PROCEEDINGS

The Forty-Second Annual Session of the Western Conference of the Original Free Will Baptist Church of North Carolina, convened with the church at Union Grove, Wayne County, N. C., Wednesday, October 17, 1928. Song by the congregation. Prayer by S. H. Styron.

Elder E. T. Phillips preached the introductory sermon. Text: Gen.

4:9. "Am I my brother's keeper?" Prayer by L. R. Ennis.

At the noon hour a most excellent dinner was served on the grounds.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON.

Conference reassembled at 1:30. A number of favorite songs were sung. The Moderator being absent, E. C. Morris, assistant moderator, presided.

After the organization, prayer was offered by S. H. Styron.

Delegates and visitors were invited to seats with us and given all the privileges of the body save that of voting.

There were present from the Central Conference: Eld. R. E. Tripp, and J. R. McCaskey.

From the Cape Fear Conference: Eld. L. R. Ennis.

From the French Broad Association: Eld. R. V. Self and wife.

Each of the visiting ministers above mentioned made very encouraging remarks relating to the several bodies, and prayed for union and progress.

The devotional committee report that R. N. Hinnant open and L. R. Ennis preach tonight; E. C. Morris open and R. V. Self preach on Thursday at 11 A. M.

The list of ministers was called and several were found to be absent, but a goodly number presented themselves before the close of the conference.

On motion a committee of seven be appointed to examine the proposed Treatise, Book of Discipline, Rules for the Government of churches, etc., that was submitted from the General Conference to this conference for acceptance or rejection. Committee appointed: L. T. Phillips, S. H. Styron, C. M. Johnson, R. N. Hinnant, E. C. Morris, G. W. Ferrell, W. T. Kirby.

On motion a committee be appointed to write an obituary of Elder

G. W. Davis, deceased, to appear in the minutes of this conference. Committee appointed: L. T. Phillips, S. H. Styron, W. A. Hales.

Elder A. B. Utley made a plea for help to aid him in paying for a church at Holly Springs in Wake county that he had purchased and had a deed for. He asked for \$150.00. The matter was not further urged at this hour. Conference adjourned till Thursday at 9 A. M.

THURSDAY MORNING.

Met according to adjournment. Song No. 34 was sung by the congregation. Prayer was offered by W. A. Hales. Song No. 72, "He leadeth Me" was sung by the audience.

A letter was read from Elder L. M. Mitchell in which he extended love to the brotherhood and described his very feeble condition, and asked the prayers of the body.

A letter was read from W. R. Flowers wanting a recommendation to another conference. As the brother had joined a church in the Central Conference, the matter was dropped.

Visiting brethren from other bodies that had arrived since yesterday were invited to seats and made welcome as follows: Elds. E. C. Gaskill and J. W. Alford from the Eastern Conference; Rev. B. N. Milikin of the Friends Church, and J. W. Wooten, a delegate from the Central Conference. These brethren responded with words of Christian love and encouragement for the great work we are all engaged in.

The list of churches was called, delegates enrolled, and statitics of the standing of the churches was read by the Reading Clerk, W. A. Hales. A goodly number of the churches responded, while many were carried over awaiting the arrival of delegates, when the reports would be recorded.

At the 11 o'clock hour E. C. Morris opened the services and R. V. Self preached a wonderful sermon from John 4:35.

At the noon hour a dinner of vast proportions was served to a large concourse of people. No dinner could surpass it in variety and excellence.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON.

Conference opened at 1:30. "Traveling Home," was sung by a quintet composed of W. M. Ferrell, R. E. Tripp, L. R. Ennis, W. R. Williams, J. M. Stancill. The music was inspiring to a marked degree.

Elder L. R. Ennis made an address mainly concerning Eureka College, stating what the College stood for and its capacity for usefulness to be used for the furtherance of the principles of the Free Will Baptist denomination. The college can care for 300 pupils with the present faculty, a faculty that is highly efficient, and who are working at a sacrifice in the interest of the College and our cause in general.

The total indebtedness of the college at present is \$67,966.73, divided as follows. Outstanding bonds and interest due \$9,302.00; a note payable and interest on same \$9,899.00; open accounts, \$3,929.52; teachers and employees, \$1,327.21; long term loan \$38,000; annual payment, ins. premiums and interest on loans \$6,400. The operating expenses for Eureka College

for 1928-29, \$6,058.88. While these figures look large to some people, they are small when we think of the resources of our people and how they might be met with due interest in an institution that is for the promotion of our cause for the whole nation. Assessments have been sent out to most if not all our churches stating what each church is reasonably expected to pay. Not to try to force or compel any to meet what is asked of them. But a number have responded, and why not all, and relieve the situation. May the eyes of our people be fully opened to see the need of our College work and may we pray and work for its continued success.

Prayer was offered by Eld. J. R. McCaskey.

REPORT OF A. R. FLOWERS.

To the Western North Carolina Conference of Free Will Baptist, GREET-ING:

Since the beginning of the present conference year, most of my time has been given to interdenominational Sunday School and Christion Endeavor work. I have been in five different states, during the year, and about three-fourths of my time has been spent with The Free Will Baptist. I have delivered about fifty-six sermons; seventy-nine lectures for Christian Endeavor; sixty-three for Sunday school; conducted nine funerals; delivered five addresses for secret orders and listed the names of more than eighty young men and young women as prospects in the undertaking of some Christian profession where they could render the greatest service to humanity.

This report is not made because of any requirement by the Denomination, but as a token of my esteem for this and other Free Will Baptist conferences.

A. R. FLOWERS.

C. K. Dunn, Business Manager of the Publishing House, being present, made a short address concerning the Publishing Company. He stated that the business had increased in gross receipts from \$6,000 to \$18,000 within the past ten years. He stated the company had recently purchased property in a very prominent part of the town to the value of \$6,000.00 and that the business was gradually progressing along all lines.

The devotional committee reported that W. E. Anderson open and that G. C. Joyner preach tonight (Thursday); tomorrow, S. H. Styron open and E. C. Gaskill preach at 11 o'clock.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE.

The committee that was appointed to examine the Treatise, Articles of Faith, etc., reported unfavorable, stating that they thought the work should first start in the old original conference from which the Western sprang.

RESOLUTION BY L. T. PHILLIPS (Adopted).

Resolved 1. That this conference go on record as being opposed to the election of any officer from constable to president or any man who we have

reason to believe will try to weaken the present prohibition laws of our land.

2. That we stand firm and unshaken in our defense of and our allegiance to the Protestant church, and forever oppose any movement tending toward or even countenancing a union of church and state.

RESOLUTION REGARDING CHURCH DOCTRINE BEING TAUGHT.

In order that our churches and especially our new members, may become better acquainted with the doctrines of our church, and the rules governing same

Therefore, Be it Resolved, That we request our pastors, once each year to read the Book of Discipline to the members, and explain the same to them.

The above resolution was adopted.

Rev. W. H. Crofts, a returned missionary from China, being present was made welcome and made an interesting talk.

Conference closed until Friday morning 9:30.

FRIDAY MORNING.

Met as per adjournment. "Slumber Not, Haste we On, etc.," was sung by a quartet. Prayer by W. A. Hales. The quartet sang, "Church in the Wildwood."

W. E. Anderson spoke in regard to the church at Zebulon, recommending that help was badly needed there.

REPORT OF TEMPERANCE COMMITTEE.

We, your committee on temperance beg leave to report as follows: Seeing the great need of a more careful consideration on the part of of the people to live in due bounds with Christ's admonition on purity of life conduct, Be it resolved,

- 1. That we as ministers of the Gospel, be governed by the spirit of brotherly love and Christian affection; refraining from all open and undue criticism.
- 2. That the membership of our denomination refrain from participating in things that do not contribute to wholesome thought and discreet. Christian conduct.
- 3. That as a conference we endeavor to build up a spirit of good will by showing Christian countesy to all people; 'and that we emphasize our church as a medium through which our church services, and the work of our auxiliary societies function toward magnifying Christ and his kingdom rather than the tenets of our church.

BY THE COMMITTEE.

The above report was adopted.

REPORT OF ORDAINING COUNCIL.

We, the Ordaining Council of the Western Conference, recommend that Bro. J. S. Overman, remain a licensed minister for one more year to further improve himself.

The report of the Ordaining Council was adopted.

By motion the following names were entered upon the list of licensed ministers: Leroy Hartley, Goldsboro, N. C., R. F. D.; H. W. Phillips, Selma, N. C., Route 2; Barney Carter, Kenly, N. C.; W. P. Ferrell, Selma, N. C., Route 1.

Devotional committee report that E. C. Morris open and W. H. Crofts preach at the 11 o'clock hour (Rev Crofts by agreement takes the place assigned to E. C. Gaskill yesterday).

The hour for service having appeared, Rev. Crofts made a very strong appeal in the interest of foreign mission work. He related many touching incidents that took place among the Chinese while he was with them and showed very plainly the great need of the Gospel being given to those people and that it was our duty to help bring them to Christ. The subject from which the missioner spoke was from Philippians 4:19. "My God shall supply all your needs." Eld. S. H. Styron preceded the discourse with a fervent prayer.

Following the discourse, the congregation sang No. 131.

Another fine dinner was served by the good ladies of the community.

FRIDAY AFTERNOON.

Conference met at 1:15. The quartet sang, "Traveling Home."

Prayer by A. B. Utley. A committee was appointed to go to Holly Springs and investigate the prospects of a Free Will Baptist church there, as Bro. Utley seems so vitally interested in the work at that place. The same committee is also to go to Zebulon and report their findings in like manner. This committee is to report soon after their visits. L. T. Phillips and W. T. Kirby were appointed said committee.

REPORT OF SUNDAY SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

The Sunday School committee submitted the report of last year, which was adopted. It is as follows:

Realizing that the Sunday School is one of the leading auxiliaries of our church in the training of our youth, in leading the lost to Christ, and in developing Christian character.

Be it Resolved, 1. That we put forth every effort that we can to get Christian officials and teachers, who are qualified both spiritually and educationally to conduct our Sunday Schools.

- 2. That we request our teachers to read as many helpful books on Sunday School work as they can or take some special course in the work.
- 3. That we do all that we can toward having a Sunday School in every church. We mean 100 per cent strong throughout our entire denomination.

RESOLUTION CONCERNING REPORTING TO CONFERENCE.

Resolved, That we urge our pastors to see that conference letters be sent to the Secretary, Bro. E. T. Phillips, on or before October 10th of each year.

RESOLUTION OF MISSION BOARD.

Resolved that the Mission Board of this conference be instructed to co-operate with the mission boards of the other conferences, and the State Board as to the possibility of placing Bro. Crofts on the mission fields of China.

OBITUARY OF ELD. G. W. DAVIS.

Elder G. W. Davis was born April 25, 1865, and died July 22, 1928, making his stay on earth 62 years, two months and 27 days.

He was for almost half a century one of the most active and honored Free Will Baptist ministers of the Western Conference of North Carolina, having begun his ministry at about the age of sixteen. During which time he pastored many churches and rendered untold service to mankind.

He was twice married. First to Miss Fannie Valentine, and last to Miss Sallie Bryant. In all there were sixteen children. We will say just here that he was a loving and affectionate father, and was always loved nd honored by all his children.

Bro. Davis was among the most progressive of the older Free Will Baptist ministers, but was always careful to progress in the right direction. He was a true fundamentalist, and was always active in defending the truths of the Bible. He was a strong Free Will Baptist, and much of his life was given to its cause.

The writer regrets to say that he did not know Bro. Davis when he was a younger man and more active in the work. But in his last years of service he was one of the most humble of men. He was always an inspiration to the younger ministers in encouraging them, and advising them what to do.

In the last few years of his life he was more or less disabled, and unable to render the service which he wished to render, but he never gave up the fight.

Though disease somewhat hindered him at the last, yet it may truly be said of him that he fought a good fight and kept the faith. The life that he lived was not to himself, but he lived for the benefit of others. He seemed to be interested mostly in laying up treasures in heaven where moth and rust doth not corrupt, and where thieves do not break through and steal. We feel that he has gone to receive that crown that awaited him.

The funeral services were conducted in the presence of a large and sorrowing congregation at his home at Five Points, Wilson, N. C. Services were conducted by the pastor of his church, Rev. S. H. Styron, being assisted by Revs. J. H. Worley, L. T. Phillips and E. C. Gaskill. He was laid to rest in the City Cemetery. The spot being temporarily marked by a large mound of flowers, none of which were sufficient to symbolize the beauty of his character, and the soul that made him truly a great and good man. He was a good citizen, a noble Christian gentleman, and a friend to man.

He leaves a faithful widow, who was ever ready to make life pleasant for him and his friends. We pray God's richest blessings on her and all the children.
