committee, wish to reaffirm our faith in our college. We further wish to inform our people that we find the observation and grievances to represent personal views rather than denominational conflict as it relates to our policies, procedures and theology.

We urge our people to continue to support the college, with the assurance that it is filling a vital place within our denomination, and that your support is going to a college which is sound in principle and practice."

This statement was approved by the following committee members: N. Bruce Barrow, R. H. Jackson, C. H. Overman, Rom Mallard, E. E. Edwards and Walter Carter. Herman Hersey voted to reject it. The secretary disqualified himself because of his affiliation with the college.

III. GEORGE P. BEST MEMORIAL FUND

The amount of this fund is \$6,469.55 and is invested with an annual interest income.

IV. RESERVE FUND

REPORT OF CHURCH FINANCE ASSOCIATION, INC.

to the

NORTH CAROLINA STATE CONVENTION OF FREE WILL BAPTISTS — September 14, 1960

The Church Finance Association, Inc. was founded in April, 1940. The initial action toward establishing this enterprise was taken by the Executive Committee of the State Convention, to help save one of our churches which was about to be sold under a mortgage foreclosure. After the Certificate of Incorporation of the Church Finance Association, Inc. had been completed and the association was established and operating, the State Convention, in its annual session in September of 1940, endorsed the association and recognized it as the agency for helping in church extension within the state. The following quotations taken from the Certificate of Incorporation set forth the objects and purpose of the association.

OBJECTS AND PURPOSE

- "3. The objects for which said association is formed are as follows:
 - "a. To finance or assist in financing church buildings and other denominational property with the express stipulation that this section and the matters hereinafter set out apply only to the denominational property of the Original Free Will Baptists of North Carolina.
 - "b. To serve in the capacity of surety and to guarantee the payment of loans made to such Free Will Baptist organizations, for the purpose of financing denominational property, and in effect to underwrite such payments.
 - "c. To finance or assist in financing the purchase or repair of equipment, furniture, or other personal property that may be necessary to the furtherance of the work and purpose of any such Free Will Baptist institution as above stated.
 - "d. To extend the denominational work in home missions and church building in communities where such institutions are now located or where the location of the same would be expedient or useful.
- "5. It is the purpose of the association to further the religious education of the public by lending its support to the strengthening of Free Will Baptist institutions and the creation of new institutions where the same may be feasible."

The extent to which the association has fulfilled the objects and purpose can be seen from the following report of loans made during the past twenty years:

REPORT OF CHRISTIAN ACTION LEAGUE

First of all, let us say that we are sorry that we cannot give a complete report at this convention. This is due to the fact that the representative of Christian Action League was unable to be here and make this report.

The Christian Action League is an interdenominational Protestant temperance organization in the state of North Carolina. It is composed of trustees elected by the several participating Protestant denominations in North Carolina. The trustees of the league meet annually to transact business, hear reports of work which has been done, and lay plans for promotion of temperance within the state during the next year.

During this past year the Constitution and Bylaws have been corrected. In Article II of the Constitution, the purpose is stated. We quote:

Section 1: In general, it shall provide a medium through which (1) individuals, who believe that as Christians they are their brother's keeper, (2) churches and the organizations, and (3) social agencies may unitedly cooperate in a scientific, moral and religious effort to find solutions to the problems involved in and arising from (a) the manufacture, use and sale of alcoholic beverages and other narcotics, (b) gambling, (c) the use and sale of obscene writings, (d) the conditions which produce juvenile delinquency, and (e) other related matters which adversely affect the morality of our society.

Section 2: In particular the league shall seek:

- A. To unite all who believe in total abstinence in a co-operative effort against beverage alcohol in its every form;
- B. To work for good government by seeking the election of men of highest character to public office and encouraging the making of laws that will further civic and social righteousness;
- C. To enlighten the public and educate youth concerning the dangers of beverage alcohol and narcotics and other social evils; including juvenile delinquency, gambling, the traffic in obscene reading matter, etc.;
- D. To promote programs for the rehabilitation of the victims of alcoholic beverages and other narcotics; such programs to be in keeping with the other purposes stated above.

REPORT OF THE HISTORICAL COMMISSION

- 1. The Historical Commission urges each local church elect a local church historian and seek to preserve its own history.
- 2. During the year we have located the graves of Elder Joseph Parker and his wife. We are indebted to Mr. Charles R. Holloman, attorney at law, 2307 Euston Street, Raleigh, North Carolina, for his help in locating the graves. We quote from his letter of August 8, 1960, to Brother Hubert Burress.

"Brother Parker founded Wheat Swamp Church in the 1780's. It is there that he and his wife lived out their remaining years: and a scant half mile cast of there in the Cemetery on the old Micajah ('Cojah) Barfield Place (now the property of the Pully family) the old gentleman and his wife were laid to rest under grave markers of either heart of pine or cypress (I think Cypress). Several years ago, in collecting rural tombstone records, I found that by daubing on a little flour, which I carried in a bag for the purpose, and brushing gently across the grain I could decipher their names and part of the dates. I did not know who they were and, of course, was unaware that this was the final resting place of a saint and the father of the Free Will Baptist denomination. A huge sycamore rises near their heads."

The graves are located on the north side of the highway.

The commission recommends that the State Convention authorize the placing of suitable markers for the graves of Elder Parker and his wife.

REPORT OF NORTH CAROLINA FREE WILL BAPTIST LEAGUE STATE CONVENTION

The convention was believed to be one of the most successful ever. The Reverend J. Wilbert Everton, superintendent of Free Will Baptist Children's Home; Dr. LaVerne D. Resolved that we urge the several conferences and associations to take appropriate steps to deal with any minister within their bounds whose doctrines, policies and practices are found to be in conflict with those of Original Free Will Baptists; and be it further

REPORT OF MOUNT OLIVE JUNIOR COLLEGE TO THE NORTH CAROLINA STATE CONVENTION OF FREE WILL BAPTISTS — SEPTEMBER 14, 15, 1960

ELM GROVE CHURCH, AYDEN, NORTH CAROLINA

Greetings:

Mount Olive College is grateful for this opportunity to discuss its program, share the story of its progress, and reveal its aspirations to the Free Will Baptists of North Carolina. Our hopes for our children and the character of our denomination are in large measure dependent upon the ministry of Mount Olive College.

Even in my lifetime there have been serious divisions among Free Will Baptists as to whether or not we, as a denomination, should enter the field of higher education, but this question fades away as the words of Professor Alfred North Whitehead of Harvard University sound in our ears:

"In the conditions of modern life the rule is absolute: The race which does not value trained intelligence is doomed. Not all your heroism, not all your social charm, not all your wit, not all your victories on land or at sea, can move back the finger of fate. Today we maintain ourselves. Tomorrow science will have moved forward yet one more step, and there will be no appeal from the judgment which will then be pronounced on the uneducated."

What Professor Whitehead has said about a race is equally true of a denomination, and this truth is recognized by Free Will Baptists today. I do not know any Free Will Baptist parents who are opposed to their children going to college. On the contrary, many parents who never finished high school are willing to make whatever sacrifice is necessary to afford their children the opportunity of a college education. These parents realize that higher education is no longer a luxury but vital necessity.

But we can no longer assume that just because our children want to go to college and we have, or can borrow, the money to send them, that our problem is solved. Colleges do not exist by chance and accident. Colleges exist because people want them and are willing to support them. Every parent must seriously ask himself this question: "When my child is ready for college, will a college be ready for him?" Our generous support of Mount Olive College can give us a reassuring answer.

During the past twenty years the college population in the United States has doubled; during the next ten years it is expected to double again. Already most colleges are raising their standards for admission and many are turning away more students than they can accept. My child, and your child, could be among those denied admission to a Christian college unless we begin now to make adequate provisions for them. For more than two hundred years we Free Will Baptists have shifted the financial responsibility of the education of our children upon other denominations.

In church-sponsored colleges, tuition and fees pay only one half of what it costs a college to maintain a student; for every dollar received from students, the college must add a dollar of its own. Where does the college get this money? It must depend upon its sponsoring churches, alumni and friends. Higher education is expensive, but there is one thing that is more expensive—and that is to have no colleges. A denomination without colleges in the twentieth century is as crippled as an individual without an education.

OPPORTUNITY AT MOUNT OLIVE COLLEGE

At Mount Olive College Free Will Baptists have a unique opportunity to provide Christian education of high quality for our sons and daughters. This college has demonstrated its ability to grow and serve. From twelve students in 1952-1953, our first year of operation, our student body totaled 175 students during 1959-1960. Gifts to Mount Olive College the first year amounted to \$3,712; an all-time high of \$72,768.16 was received in gifts for the year ended June 30. From \$6.17 in the college treasury in 1953 when this convention voted to buy property and locate the college in Mount Olive, the total assets of the college, as listed by our auditor in his most recent report, have reached \$228,681. From an institution that some feared would disgrace the denomination, Mount Olive College today enjoys the highest academic recognition ever accorded a college sponsored by Free Will Baptists. Since Mount Olive College was chartered in 1951, Free Wll Baptists have given \$270,735; friends have given \$103,046, for a total of \$373,781 in gifts. In these nine years we have spent \$728,114.

And yet I believe that the future is even more challenging than the

past. We have only won a beachhead on the continent of education, and unlimited possibilities lie ahead. It is still true that nine out of ten Free Will Baptist students who go to college go outside our denomination for their education. The future of Free Will Baptists is no greater than the loyalty our youth have toward our denomination. I firmly believe that if our denomination will be loyal to our sons and daughters today, they will be loyal to us tomorrow. If we fail them today, we have no claim upon their allegiance tomorrow.

THE CHARACTER OF MOUNT OLIVE COLLEGE

From the beginning, Mount Olive College has majored on three principles:

- 1. Christian integrity;
- 2. Academic excellence; and
- 3. Service to the Free Will Baptist denomination.

A college is a mirror of the people who sponsor it; but it is more than a mirror. It is a dynamic force which helps its constituency to grow in the likeness of an ideal image. Original Free Will Baptists are not a sect nor a cult, and neither do we want to be a sect or a cult and find outside the main stream of the Christian tradition and divorced from other Christians. Likewise, Mount Olive College is neither a sectarian nor cultic institution. If it were to become such a college, it could not meet the needs of our people. A sectarian college can serve only a sect; a cultic college can serve only a cult.

Original Free Will Baptists are a denomination—a branch of the main body of Christians. Mount Olive College is a denominational college which serves Free Will Baptists and others who desire to obtain an education under Christian auspices and Christian personnel. We seek to avoid the bigotry that characterizes sects and cults in order that our Christian witness may be more effective.

As a denominational college, we are loyal to the faith and heritage of Original Free Will Baptists. We believe and teach those truths upon which our denomination rests, among which are: The Bible as the inspired Word of God; the divine act of God in the creation of human life; the divinity of Jesus, including His virgin birth, redemption of man through His crucifixion; His miraculous ministry and bodily resurrection, and His second coming; justification by faith; the freedom of the human will; congregational church government; believers baptism by immersion; the priesthood of all believers; the recognition of Christian of other denominations as evidenced by the practice of open communion at the Lord's Supper; and all other articles of faith set forth in the Statement of Faith and Discipline for Original Free Will Baptists.

Mount Olive College recognizes that these and other truths cannot be forced upon anyone; but we believe that these truths find most effective acceptance when humbly and intelligently studied and presented. With the late E. F. Tittle we recognize that "The real skeptic is the man who has so little faith in his own position that he is afraid to have it critically examined,

who has so little confidence in truth that he fears to have more of it discovered, who is tormented by the fear that if he knew more he might believe less."

Christian doctrine cannot be preserved by keeping people in ignorance or denying them the right to think for themselves. The mission of Mount Olive College is to help students to recognize the superiority of Christian truth by encouraging free inquiry in all departments of study. I am today a Free Will Baptists not because I have accepted the faith and beliefs of someone else, but because I have read and studied everything I wished to, and have found the theology and polity of Original Free Will Baptists the best answer to deep personal convictions. The only alternative to this philosophy of education would be a sectarian or cultic institution, and that Mount Olive College is determined not to become. I believe that our loyalty to the Free Will Baptist faith can be measured by our support of Mount Olive College. A LOOK AHEAD

During some of their darkest days, Isaiah told his people: "And wisdom and knowledge shall be the stability of thy times" (Isaiah 33:6). These words are no less true today. In a generation when Free Will Baptists stand at one of the crucial crossroads of our history, God has given us a college that is helping to preserve our heritage and at the same time it is directing the faces of our youth to the future. Through more than two centuries we have paid the price of not having the stabilizing influence of a denominational educational program. We have been driven, tossed and exploited by foreign doctrines and the crafty maneuvers of zealous groups.

But now God is offering to us wisdom and knowledge that will give us stability. Again the words of Isaiah are ringing clear: "Enlarge the place of thy tent, and let them stretch forth the curtains of thine habitations: spare not, lengthen thy cords, and strengthen thy stakes" (Isaiah 54:2).

Mount Olive College needs to enlarge, and is ready to enlarge. Our Board of Directors has announced a goal of \$500,000 during the next five years for the development of our new fifty-acre campus, our long-range goal is a campus adequate for at least 500 students, 300 of whom will be resident. Such a campus would now cost approximately \$2,000,000, but this aspiration is not beyond our reach if we really want the best for our youth.

Many parents as well as our own students have frequently asked: "When will Mount Olive College be a four-year institution?" We will become a four-year college when we can educationally and economically afford to do so. In my opinion, we should not attempt four years until we can meet the following conditions:

- 1. Have an enrollment of at least 350 students; five hundred would be better;
- 2. Have an annual income through gifts and endowment for operating purposes of at least \$150,000;
- 3. Have a regionally accredited two-year college and be prepared to meet the standards for a four-year institution within a very reasonable period.

These conditions will be met, but neither quickly nor easily. However, Mount Olive College is moving ahead.

October 2-5 has been set for the visiting team from the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools to examine Mount Olive College. Without question, this examination will be the most thorough we have yet experienced. We have worked hard to achieve academic and spiritual excellence at Mount Olive College and I believe that the findings of the committee will be favorable. But if the Southern Association finds us unacceptable at this time, we still have gained much because of the high standards we have aspired to reach. If we are awarded regional accreditation, we will be the first college in the history of the Free Will Baptist denomination to obtain this distinction. The value and significance of such achievement would be beyond measure.

Recommendations:

- 1. That the attached budget for the 1960-1961 fiscal year, which has been unanimously adopted by the Board of Directors, be approved;
- 2. That this convention give the back cover of its minutes for a message from Mount Olive College;
- 3. That this convention officially express its approval of the progress Mount Olive College is making toward achieving regional accreditation by the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools;
- 4. That this convention recommend to the Free Will Baptist churches of North Carolina that they observe a Sunday not later than October 23 to be known as "Loyalty Fund Day for Mount Olive College."

Invitation

The Board of Directors and the administration of Mount Olive College unanimously extend to this convention an invitation to hold its 1961 session on our campus in commemoration of the tenth anniversary of the chartering of Mount Olive College.

A Personal Word

God has been good to me, and so have Free Will Baptists. I am now in my seventh year as president of Mount Olive College. I did not seek this position, but I consider it the most honorable office my denomination has to offer. These years have been the most strenuous and the most rewarding of my life. They have left their scars externally and internally, physically and otherwise. But God has converted every pain and hardship into a blessing. "O the depth of the riches both of the wisdom and knowledge of God! how unsearchable are his judgments, and his ways past finding out!" (Romans 11:33).

I am at Mount Olive College because I believe that this is where God and my people want me. I have but one ambition, and that is to let God use my life in the most effective manner possible. I have no reason to believe that the road ahead will be any easier than the one behind. I have made many mistakes, and I will make many more, but I have had the

patience and support of a co-operative faculty and Board of Directors. We have not always agreed, but their love and loyalty have been an unfailing light in the darkest night. When the road was most difficult, there have been the faces of students upon whom one could not turn his back and the loyalty of friends far and near whose faith in me would not let me go.

I have no earth-shaking promises to make for the future. My friends love me with all my vices, and all my virtues will not commend me to my enemies. I only ask for the grace to pray with St. Ignatius Layola a prayer I found in the office of a former student of the Ayden Seminary:

"Teach me, Good Lord,

To give, and not to count the cost; To fight, and not to heed the wounds;

To toil, and not to seek for rest;

To labor, and not to ask for any reward save that of knowing that I do Thy will."

REPORT OF THE NORTH CAROLINA MISSIONS BOARD	

Greetings:

The missions board wishes to thank each church and each individual for your prayers and your support.

During the past year, the missions board has met 6 times and considered all the matters that have come before us.

The mission conferences held in the Albemarle and Central Conference areas were quite successful. In the Alebmarle, \$727.45 in cash and \$2,649 in pledges was reported. In the Centeral area, there were 28 churches having one or more services. A total of 60 services were conducted with approximately 4,000 attending. There was around \$2,000 in offerings given and \$2,000 in pledges given. Most of the churches indicated that they would like to take part in a mission conference in the fall of 1960. The speakers for the mission conferences were as follows: Wingate Hansley, J. C. H. Carter, Kenneth Elskit, Laura Belle Barnard, Bill Fulcher, Mack Owens, Louis Molton, Pool, Mrs. Timyon, Homer Willis, Tommy Willey and Eugene Waddell.

The state missions board has given aid to the following places this year: Fayetteville and Wilmington. Two youth mission conferences have been sponsored at Cragmont.

One half of the undesignated mission funds were sent to the National Home Mission Board for the Alaskan Mission.

The board suggests the following recommendations:

- 1. That the conferences plan and conduct area-wide missions conferences during the convention year 1960-61. The missions board will be glad to help secure the speakers.
- 2. That the mission quotas suggested by the National Association of Free Will Baptists be raised by the churches of North Carolina. The quotas are as follows:

Foreign Missions \$50,000.00 National Home Missions \$16,000.00

3. That the North Carolina churches raise one dollar per capita to be used in the state home missions program.

- 4. That the churches help the candidates for both the home mission and foreign missions boards raise their stipulated amount for passage and support.
- 5. That the undesignated mission funds be divided equally between the Alaskan Mission and the state program in 1960-61.

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CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS North Carolina State Convention Original Free Will Baptists

PREAMBLE

We, the Original Free Will Baptists of North Carolina, assembled in order to advance, promote and increase the cause of Jesus Christ, do establish and ordain this constitution and these bylaws.

CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I

Section 1: This assembly shall be known as the North Carolina State Convention of Original Free Will Baptists.

Section 2: This convention shall hold an annual session commencing on Wednesday after the second Sunday in September of each year. The place of such meetings to be determined by the convention or the executive committee. Special sessions may be called by the executive committee in the event of the existence of needs of sufficient urgency.

ARTICLE II

Section 1: The officers of this convention shall be a president, vicepresident, recording secretary, assistant recording secretary, promotional director and treasurer.

Section 2: The convention shall be composed of the general officers, members of standing boards, committees or commissions and all ordained ministers who belong to churches that are affiliated with the convention; one delegate from each church in good standing for every two hundred members or a fraction thereof; one delegate from each union meeting, conference or association in good standing for every one thousand members or a fraction thereof.

BYLAWS

ARTICLE I

Section 1: The work of this convention shall be departmentalized, with a board of control over each department. Each board shall be governed by rules set forth by the convention. It shall be the duty of the convention to solicit the co-operation of the conferences and associations in promoting the work of these departments.

Section 2: All members of the convention shall have a right of voice and vote on any issue before the body, providing they have been properly recognized by the presiding officer. They shall serve the convention in any capacity when called upon by the proper authority. Before membership in the convention is established, all ministers and delegates must be properly registered.

ARTICLE II

OFFICERS, BOARDS, COMMITTEES AND THE MANNER OF THEIR ELECTION

Section 1: President: The president shall be elected for a term of two (2) years.

Section 2: Vice-President: The vice-president shall be elected for a term of two (2) years.

Section 3: Recording Secretary: The recording secretary shall be elected for a term of two (2) years.

Section 4: Assistant Recording Secretary: The assistant recording secretary shall be elected for a term of two (2) years.

Section 5: Promotional Director: The promotional director shall be elected for a term of one (1) year under such contract as may be agreed upon by himself and the convention or its executive committee. In case of a vacancy in this office between sessions of the convention the executive committee shall fill the vacancy until the next session.

Section 6: Treasurer: The treasurer shall be elected for a term of two (2) years.

Section 7: Children's Home Board: The board of trustees of the Free Will Baptist Children's Home, Middlesex, shall be composed of nine (9) members with the terms of three members expiring each year; the vacancies to be filled by the convention.

Section 8: Board of Superannuation: The board of superannuation shall be composed of five (5) members with the term of one member expiring each year; the vacancy to be filled by the convention.

Section 9: Board of Missions: The board of missions shall be composed of five (5) members with the term of one member expiring each year; the vacancy to be filled by the convention.

Section 10: Board of Christian Education: The board of Christian education shall be composed of five (5) members with the term of one member expiring each year; the vacancy to be filled by the convention.

Section 11: Board of Trustees: The board of trustees shall be composed of three (3) members with the term of one member expiring each year; the vacancy to be filled by the convention.

Section 12: Representatives of Cragmont Assembly Stock: The stock held by this convention in Cragmont Assembly, Inc., shall be represented by three members with the term of one member expiring each year; the vacancy to be filled by the convention.

Section 13: Representatives of Free Will Baptist Press Stock: The stock help by this convention in the Free Will Baptist Press shall be represented by one member elected annually by the convention.

Section 14: Representatives of Church Finance Association Stock: The stock held by this convention in the Church Finance Association, Inc., shall be represented by one member elected annually by the convention.

Section 15: Historical Commission: The historical commission shall be composed of three members with the term of one member expiring each year; the vacancy to be filled by the convention.

Section 16: Executive Committee: The executive committee shall be composed of the president, vice-president, recording secretary, treasurer and three members elected by the convention for a term of two years.

Section 17: Board of Directors of Mount Olive College: The Board of Directors of Mount Olive College which now consists of nine (9) members shall be increased to eighteen (18) members with three new members to be added to the board every two (2) years beginning in 1958 with the addition of three (3) new members every other year thereafter until the total of eighteen (18) is reached. The term of office of three (3) members of the board shall expire annually; the vacancies to be filled by the convention. It is expressly provided that the North Carolina State Convention may elect to the Board of Directors of Mount Olive College, Free Will Baptists from states other than North Carolina provided that a majority of the members shall be affiliated with the North Carolina State Convention, and provided further that any members from outside North Carolina who may be elected to the Board of Directors shall be in good and regular standing in their respective states.

ARTICLE III

Duties and Responsibilities

Section 1: President: It shall be the duty of the president to preside over each session, preserve order, govern the body according to established parliamentary usage and appoint all temporary committees. He shall have power to declare any office of the convention vacant, temporarily, subject to the approval of the convention or the executive committee. He shall have authority to call meetings of the executive committee, when such is needful, and preside over said meetings.

The president shall be ex-officio member of all boards, standing committees and commissions of the convention.

Section 2: Vice-President: The duties of the vice-president shall be the duties of the president when that officer is not present.

Section 3: Recording Secretary: The recording secretary shall keep an accurate record of the transactions of the convention and preserve the same, keep all valuable documents and surrender the same to his successors in office.

Section 4: Assistant Recording Secretary: The duties of the assistant recording secretary shall be the duties of the recording secretary when that officer is not present and to assist the recording secretary when called upon.

Section 5: Promotional Director: The promotional director shall maintain an office for the purpose of centralizing the work of the convention. He shall prepare statistical tables necessary to keep the convention informed as to the growth and progress of the denomination. He shall work with the convention, the executive committee, all boards, committees and commissions of the convention in placing the work of the denomination before the various

bodies of the state for their information and support; also perform any other promotional duties as directed by the convention or the executive committee.

When designated by a board, committee or commission the promotional director shall receive and (or) pay out any money controlled by said board, committee or commission as directed by them.

The promotional director shall be ex-officio member of all boards, standing committees and commissions of the convention.

Section 6: Treasurer: The treasurer shall hold all money belonging to the convention. He shall pay all bills ordered by the convention or the executive committee; other bills paid must be approved by the president and recording secretary. He shall give an annual report to the convention; also make reports to the executive committee when called for.

Section 7: Children's Home Board: The Children's Home board shall be responsible for the management and control of the Free Will Baptist Children's Home at Middlesex. It shall give an annual report to the convention setting forth its progress, needs and achievements.

Section 8: Board of Superannuation: It shall be the purpose of this board to organize and unify all superannuation work throughout this state convention. They shall seek to provide for our aged, retired and infirm ministers in some form of a superannuation program; also seek to offer to our active ministers some program whereby they may help to provide for their future security and retirement.

Section 9: Board of Missions: The board of missions shall regulate and supervise all mission work under the control of this convention. It shall cooperate with the mission program of the national association. It shall endeavor to raise money for missions and build sentiment favorable to missions.

Section 10: Board of Christian Education: The board of Christian education shall keep our people informed as to our educational needs; endeavor to promote the cause of, receive funds for and stimulate interest among our people in the cause of Christian education. It shall be their duty to co-operate with the educational institutions of our denomination and use all funds for the best interest of Christian education as directed by this convention and the donors of funds for education.

Section 11: Board of Trustees: The board of trustees shall hold title of all properties belonging to this convention and not assigned to other bodies. It shall have power to convey such properties when authorized by the convention.

Section 12: Representatives of Cragmont Assembly Stock: The representatives of the stock held by this convention, in Cragmont Assembly, Inc., shall work jointly with representatives of other auxiliaries holding stock in said institution.

Section 13: Representatives of Free Will Baptist Press Stock: The representatives of the stock held by this convention in the Free Will Baptist Press shall meet annually, or as often as called upon, with the stockholders of

the press at Ayden, N. C., to transact any business that may come before them.

Section 14: Representatives of Church Finance Association Stock: The representative of the membership stock held by this convention in the Church Finance Association, Inc., shall meet annually, or as often as called upon, with the stockholders of the corporation for the purpose of transacting any business that may come before them.

Section 15: Historical Commission: The historical commission shall make research, compile same and record historical events of the denomination to date; these documents become the property of the convention and shall be held by the recording secretary.

Section 16: Executive Committee: The work of the executive committee shall be that of the convention when the convention is not in session. It shall call as many sessions as necessary between the annual sessions of the convention to transact business. It shall have the authority to suspend any officer of the convention when such officer proves a failure in duties, non-Christian or detrimental to the cause of Christ and appoint another to fill the vacancy; also fill vacancies by any other cause.

The executive committee shall supervise the work of the promotional department between the annual sessions of the convention as most practicable to our state work and in keeping with the expressed will of the annual session of the convention.

A report of all transactions of this committee shall be made to the convention in annual session.

Section 17: Board of Directors of Mount Olive College: The board of directors of Mount Olive College shall be responsible for the management and operation of Mount Olive College unto the certificate of incorporation granted by the state of North Carolina and the directives of this convention. It shall propose any necessary amendments or revisions of said certificates of incorporation, which amendments or revisions shall be approved by this convention before being put into force. It shall make an annual report to the convention, setting forth its progress, needs and achievements. It shall have power to organize at will and to create such bylaws as may be deemed essential for its government and for the control, administration and promotion of the college, consistent with the provisions of its certificate of incorporation and the constitution and regulation of this state convention.

AMENDMENTS

This constitution and these bylaws shall not be changed or altered except by a two-thirds vote of members present in a regular session. All amendments shall lie on the table not less than six hours prior to adoption and shall, during that time, be read not less than twice in open convention.


